# <u>United Expands Role as Denver's Most Flown Airline:</u> Adds 35 Flights, Six Routes, 12 Gates, New Flight Bank and Three Clubs May 23, 2023



United today announced plans to significantly grow its position as Denver's leading airline, adding 35 flights, six new routes, a dozen new gates and three clubs, including the largest ones in the carrier's network.

Starting this summer, United also will double the total number of early morning departures and late evening arrivals in and out of Denver, giving customers more flexibility and more options to stay away longer.

United will celebrate the expansion later today at Denver International Airport where the airline's CEO Scott Kirby and Chief Customer Officer Linda Jojo will host

customers, elected officials and local partners for a tour of United's soon-to-open club spaces and a look inside a brand-new Boeing 737 MAX 9 aircraft, one of the planes that will fly some of the new Denver routes and one of about 700 new planes the airline expects to receive in the next decade.

"Denver is one of the fastest growing cities in the country and as the Mile High City's most flown airline, it's essential that we maintain the most modern infrastructure and fleet to support our local employees and customers and deliver a great experience," said United CEO Scott Kirby. "Our expansion in Denver will further enable us to connect our customers to destinations across the globe and revitalize our presence at the airport with modern, customer friendly offerings."

According to The American Growth Project, Denver is one of America's fastest growing cities. It not only attracts professionals who work in hybrid environments, but also has retained millennials who lived in Denver when they were younger and decided to stay or return by age 26. Both of those groups want access to more flexible travel options that include a wide range of domestic and international choices.

The airline will add new non-stops to six destinations including four not served by any other Denver airline: Dayton, OH; Greensboro, NC; Lexington, KY and San Juan, Puerto Rico.

The airline's local infrastructure improvements include 12 new gates set to open in the A and B concourses by the middle of 2024. That will give United 90 total gates, the most at Denver International Airport.

This expansion is part of the carrier's nearly \$1 billion investment to further improve the customer experience in Denver – an increase in gate capacity by 30%, a new check-in lobby, new user-friendly technology at gates, a new grab-n-go club concept called United Club Fly<sup>SM</sup> and the renovation and expansion of United Club<sup>SM</sup> locations.

This summer, United will also open a new club on the A Concourse and reopen its first of two revamped clubs on the B Concourse. The B concourse United Club locations will be the largest ever. All three United Club locations will feature two full levels of club space, and an upgraded design that reflects the Colorado region.

To commemorate United's long-term commitment to the city of Denver, Mayor Michael B. Hancock has issued a proclamation naming today 'United Airlines Day.' United's presence in Denver is significant to the prosperity of the city, and today's declaration by the Mayor reiterates United as Denver's hometown airline.

"It's been an honor to work with United during my time as Mayor of Denver. Together, we've been able to extend our city's reach across the world," said Denver Mayor Michael B. Hancock. "United's domestic and global network supports DEN's Vision 100 strategic plan to expand for 100 million passengers within the next decade, and I'm proud to see them continue to grow their network at DEN and further connect our community to more destinations."

Growing United's Network in Denver ~ As a result of the airline's United Next plan, United will expand mainline flying out of Denver to its highest levels in 20 years, while repurposing its regional fleet to fly to smaller, less-served destinations. Overall, United will offer more capacity from Denver than ever before, with over 60,000 departing seats per day.

In total, United will operate 35 new flights in 2023 out of Denver and since 2018, has added over 90 mainline departures per day.

This year, United will fly new 737 MAX aircraft non-stop to San Juan, Puerto Rico, beginning October 29, and Montego Bay, Jamaica\*, beginning November 4. In addition to the new routes, United will use its new MAX aircraft to increase service to popular destinations like Miami, Austin, Boston and Atlanta. As United grows its mainline fleet, the airline will use Embraer 175 aircraft to connect Denver with Asheville, NC; Dayton, OH; Greensboro, NC and Lexington, KY, starting on September 29.

United's new morning flight bank will offer Denver customers expanded flight options to many popular destinations like Dallas/Fort Worth, Las Vegas, Los Angeles, Orlando, Phoenix, Portland, San Diego and Seattle. By doubling the total number of early morning departures and late evening arrivals, customers will have more flexibility and a greater ability to maximize their stays.

This summer, United will fly non-stop to more than 150 destinations from Denver, with over 450 daily departures – more than 50% more flights and destinations than the airline's nearest competitor. United is proud to be the only airline serving Hawaii non-stop from Denver, with up to five daily flights across Hawaii's four largest islands. Additionally, with 18 international destinations – more than double any other airline, and the only US carrier serving Europe and Japan – United is the go-to airline for Denver customers traveling across the United States and the world.

New Gates and Clubs ~ Last year, United began its ambitious concourse expansion, adding 20 new gates across A and B concourses. United plans to open 12 more gates by the middle of 2024, bringing United to an industry-leading 90 gates at the airport. The airline is also investing more than \$40 million to update its footprint at 55 existing Concourse B gates by incorporating modern furniture options with in-seat power and new digital signage and self-service kiosks to support customers on their journey.

This summer, United will also open two of three new United Club locations in Denver, including its largest club in the world. Each club will feature elevated design inspired by Colorado as well as modern amenities including self-scan entry gates, Agent on Demand kiosks, free high-speed Wi-Fi, among others. Once open, Denver International Airport will feature approximately 100,000 square-feet of club space across three United Club locations and United Club Fly, the airline's grab-and-go club format that debuted in 2022.

<u>'That's the Denver in Us' Advertising Debut</u> ~ Nearly a year after United debuted its first fully integrated national brand advertising campaign in nearly a decade, Good Leads The Way, the brand is localizing its approach to advertising starting with one of its largest hubs: Denver. 'That's the Denver in Us' is the story of an airline and a city with a shared DNA that bring out the best in each other. From taking Denver careers to new heights as the largest private employer in the city, to serving as the ideal backdrop to prepare the next generation of pilots at the world's largest training facility, Denver and United's more than 85-year history is unique and extends far beyond the arrival and departure gates.

Travelers and the Denver community will see the love letter to the city on local broadcast TV, on digital kiosks in the airport and downtown as well as on billboards around the city. The advertisements also will run on streaming platforms and on United social channels in Denver.

<u>Creating Thousands of Careers</u> ~ United is the largest private employer in the city of Denver, with nearly 10,000 Denver-based employees and growing. In 2023, the airline plans to hire more than 2,300 people – from ramp agents and customer service representatives, to pilots, flight attendants, maintenance technicians and more.

Overall, in 2022, the airline hired 15,000 people across its network and will add another 15,000 this year – on track to add about 50,000 people by 2026. For more information about United's recruiting and hiring efforts, visit careers united.com.

# <u>United Becomes First U.S. Airline to Add Live Activities for iPhone</u> <u>May 22, 2023</u>



United today became the first U.S. airline to support Live Activities for iPhone, giving customers real-time access to their boarding pass, gate and seat number, and countdown clock to departure time on their Lock Screen or while unlocked in the Dynamic Island, all without opening the United app.

United customers check their mobile boarding pass and flight status nearly 800,000 times each day, and this new feature makes it even easier and faster for United flyers to receive timely updates and find important flight details.

"We're seeing soaring demand for travel this summer, and Live

Activities puts all the flight information you need right at your fingertips, whether your iPhone is locked or you're doing something else like checking email, listening to music or texting friends," said Linda Jojo, Chief Customer Officer for United. "This new feature is another way United is leveraging technology to improve our customers' travel journey. It's going to save passengers a lot of time, and we think they're going to love it, especially during a busy travel season."

Live Activities helps United customers with iPhones stay informed in real time, so they can see live flight updates, flight details and alerts right on the Lock Screen or in the Dynamic Island on iPhone 14 Pro and iPhone 14 Pro Max.

With a quick glance at the iPhone screen, customers can:

- Get details like the flight number, on-time status, inbound aircraft status, estimated departure and arrival times, and more in the Live Activity on the Lock Screen or the Dynamic Island when expanded
- Open their boarding pass directly from the Live Activity to easily scan during security check-in or while boarding their flight
- See departure and arrival gates, pre- and in-flight countdowns, and baggage carousel information right in the Dynamic Island

Support for Live Activities has started to roll out to United travelers and will be widely available by the end of May. To experience the new features, customers should verify that their iPhone is running iOS 16.1 or later and their United app is up to date.

With up to three million users interacting with the app daily, United's mobile app is recognized for its accessibility options for the visually impaired, personalization options and improved navigation. The air carrier has consistently rolled out industry-leading app features in recent years, including:

- Agent on Demand: Only United has a virtual, on demand customer service tool that lets customers scan a QR code and video chat, text or call a customer service representative instead of waiting in line at the airport. Last year, 1.3 million customers used Agent on Demand, and in 2023, we've already seen 192,000 customers use the platform.
- <u>United Map Search</u>: Customers can easily compare and shop for flights based on departure city, budget and location type, with an interactive map feature. Available on the United app and website, this digital tool displays fares in a map view, allowing customers to simultaneously compare travel to a variety of destinations in a single search.
- <u>Travel Ready Center</u>: This one-stop digital assistant on <u>united.com</u> and the United app outlines any necessary travel requirements with clear guidance, helping customers prepare for their travel and breeze through the airport without stopping for manual document checks.
- <u>Terminal Guide</u>: Customers receive personalized day-of instructions to navigate point-to-point throughout the airport from directing them to the most ideal airport entrance to finding their departure gate.

# <u>At Large Correspondent – Gerri Adams</u> <u>Traveling Again</u>

After a few years of limited traveling, we made the decision that 2023 was going to be the year we begin to travel a little more extensively. We started the year with a trip to Denver primarily for the reason of attending a friend's wedding. I forgot how cold it can get out there at the end of January. But we got to see some snow and wear some winter clothes.



In February, we said it was time to cruise the Caribbean. So, we boarded the Celebrity Reflection and off we went. While on the cruise, one of the staff mentioned that this was the first time in over two years that the ship was completely sold out. We had a little more that 3000 passengers on board with us and had smooth sailing for the 7-day cruise.

During our 7-day cruise, two passengers suffered medical

emergencies. The first happened during our first day of the cruise. We pulled into the port of Nassau and the emergency vehicles were waiting for us. The passenger was taken off by stretcher and hopefully received the medical assistance they required.

The second medical emergency took place shortly after leaving St. Maarten which was our last stop before spending two days at sea while we worked our way back to Florida. We were about two hours out of St. Maarten when the captain came over the PA and told us that we were turning around and heading back to St. Maarten so that an ill passenger could be taken to a hospital to receive much needed medical attention. The crew felt it was better to get the passenger to the closest hospital and that was back in St. Maarten. After pulling back into port, the emergency vehicles took the passenger to the local hospital. Hopefully all went well for these passengers and they were able to return home most likely by air.

This was the first time we had ever experienced not one but two medical emergencies on a single cruise. It definitely started me thinking about things to consider when cruising and how to prepare for the unplanned in the future.

Then in May, we said it's time to do some international traveling again. We had not been overseas for a number of years and felt that this would be a good time to go. Based on everything I was reading about international travel it appeared that this year United is expecting to see increased loads and additional flights traveling abroad. So off we went to Amsterdam. We had not been there in many years and certainly did not recognize much.

We flew from Chicago to Amsterdam on a 787 Dreamliner. After arriving, we made our way via train into the city and then a cab to our hotel. We stayed at the Eden Hotel which is located on one of the many canal waterways in the city. We had a lovely canal view and could watch the many tour boats travel up and down daily.



While we were there, we took the walking tour of Amsterdam to Anne Frank's house, took one of the canal boat rides, visited Keukenhof Gardens where tulips were in full bloom everywhere. The tulip gardens are open from late March until mid-May which is the height of tulip season. We saw tulips in every color imaginable – they were just beautiful. Then we traveled to the Dutch countryside to Zaanse Schans to see the typical green wooden houses and real windmills. We watched wooden clogs being made and we visited a cheese farm. # <u>Torgy's Travel Tips – July 2023</u> The Rock and Roll Hall of Fame



I started writing this article on May 23<sup>rd</sup> just a couple of days after returning from a 6800 mile road trip from our home on the West Coast. I had an entire outline sketched out, full of helpful hints for your next road trip seeing as how standby travel for the summer season is shaping up to be even more difficult than the last several years; but ...



breaking news of legendary performer Tina Turner's passing late on May 24<sup>th</sup> abruptly turned my emphasis around. The whole goal of our road trip was to visit

the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame in Cleveland. So how could I now not dedicate my entire article to the museum

where she, her fellow inductees and artists, producers, engineers, and many other influencers who grew the rock and roll genre are so magnificently honored. Read along as I endeavor to share the nostalgia, joy, tears, and "good, good, good vibrations" of Rock Hall.

It took 12 years from the formation of the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame Foundation in 1983 till the opening of this beautiful museum on the shores of Lake Erie in 1995. The building itself is indeed a masterful work by famed architect I. M. Pei. Viewed from a respectable distance, the main white structure resembles a record player with an arm extending over record turntable. The entry plaza is covered by 2 triangular glass facades, similar to Pei's "Pyramid" at the Louvre in Paris. More than 10,000 people attended the opening ceremonies on September 1<sup>st</sup>, 1995, watching Yoko Ono and Little Richard cutting the ribbon. To celebrate, the next night Chuck Berry, Bob Dylan, Aretha Franklin, Bruce Springsteen, John Fogerty, Al Green, and many others headlined an outdoor concert at the Cleveland Stadium located just down the street. Rock Hall, as it is often called, welcomes over 500,000 visitors, annually.

No matter what your musical interest gravitates towards, you will find something here that will hold your





attention and you'll probably say to yourself, "I never knew that!" We witnessed so many folks swaying or dancing while listening to audio in alcoves with headphones. The video presentations are wonderful and surprisingly frequent throughout the facility. And the display cases are the best curated that I've ever seen. They are designed

so that there is ample room to get close to the fantastic mementos assembled around each featured artist.

The entrance/street level has a welcome desk, a small open-concept snack bar/coffee shop with seating, a large stage for concerts and of course the ubiquitous gift shop that is usually visited on your way out. Note: The gift shop is open without requiring a ticket for admission to the exhibits, so if you forgot to buy something, you can come back later. And speaking of admission, discount tickets can be purchased from AAA, if you are member. I bought ours the day before we arrived and they were valid for 9 months. You can also purchase tickets from the venue's website <a href="www.rockhall.com">www.rockhall.com</a> which will guarantee you a time of entry. You'll receive a wristband when your ticket is scanned, allowing in-and-out privileges for that day. Parking is available on the street for a maximum of 2 hours, but there are parking lots that are easily accessible nearby where you can park all day. Even Cleveland Stadium next door, home of the Cleveland Browns, opens some of its lots on non-game days.

The largest and primary displays in Rock Hall are located below ground level, referred to as Floor 0 (zero). You'll spend the majority of your time in this space. Exhibits explain how Rock and Roll evolved from gospel to blues to rhythm & blues as well as how folk and bluegrass influenced the genre. Cities such as Memphis, Detroit, London, Liverpool and Seattle are showcased to demonstrate their impact. Everything from the 50's to



hip-hop has displays, spotlighting individual artists like Elvis, The Beatles, The Rolling Stones, Jimi Hendrix, The Supremes, Tina Turner and on and on.

Floor 0 is also the location of the "Featured Exhibit" which changes periodically. We were thrilled to find "The Beatles: Get Back to Let it Be" was the featured exhibit during our visit. Each Beatles album cover was shown one at a time on a video screen that dissolved into a short film with excerpts of actual footage of the "lads" in the recording studio(s) and their accompanying back

and forth chatter between takes. Comfortable seating made it delightful to rest for a while and enjoy these never-before-seen snippets. The display cases held original handwritten lyrics and music from John and Paul as well as lots of personal memorabilia and clothing. Did you know that John officially changed his name/passport from John Winston Lennon to John Winston Ono Lennon after he married Yoko? His passport was right there to view along with the old piano he and Paul used when they shared a house with Peter Asher (from Peter and Gordon) and his sister Jane Asher (who became Paul's girlfriend in 1963). Peter went on to lead Apple Records

and subsequently managed James Taylor and produced records for Taylor, Linda Ronstadt, Bonnie Raitt and Cher. See what kind of trivia you'll learn!

The 5 upper floors are each about ¼ the size of Floor 0, and house the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame, films of the inductee ceremonies, the "Power of Rock Experience" (bring ear plugs), and a 3-D theater. Do not miss the fantastic half-hour documentary of American Bandstand in this theater. You won't want it to end! The top floor houses hands-on rooms/studios where you can channel your inner rock star dreams trying out all kinds of guitars, pianos and drums with accompanying music and digital instruction. You can even design a sticker with the name and logo of your own band, print it out and stick it on the wall for posterity. How cool is that? An additional 10,000 sq ft of space will be opening soon as the museum's administrative offices are relocated offsite. I can only imagine what treasures they will come up with to fill the new space.

I don't know the specific demographics of our RUAEA membership, but I would bet that it includes a good percentage of those who grew up during the hey days of rock and roll and who continue to select that special "oldies" station on the car radio or streaming service. So, before it becomes too late, consider making a trip to Cleveland and treat yourself to a full day at Rock Hall, the residence of the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame. As the sign there says, "Long Live Rock!"

We missed **Arnold Hansen**, **Jr.**, and **Carol Parks** who were under the weather; we hope they are feeling better now. Our guests were **Russ Schleske**'s son Blair and his girlfriend Diana; Frank Llacuna and his sister Genie; and our special guest of honor Michelle McCumber of Amador Valley Quilters and Quilts of Valor and her husband Chuck. **Nancy Boyle** conducted the raffle and **Barbara Cunningham** won the money. We had a nice assortment of prizes in addition to the inevitable collection of wine—patriotic placemats and scarf, a portable pop-up lantern, and a set of fancy lotions.

We had a very special and memorable meeting on June 5th. At our meeting last November, **Rich Bouska** got up and said that, in honor of Veteran's Day later that month, he would like all veterans to stand and be recognized. Every single man stood up. (And I suspect this would be the case in many of our RUAEA chapters nationwide). That is when I decided to do something special to honor the veterans in my chapter. I am very thankful to be a member of Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) and a therapy dog handler. My DAR chapter holds a Quilt of Valor ceremony once a year, and my dog Bijou and I have been presenters at the annual Memorial Day event and Quilt of Valor ceremony in Livermore, CA. If it weren't for DAR and therapy dogs, I would never have heard of Quilts of Valor. The mission of this organization is to cover service members and veterans touched by war with healing and comforting Quilts of Valor. It was founded in 2003 by Catherine Roberts, whose son was deployed in Iraq. A quilter, she made her son a beautiful quilt and told him that whenever he wrapped himself in her quilt, he should feel hugged and the thanks of a grateful nation. And thus began the start of Quilts of Valor. Twenty years later, QOV has 10,000 volunteer members in 600 groups across the U.S. Their website is <a href="https://www.qovf.org">www.qovf.org</a>. When you go to the website, in the upper right corner is a dog tag showing the number of quilts awarded to date. As of June 7 the number is 348, 550.

In January of this year, I approached Michelle McCumber of Amador Valley Quilters and asked her if she would be willing to have a Quilts of Valor ceremony at my RUAEA chapter. This wonderful woman, who cannot do enough for our active duty military and veterans, jumped at the chance even though it was out of her area. I then offered to nominate the nine veterans in our chapter. Long story short, six did not feel they were "touched by war" but three agreed to be nominated for the award. Quilts of Valor were awarded to Air Force veteran **Rich Bouska**, Navy veteran **Joe Leather**, and Air Force veteran **Russ Schleske** at our June meeting. Michelle McCumber began the program with a talk about the Quilt of Valor organization—the mission and history, and what goes into the making of each quilt. Michelle read a short bio of each veteran and two members held up the quilts. The quilt is first shown to the honoree, then turned around to show the audience, then folded in half and wrapped around the veteran. **Jan Soderstrom** and **Russ Kennedy** wrapped **Rich Bouska** in his quilt. Russ was awarded a QOV in 2014 aboard the USS Hornet. (He was the only one in our



group who had heard of QOV.) Jan and **Tracey Blanchard** wrapped **Joe Leather** in his quilt. Tracey's late husband was a Colonel in the U.S. Army. Jan and **Blair Schleske** wrapped **Russ Schleske** in his quilt. Jan and **Nancy Boyle** wrapped **Frank Llacuna** in his quilt. Nancy's late husband was a U.S. Army veteran. Frank is a Marine from Fairfield who joined our group for the day to receive his quilt. It worked out perfectly for him because he was joined by his sister who lives in Concord. The ceremony is very poignant and meaningful. Michelle asked each veteran to add a funny or light-hearted story to the end of their bio; the audiences love it:

- ▲ Rich Bouska told about his week in the wilderness as part of Survival School. Rich grew up on a farm; the other men in his group were city boys. Their instructor started them out with a live rabbit and left. The city boys refused to kill it, skin it, cook it and eat it; so Rich killed it, skinned it, cooked it, and ate the whole rabbit. At the end of the week, all the city boys had lost 10-15 pounds. Rich was the only one who did not lose weight!
- ▲ Joe Leather told about his adventures with a pair of non-regulation shoes. Joe needed a new pair of shoes but the ship did not have his size. He was given permission to have a pair of shoes made in Hong Kong. They were black, but had a gold buckle. He was constantly written up by the MPs for wearing non-regulation shoes. Once, during an Admiral inspection, Joe stood at attention wearing his gold buckle shoes. The admiral stopped in front of him, looked at his shoes, and walked on. He'd obviously been clued in on Joe's predicament.
- ▲ Russ Schleske told about his getaway place outside his base in Thailand. It was a one-room wooden shack built of left over wood from the base; with no running water or electricity. The shower was a 30-gallon bucket with a dipper and the toilet was a hole in the floor. He paid an outrageous rent of \$25 per month but at least it was his getaway spot on his days off.
- ▲ Frank Llacuna told about getting drenched sleeping in a rice paddy during a monsoon. He and his fellow Marines joked that they should have joined the Navy. They would be on the water and dry vs. being in the water!

At the end of the ceremony, **Russ Kennedy** thanked Michelle and Quilts of Valor for honoring our three veterans. We passed his hat and collected \$150 for Amador Valley Quilters, and several also made online donations.

If you know of someone who has been touched by war, go to the QOV website to learn more about this organization and to review the nomination process. I hope that some of you will consider doing this for your friends, family members, or fellow RUAEA members.

**Barbara Cunningham** is collecting both new and used Christmas cards. She donates them to a local special education teacher who uses them in his classroom. He has told Barbara he can use "all the cards he can get." The students make gift cards which they sell at the school fundraiser. Thanks again to everyone who is helping Barbara with this project. Barb reports that, once again, she has a "trunk-ful" of cards to deliver to the school, thanks to everyone all over the country who is mailing cards to her.

**Jan Soderstrom** is collecting coupons for the charity Support our Troops. This is a service project of her Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) chapter. According to Feeding America, an estimated 160,000 military families experienced difficulty putting food on the table in 2020. Troops in junior enlisted ranks are especially vulnerable to food insecurity — almost 30% need help.

I would like to ask all of you to cut out coupons and mail them to me at 30 San Piedras Place, San Ramon, CA 94583-3018. This is such an easy thing to do to support our troops. For the price of a first class stamp, you can get about 90 coupons in an envelope. The coupons have to say "Manufacturer's Coupon". If they come in a strip, could you please cut them into separate coupons. The collected coupons are then distributed to overseas military personnel for use in their commissaries. The commissaries honor them for six months after the published expiration date so expired coupons can be sent too. In my area, the coupons come in Tuesday's mail along with the supermarket ads, and then in the Sunday paper. Unfortunately, manufacturers are cutting back on the coupons they are issuing, especially on food items, just when people need help the most. So anything we can send to the troops is greatly appreciated. I get so excited when I get a coupon for eggs! I am so grateful for the kindness of all the RUAEA members who are helping me with this project. I have not yet turned in the June batch of coupons but I estimate that I will end up with over 1800! Thank you so much to the members in my local RUAEA chapter and to members from all over the country who are sending coupons. Well, United, with 1,000 bridges across our system, 468 of which United owns, you can only imagine the work involved with keeping these updated and in working condition. Facilities manager, **Dick Cloud**, works tirelessly to be sure that our passengers have the best experience while boarding our planes. Over the years, they have made sure the bridges are more comfortable by adding heating and air conditioning units, LED lighting, touch screen operation and cameras. Like all things, the lifespan of a jet bridge is anywhere from 20-25 years. "Some we have been able to keep in operation for 40 years and are due to be replaced." Dick says, "A totally new jet bridge can run around \$638,000, but my team and I can complete a total refurbishment of an old jet bridge for around \$400,000. Multiply those savings many times over, and suffice to say, it's a significant amount." While not all of them can be refurbished, they were made with better quality materials and it should take 6 – 8 weeks for the work. Kudos to Dick Cloud and his team for all their efforts!

On another note ... You have chosen to live in a beautiful area in this state – El Dorado County. Rudy is sharing with us some information to keep you and your home safe: The El Dorado County Fire Safe Council has a free chipping program, senior/vet/low income program, and (coming soon) hazard tree removal program. 

# The Acom Days - Amazing History of US Aviation - Part 4

The Engineering Group rented a small shop in Hollywood and built the Northrop designed Lockheed Vega. It was sensational with its clean lines and high performance. In May 1927, Lindberg flew to Paris and triggered a bedlam where everyone was trying to fly everywhere. Before the first Vega was built, William Randolph Hearst, publisher of the Hearst newspaper chain, bought it and entered it in the "Dole Race" from the Mainland to Honolulu, which was scheduled for 12 August 1927. In June 1927, my brother Gordon left the Douglas Company to become Jack Northrop's assistant at Lockheed. He also managed to get himself hired as the navigator on the "Golden Eagle", the name chosen by Mr. Hearst for the Vega which hopefully would be the first airplane to span the Pacific. The race was a disaster! Ten lives were lost. The Golden Eagle and its crew, including my brother, vanished off the face of the earth. With its only airplane lost under mysterious circumstances, a black cloud hung heavily over the little shop in Hollywood. However, Captain George H. Wilkins, later to become Sir Hubert Wilkins, took the Number Two airplane and made a successful polar flight from Nome, Alaska to Spitzbergen, Norway. After that a string of successful flights were to put the name of Lockheed very much in the forefront of aviation. At Lockheed, Jack Northrop replaced the lost Gordon Scott with Jerry Vultee. In 1928, Jack quit the Lockheed Company to start a new company in Glendale called Avion. Jerry Vultee then moved up to become Chief Engineer at Lockheed. He hired Dick van Hake from the Douglas Company to be his assistant. A young man named Cliff Garrett joined the Lockheed Company as the driver of their pick-up truck. I went to work at Lockheed shortly after the Golden Eagle was lost. I became the 26<sup>th</sup> Lockheed employee. The Vegas were made almost entirely of wood and I became a "half-assed carpenter", generally known as a "Wood Butcher".

In 1929, Jerry Vultee quit the Lockheed Company to start the Airplane Development Company, which became the Vultee Aircraft Company, a division of E.L. Cord, the automobile manufacturer. He later merged with Reuben Fleets Consolidated Aircraft Company to become Convair. When Vultee left Lockheed, Dick van Hake became the Chief Engineer.

In the meantime, Glenn Martin closed his Cleveland plant and moved to Baltimore. His production man, Larry Bell, moved to Buffalo to found the Bell Aircraft Company, Carl Squier left Martin to tie in with the Detroit Aircraft Company which had acquired the Lockheed Aircraft Company and seven others. They hoped to become the "General Motors of the aircraft business"! They appointed Carl Squier as General Manager of the Lockheed plant, which moved to Burbank in 1928.

At this time, General Motors had acquired North American Aviation, which consisted of several aircraft companies in the East. Ernie Breech, formerly with Bendix but now with General Motors, hired Dutch Kindelberger away from Douglas to head up the aircraft manufacturing units. Dutch took Lee Atwood and Stan Smithson with him. The companies involved were Fokker Aircraft, Pitcairn Aviation (later Eastern Airlines), Sperry Gyroscope and Berliner-Joyce. Kindelberger merged Fokker and Berliner-Joyce into a single company and moved the entire operation to Inglewood, California.

Thus, "a handful of young men" played roles which profoundly affected all of our lives and the lives of millions of other Americans. They changed Southern California from a wasteland with a few orange groves, apricot and avocado orchards and the celluloid industry of Hollywood to a highly sophisticated industrial complex with millions of prosperous inhabitants. This technological explosion had some very humble and human beginnings. The "ACORNS" took root in some strange places: A Church, a Cannery, a Barbershop, but from them mighty "OAKS" have indeed come to fruition.
