# <u>Cities This Summer</u> <u>to Meet Soaring Overseas Travel Demand</u> April 6, 2023



United Airlines will fly to 114 different international cities this summer and has expanded its flying by 25% versus last year to meet the sharp increase in demand for travel outside of the U.S. The airline is already the largest carrier across both the Atlantic and Pacific and this summer's schedule includes nearly 25 new routes. According to United booking data, international bookings are already 15% higher than the same period in 2022 (\*International bookings up 15% in March 2023 vs March 2022).

Highlights of the 2023 summer schedule include:

▲ New service to Malaga, Dubai, and Stockholm

- Additional flights to Rome, Paris, Barcelona, Berlin, Shannon, Edinburgh, and Naples
- Almost two dozen daily flights to London-Heathrow
- Azores, Palma de Mallorca and Tenerife
- ▲ Expanded service to Australia, serving Sydney, Melbourne and Brisbane
- ▲ 10 daily transpacific flights to Tokyo-Haneda, Tokyo-Narita and Osaka
- ▲ Twice-daily flights to Seoul, South Korea from San Francisco
- ▲ Service to Hong Kong from San Francisco

Tickets are on sale now on the airline's mobile app and on United.com.

"United will give travelers more options than ever before this summer – especially if they want to fly internationally," said Patrick Quayle, senior vice president of global network planning and alliances. "With unprecedented demand for travel overseas, we'll have more service to popular cities while also adding new and unique destinations for customers to explore."

New York/Newark – Dubai, UAE ~ On March 25, United launched daily service between New York/Newark and Dubai, UAE, operated on a Boeing 777-200ER aircraft. The flight is part of a historic commercial agreement between the airline and Emirates that will enhance each airline's network and give their customers easier access to hundreds of destinations within the United States and around the world. MileagePlus members traveling on United's New York/Newark-Dubai flight can earn and redeem award miles on connecting flights to nearly 75 destinations in the Emirates and flydubai networks. United is the only U.S. airline to offer non-stop flights to Dubai from the U.S. and flies to more destinations in the Middle East and India than any other U.S. airline.

New York/Newark – Malaga, Spain ~ United is adding a fifth Spanish destination to its global network with new direct flights between New York/Newark and Malaga. Starting May 31, travelers will be able to explore Spain's Mediterranean coast with three flights per week to Malaga on a Boeing 757-200. United flies to more destinations in Spain than any other U.S. airline and this summer will offer direct flights to three Spanish cities that no other U.S. airline serves: Malaga, Tenerife and Palma de Mallorca.

New York/Newark – Stockholm, Sweden ~ On May 27, United will return to Stockholm for the first time since 2019 with service from New York/Newark. United first began serving Stockholm, which locals proudly refer to as the "beauty on water", in 2005. United will reconnect customers to this culturally rich and dynamic capital city with daily flights on a Boeing 757-200.

<u>San Francisco – Rome, Italy</u> ~ United broadens its industry-leading European network from San Francisco with daily flights to Rome launching on May 25 on a Boeing 777-200ER. United is the only U.S. airline to offer direct flights to Europe from its hub in San Francisco, and this summer will offer non-stop flights to seven popular European cities. With flights to Rome, Milan, Venice and Naples, United continues to fly to more cities in Italy from the U.S. than any other airline in the world.

<u>Chicago/O'Hare – Shannon, Ireland</u> ~ Beginning May 25, United will add more seasonal flights to Shannon, Ireland with new daily flights from Chicago O'Hare – giving customers more options to explore some of the country's most scenic destinations including Limerick and Galway. United is the only U.S. carrier to offer direct flights to Shannon with its existing seasonal service from New York/Newark, and also offers direct flights to Dublin from Chicago, New York/Newark and Washington Dulles. United will fly a Boeing 757-200 on this route.

<u>Washington Dulles – Berlin, Germany</u> ~ United will begin capital-to-capital service between Washington, D.C. and Berlin, Germany on May 25. United will be the only carrier to offer non-stop flights between these cities with daily flights on a Boeing 767-400ER. United offers more flights to Berlin from the U.S. than any other airline, with existing year-round flights from Newark.

<u>Chicago/O'Hare – Barcelona, Spain</u> ~ United continues to expand its best-in-class European network from Chicago this summer with new direct, daily flights to Barcelona on a Boeing 787-8 Dreamliner, starting May 25. This summer, United will fly to 14 destinations in Europe from Chicago, more than any other airline. This new flight builds on United's existing service to Barcelona from New York/Newark and Washington Dulles.

More Flights to Paris and London ~ United will have 23 daily flights to London Heathrow this summer, with the recent addition of a second daily flight between Los Angeles and London Heathrow on a Boeing 787-9 Dreamliner. United offers more flights and more business class seats from New York and the west coast to London than any other U.S. carrier and this summer. This new flight builds upon United's recent London expansion, with additional flights from Newark, San Francisco, and Denver, as well as new flights from Boston.

United is also adding more options for travel between Washington Dulles and Paris Charles de Gaulle with a second daily flight launching June 2, operated by a Boeing 777-200ER. United currently offers year-round flights to Paris from New York/Newark, Washington Dulles, Chicago and San Francisco.


Resumption of Unique Seasonal Service and Added

Flights to Popular Destinations ~ Along with adding new flights, United will fly nine transatlantic routes it added last summer, including direct flights between New York/Newark and Nice; Denver and Munich; Boston and London Heathrow; Chicago/O'Hare and Zurich; and Chicago/O'Hare and Milan, as well as flights to four destinations not served by any other North American airline, including Amman, Jordan; Azores, Portugal; Palma de Mallorca, Spain and Tenerife, Spain. United has also added a second seasonal frequency from New York/Newark to Edinburgh, Scotland from May 25 to October 27 and from New York/Newark to Naples, Italy from June 23 to September 7.

Asia Pacific Expansion ~ This summer, United will also be the largest airline across the Pacific, serving 27 unique destinations. Excluding Mainland China and Hong Kong, United's capacity across the Pacific will exceed 2019 levels by more than 15% this summer. United recently resumed pre-pandemic service between Denver-Tokyo/Narita and San Francisco-Hong Kong, and added new service to Tokyo/Haneda from Washington Dulles and Los Angeles.

United will also have an expanded schedule between Australia and the U.S. this summer, including non-stop routes to Australia's three largest cities – Sydney, Melbourne and Brisbane. Plus, the airline's recently launched codeshare partnership with Virgin Australia also allows travelers to make easy connections to more than 20 additional cities within Australia.

# <u>United Announces \$15 Million Investment in</u> <u>Carbon Capture Company Svante</u> <u>March 29, 2023</u>



United today announced its \$15 million investment in carbon capture technology company Svante, who provides materials and technology as part of the value chain that has the potential to convert CO2 removed from the atmosphere and from industrial emission sources into sustainable aviation fuel (SAF). This is the latest announced investment from the new UAV Sustainable

Flight Fund<sup>SM</sup>, a first-of-its-kind investment vehicle that is designed to leverage support from cross-industry businesses in order to support start-ups focused on decarbonizing air travel through SAF research, technology and production.

The airline aims to be 100% green by reducing its greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions 100% by 2050, without relying on traditional carbon offsets. To date, United has invested in the future production of over three billion gallons of SAF - the most of any airline in the world.

"Carbon capture technology has the potential to be a critical solution in the fight to stop climate change and has the added benefit of helping us scale the production of SAF," said United CEO Scott Kirby. "And at United we're building on that approach by investing in both companies that can capture CO2 and others that can turn it into fuel. There's no question that this carbon utilization is in its infancy today, but as a leader in sustainable flying we must help build the foundation to deploy this technology of the future as expediently as possible. This is truly a global imperative, and United's investment in Svante reflects our dedication to making sustainable travel a reality."

This investment was made as part of Svante's Series E financing round and will fund and support Svante's commercial-scale filter manufacturing facility in Vancouver, BC, Canada. Svante is working with world-leading organizations, including Dimensional Energy, a carbon utilization – CO2 to jet fuel – company that United Airlines Ventures invested in last year.

"We are pleased to have the support of United Airlines as one of our world-class investors," said Claude Letourneau, Svante's President & CEO. "The airline industry has a huge opportunity to make a big impact on global decarbonization — battling climate change through the transition to sustainable aviation fuels and other innovative technologies that will help the world achieve net zero. Their investment in companies like ours will aid in accelerating the commercialization of carbon capture and removal technology."

Svante is a leader in second generation solid sorbent-based carbon capture and removal. The company's scalable, eco-friendly, and commercially available carbon capture and removal technology employs structured absorbent beds, known as filters. These filters can capture 95% of CO2 emissions from industrial sites as well as CO2 that's already in the air. Once the CO2 is captured, it is concentrated and can be used in the creation of SAF or other products. It can also be safely transported and stored underground.

Svante's manufacturing facility is anticipated to produce enough filter modules to capture millions of tons of carbon dioxide per year across hundreds of large-scale carbon capture facilities. "It's great to see United's commitment to building an ecosystem for carbon dioxide (CO2) to Sustainable Aviation Fuel (SAF) manifest through this significant investment in Svante," said Jason Salfi, Dimensional Energy's CEO. "The teams at Svante and Dimensional Energy are working together to design integrated systems for captured CO2 to SAF today. There is enough CO2 in the atmosphere and in industrial process emissions to provide all of the carbon necessary for the fuels and products people use every day now and into the future. Svante provides the first step toward a circular carbon economy."

SAF is an alternative to conventional jet fuel that, on a lifecycle basis, reduces GHG emissions associated with air travel compared to conventional jet fuel alone. SAF is made from used cooking oil and agricultural waste, and, in the future, could be made from other feedstocks, including household trash, forest waste, or compressed CO2, the end product of Svante's carbon capture process.

From the Sea to the Sky: United Invests \$5 Million in

Algae-based Fuel Producer Viridos

March 13, 2023



United wants to turn microalgae into SAF through the first new investment of its recently announced UAV Sustainable Flight Fund<sup>SM</sup> since its launch: Algae Biofuel company Viridos.

This \$5 million investment will support the production of sustainable aviation fuel (SAF) made from algae, an abundant and scalable resource that can be grown and harvested without impacting the food supply chain.

Viridos specializes in the bioengineering of microalgae and its proprietary technology accelerates the amount of oil that can produced from microalgae. This algae oil could then be used to scale the future production of SAF.

SAF is an alternative to conventional jet fuel that, on a lifecycle basis, reduces greenhouse gas (GHG)

emissions associated with air travel compared to conventional jet fuel alone. SAF is made from used cooking oil and agricultural waste, and, in the future, could be made from other feedstocks, including household trash, forest waste, or algae. To date, United has invested in the future production of over three billion gallons of SAF - the most of any airline in the world.

"SAF is proven, scalable, and the best tool we have to reduce our carbon emissions from flying, but we face a significant shortage of available feedstock," said United Airlines Ventures President Mike Leskinen. "As the global aviation leader in SAF production investment United remains committed to reaching net zero carbon emissions, without relying on traditional carbon offsets, by 2050. Viridos' algae-based biofuel technology has the potential to help solve our supply problem without the need for farmland or other agricultural resources and marks our inaugural investment in our new crossindustry UAV Sustainable Flight Fund."

Viridos, a biofuel company focused on decarbonizing industries, is leading the bioengineering of microalgae and has already achieved seven times the oil productivity compared to typical wild-type algae. This creates an opportunity for potentially scalable and more sustainable production of algae oil, that could later be used to produce SAF. Based on current estimates, SAF created by Viridos' algae oil is expected to have a 70% reduced carbon footprint on a lifecycle basis when compared to traditional jet fuel.

Viridos' bioengineering technology combines several important and unique attributes contributing to better scalability and sustainability compared with traditional jet fuel production:

Surface area oil productivities of Viridos algae far exceed any traditional oil crop, achieving high algae oil output on comparatively small areas.

Viridos algae are grown in vessels containing seawater. This allows contained deployment in hot and dry locations without taxing scarce freshwater and arable land resources, while eliminating runoff.

- Viridos algae have extremely high oil contents facilitating downstream processing to algae oil.
- Viridos algae oil is a quality plant oil allowing existing bio-refineries to process the oil with high yield.

"By establishing production sites to grow Viridosengineered microalgae in saltwater, we are creating the foundation for a biofuel future that moves away from fossil fuels without competing for precious resources such as fresh water and arable land. We are excited to have the support from United Airlines. Together we can build the ecosystem needed to bring algae biofuels to the market," said Oliver Fetzer, Viridos Chief Executive Officer.

#### <u>Torgy's Travel Tips – May 2023</u> Enrolled Friends: Eligible Benefits & Costs



Aren't we lucky as UA retirees to invite two friends to share our pass rider benefits? You all know that twice each year we have the privilege of naming people to be included on our pass rider list. It can be the same person every renewal period, or we may change the eligibility to someone new. Many retirees name their children or grandchil-

dren, and others choose non-family members. Benefits include NRSA space-available travel (with or without us traveling along), 2 free checked bags as well as confirmed travel using the myUAdiscount option. When our enrolled friends travel NRSA on the same flights with us, their boarding priority matches ours, SA0V (vacation pass) or SA1R (personal pass). If they travel without us, their boarding priority falls to SA3V or SA4P depending on whether they are using our vacation or personal passes. If they utilize the 20% confirmed ticket reduction available through myUAdiscount, the traveler retains all the benefits of a full revenue passenger, including Mileage Plus accumulation and compensation for denied boarding or delay related reasons in addition to 2 free checked bags. Quite a nice deal, all around!

Using the *myUAdiscount* currently does not have any tax implications for you as the sponsor, unlike NRSA travel which does require you to reimburse the company on a quarterly basis for the imputed income amount your enrolled friend traveled during that time period. These invoices are mailed to you every quarter your enrolled friend has traveled NRSA. UA pays the IRS the imputed income value for you in advance and then mails you an invoice. You must mail a check to UA upon receipt of this invoice. You will also receive a W-2 form at year's end showing the amount you have "earned" in the eyes of the IRS. This benefit usage must be reported as income when filing your taxes.

Listing for flights and/or purchasing a confirmed ticket through *myUAdiscount* for an enrolled friend can be handled two ways. You can handle everything yourself, or you can allow *them* access to FlyingTogether with their own log-on, so they can book their own trips. To provide them their own access you must first update your profile on ft.ual.com. After logging on, click Travel>empRes>My Profile>Manage Profile>Traveler Profile. Then, scroll down to Permissions and click the blue down arrow under Status. Here you authorize your traveler to use your passes and create a password for

them. Remember, once they have their own access, they are able to book as many trips as they want, and you will not know about it until you receive an invoice from UA requesting payment for the imputed income from these trips. To see in advance the imputed income for a particular flight, simply begin a listing for the enrolled friend, but do not complete the booking. You will see the cost of the service charge and taxes (if any) as well as the imputed income amount. As long as you do not complete the listing, no ticket will issue.

Here is another helpful hint. In June and December, we can change names of our enrolled friends. To keep the names the same don't do anything and they will roll over till the next open enrollment period 6 months later. You should always remove an unwanted name before attempting to add a new name. This is imperative if you already have the maximum number of friends allowed. The system can only contain 2 names. After logging into ft.ual.com go to Travel>Manage Pass Riders and click the blue + plus sign. Follow the instructions carefully to ensure you are adding an Enrolled Friend vs. a Dependent. You may also find it quicker to update your enrolled friends if you already show them in your Traveler Profile as indicated in the paragraph above. (Note: You may add an enrolled friend at any time during the year, provided you do not need to delete an old one to make space for the new one.) The Help Hub on the ft.ual.com website is a good place to ask for further clarification of any of this info.

And lastly, the company anticipates this summer season will again be tough for NRSA travel, just as it was last year. New destinations this year include Newark to Dubai, Malaga and Stockholm, Chicago to Barcelona and Shannon (Ireland), and San Francisco to Rome. Twice daily flights Wash Dulles to Paris and Los Angeles to London are also coming up. Seasonal flights returning this year include Newark to Nice, Tenerife (Canary Islands), Palma de Mallorca and Ponta Delgada, Azores and Chicago to Milan. Please advise your enrolled friends to expect full flights, have back-up plans and pack patience! Their behavior at the airport as well as in-flight reflects on you. For those who think standby travel is problem-free, perhaps use the *myUAdiscount* option instead. Happy traveling!



Another escaped bird story ~ Now it's the Oakland Zoo's turn. During the massive storm that hit the Bay Area on Tuesday, March 21, a huge tree fell on the aviary and ripped open the mesh enclosure, allowing six exotic birds to escape. The most famous resident was Oliver, an endangered African hooded vulture. Five other exotic birds, including two pied crows and three superb starlings, escaped the aviary. Zookeepers took nonstop shifts to retrieve all six birds, who stayed nearby. As of Thursday, March 23, Zoo officials had recovered the three superb starlings who had not strayed far. All the starlings, a small and brightly colored bird native to eastern Africa, flew back into the habitat on their own. On Friday zoo staff recovered Oliver the vulture, after observing it in nearby trees for several days. On Saturday an Oakland resident living a few miles from the Zoo spotted Deauville, one of the last two missing birds, a Pied Crow. Zookeepers headed over and were able to lure him inside this kind resident's home, where he was safely caught and brought back to the Zoo. Diego the pied crow is the only bird not yet recovered. Zoo officials are still hoping to recover him.

<u>Lifesaving Lamborghini</u> ~ For all of you car enthusiasts, here is another reason to love this super fast car. I found this article online just before Christmas last year and just realized I never put it in our newsletter. It's never too late for a heartwarming story, right? This

Lamborghini Huracan was a 2017 gift to police from the luxury carmaker. It has a top speed of 190 mph and the capacity to go from 0-62 mph in 3.2 seconds. It was assigned to the highway patrol in Bologna, northern Italy, for use in both normal police operations and the urgent transport of blood and organs. Another Huracan is operated by the highway patrol in Rome, and a 2000 Lamborghini Gallardo once used by police is now in a museum. On December 20, 2022, Italian police used this specially adapted Lamborghini super car to deliver two kidneys to donor patients hundreds of miles apart. The organs were driven from Padua in Italy's northeast to hospitals in Modena and then Rome. "Traveling on the motorway to deliver the most beautiful Christmas present: life", police said in a statement posted on social media, alongside a picture of a medical cool box in the specially built compartment at the front of the Huracan. Police said they hoped the two patients and their families "will have a happier and more peaceful Christmas". Unfortunately, manufacturers are cutting back on the coupons they are issuing, especially on food items, just when people need help the most. So anything we can send to the troops is greatly appreciated. I get so excited when I get a coupon for eggs! I am so grateful for the kindness of all the RUAEA members who are helping me with this project. On April 1st, I turned in 1458 coupons to my coupon chairperson. They were hundreds of miles from land and no one knew where they were or even if they were alive Every day across America millions wondered and prayed that Eddie Rickenbacker might somehow be found alive.

Time dragged on. All he could hear was the slap of the waves against the raft. Suddenly Eddie felt something land on the top of his cap. It was a seagull!

Old Ed would later describe how he sat perfectly still, planning his next move. With a flash of his hand and a squawk from the gull, he managed to grab it and wring its neck. He tore the feathers off, and he and his starving crew made a meal of it - a very slight meal for eight men. Then they used the intestines for bait. With it, they caught fish, which gave them food and more bait ... and the cycle continued. With that simple survival technique, they were able to endure the rigors of the sea until they were found and rescued after 24 days at sea.

Eddie Rickenbacker lived many years beyond that ordeal, but he never forgot the sacrifice of that first lifesaving seagull. And he never stopped saying, "Thank you". That's why almost every Friday night he would walk to the end of the pier with a bucket full of shrimp and a heart full of gratitude. PS: Eddie Rickenbacker was the founder of Eastern Airlines. Before WWI he was a race car driver. In WWI he was a pilot and became America's first ace. In WWII he was an instructor and military adviser, and he flew missions with the combat pilots. Eddie Rickenbacker is a true American hero. And now you know an-

other story about the trials and sacrifices that brave men have endured for your freedom.

As you can see, it is a great story that many don't know. You've got to be careful with old guys, you just never know what they have done during their lifetime. P.S. And the road into Key Biscayne is the "Rickenbacker Causeway".


Chuck highlighted the June 14<sup>th</sup> picnic, which we have committed to at least 50 people to be in attendance.

You may have seen on the news in February, that there were homeless people living at ORD. One of the stations did a story that one homeless man was taking the ORD subway to the airport, and sleeping in the front part of the airport, before the TSA's, or next to the bag-

gage claim. Sleeping in the streets of Chicago, was getting too crowded and dangerous. Well, within a few days, he had others join him, all with their sleeping supplies, food and blankets. Employees trying to get the subway to return home, or get to work, had to walk over or around them. This was in all the terminals, not just United's, but it does cause concern for their health and safety. One passenger described it as a 'Dystopian homeless encampment overtaking O'Hare Airport'. After many complaints, the city said they sent the letters to their security team. Haymarket Square, a non-profit that helps with homeless at ORD and downtown, said the numbers are increasing every year. It used to be hundreds, now it's in the thousands. Since first reported, there is an increase of police at the subway entrance. Almost all of the homeless have disappeared. Now anyone coming to the airport after 10:00 p.m., must show an ID, if they are traveling or are employees. Be careful if you're leaving on a flight or coming in from one after about 9:00 p.m.

One more item about traveling, the U.S. Customs and Border Protection Agency is 'proposing' that all passengers on international flights provide, a U.S. address, two phone numbers, and an email address. 'What did she say? Where has she been?' I explained that I wanted to talk to her first before I called Marge. I was in shock! I wondered if I should tell her my major mistake in announcing her death. Marge said, 'I wonder where he got the idea that I was dead'. I took in a deep breath and said, Marge, you better sit down. I started in with my major faux pas, my message from 'somebody', and told it all. She gasped and screamed at the same time. She said, 'who told you that?' Again, I don't remember that was nine months ago, I get mail from people every day about deaths, and then advise other employees. Poor lady was in shock. I told her, 'Marge, if it's any consolation, many people wrote and said what a nice lady you were, so kind and considerate, and they were very sad to hear this news.' # The Acorn Days Amazing History of US Aviation - Part 2

Decades before "geeks" and "nerds" altered the world; young pioneers changed the world not with "brick and mortar" but with wood, bailing wire, canvas, and later aluminum. ~ Ray Lahr

Glenn Martin's mother, Minta and two men ran the factory when Glenn was risking his neck and gadding about the country. One of these was 22-year old **Donald Douglas** who was the whole of his engineering department and the other was a Santa Monica boy named **Larry Bell** who ran the shop.

The third circus ring was a flying school. It had a land plane operation in Griffith Park and later at Bennett Farm in Inglewood; and a hydroplane operation at a place that's now part of the Watts District. A stunt flyer named Floyd Smith ran it. One of his first pupils was Eric Springer, who later became an instructor and then Martin's test pilot, still later the test pilot for the early Douglas Company, and then a Division Manager.

Between Eric and Floyd, they taught a rich young man named Bill Boeing to fly. Having mastered the art; Boeing bought a Martin biplane, hired Ross Stem, Glenn Martin's personal mechanic, and shipped the airplane to Seattle. Later, when it crashed into the lake and Boeing set about to repair it, he ordered some spare parts from Martin in Los Angeles.

Martin, remembering the proselytizing incident with Ross Stem, decided to take his sweet time and let Boeing stew. Bill Boeing said, "To Hell with him", and told Ross Stern to get busy and build one of their own. Boeing had a friend named Westerfelt and they decided to form a company and build two airplanes. These two BW airplanes bore a remarkable resemblance to the Martin airplane which, in turn, had been copied from Glenn Curtiss. There seems to be a moral about customer relations and product support mixed up in this episode.

During WWI, a bunch of sharpies from Wall Street in New York got control of the Wright Company in Dayton and the Martin Company in Los Angeles. They merged the two companies into the Wright-Martin Company. They sent a young man named Chance Vought to be their Chief Engineer. Donald Douglas lost no time in quitting and went to work for the U.S. Signal Corp.

The Wright-Martin Company started building obsolete Standard biplanes and Hispano-Suiza engines, with the latter under a license agreement with the French Government. Martin told them what they could do with them, and took off for Cleveland, taking Larry Bell and Eric Springer with him. Having the backing of a baseball mogul to build a new factory, he was soon joined by Donald Douglas who went to work and came up with the design of the Martin Bomber. It came out too late to see service in WWI, but showed its superiority when General Billy Mitchell made everyone mad at him by sinking the captured German battle-fleet. The deathblow to the allegedly Dreadnaught Osfriesland was delivered by the Douglas designed Martin Bomber.
