From The Employee Travel Center Team Use of Saved Credit Cards for Pass Travel



Due to unforeseen technical issues with the Ticketing Service using Credit Cards saved in employeeRES, we are once again faced with needing to remove all saved credit card details from employee and pass rider profiles. While this is not something we want to do, we

have no other choice in order to allow tickets to again be issued that were purchased with a saved credit card. Going forward, we've been assured this is the final time that removal of saved credit card details will be necessary. For those who have already paid for pass travel using a saved credit card and who are traveling within the next few days, we highly suggest logging into eRES and checking to be sure the booking has been ticketed (you cannot do this on the United app). You'll need go to the Travel plans tab, select the booking, then select the "View/edit trip details" button. This should pull up all of the booking details. If your booking shows the below text, then it's likely impacted by this Ticketing Service issue.

While Ticketing Service is going to re-queue the bookings for ticketing once the saved credit card details are removed from all profiles, this may not happen quickly enough if you are traveling today or in the next couple of days. Therefore, we suggest, as a work-around, that you cancel the un-ticketed trip, and then

book again and manually enter the credit card details rather than using the saved credit card. This should result in immediate ticketing of the booking.

We apologize for the inconvenience and appreciate your understanding while we work through this issue with the Ticketing Service.

<u>United and Emirates Expand Market Presence</u> <u>Through New Agreement</u> <u>September 14, 2022</u>



United and Emirates announced a historic commercial agreement today that will enhance each airline's network and give their customers easier access to hundreds of destinations

within the United States and around the world*.

United will launch a new direct flight between New-ark/New York and Dubai starting in March 2023 – from there, customers can travel on Emirates or its sister airline flydubai to more than 100 different cities. Tickets for United's new Dubai flight are now on sale.



Starting in November, Emirates customers flying into three of the nation's biggest business hubs — Chicago, San Francisco and Houston — will have access to nearly 200 U.S. cities in the United

network – most of which only require a one-stop connection. At eight other U.S. airports served by Emirates – Boston, Dallas, LA, Miami, JFK, Orlando, Seattle and Washington DC – both airlines will have an interline arrangement in place. United and Emirates announced their agreement today at a ceremonial event at Dulles International Airport, hosted by United CEO Scott Kirby and Emirates President Sir Tim Clark, featuring United and Emirates Boeing 777-300ER aircraft and flight crews from each carrier.

"This agreement unites two iconic, flag carrier airlines who share a common commitment to creating the best customer experience in the skies," said United CEO

Scott Kirby. "United's new flight to Dubai and our complementary networks will make global travel easier for millions of our customers, helping boost local economies and strengthen cultural ties. This is a proud moment for both United and Emirates employees, and I look forward to our journey together."

"Two of the biggest, and best-known airlines in the world are joining hands to fly people better to more places, at a time when travel demand is rebounding with a vengeance. It's a significant partnership that will unlock tremendous consumer benefit and bring the United Arab Emirates and the United States even closer," said Sir Tim Clark, President Emirates Airline. "We welcome United's return to Dubai next year, where our hub Dubai essentially becomes a gateway for United to reach Asia, Africa and the Middle East via the combined network of Emirates and flydubai. We look forward to developing our partnership with United for the long term." Soon customers of both airlines can book these connecting flights on a single ticket - making check-in and luggage transfer faster and easier. For example - travelers will be able to visit <u>United.com</u> or use the United app to book a flight from Newark/New York to Karachi, Pakistan or go to Emirates.com to book a flight from Dubai to Atlanta or Honolulu.

This agreement will also give the loyalty program members of both airlines more opportunities for more rewards: United MileagePlus® members flying on United's Newark/New York to Dubai flight can soon earn and redeem miles when connecting beyond on Emirates and flydubai and Emirates Skywards members will be able to earn miles when they travel on United operated flights. Eligible United customers will also soon have access to Emirates lounges when connecting to and from United's new Dubai flight.

Both airlines have recently announced significant investments in the customer experience. Emirates will retrofit more than 120 aircraft as part of a \$2 billion effort that includes elevated meal choices, a brandnew vegan menu, a 'cinema in the sky' experience, cabin interior upgrades, and sustainable choices. At United, the airline will add 500 new Boeing and Airbus aircraft to its fleet with a focus on a new signature interior that includes seat-back screens in every seat, larger overhead bins, Bluetooth connectivity throughout, and the industry's fastest available in-flight WiFi.

The Writers' Column - Thoughts of an Old Man (Bumper Stickers) By Bob Duensing

Yesterday, I was talking to my daughter about stuff and the conversation turned to a problem that my granddaughter was having with her car. After a few minutes, my daughter mentioned a bumper sticker that my granddaughter has on her car. I had forgotten about it even though I think it is hilarious.

After my daughter left, I put that out of my mind – or so I thought. At 3AM this morning, I woke up thinking about bumper stickers. I lay there trying to go back to sleep but I couldn't get it out of my mind. When the alarm went off at 5AM, I was still thinking about bumper stickers. So I decided to write about them.

When you are as old as I am, you remember that the precursor to bumper stickers were Burma Shave signs along the road. Burma Shave signs were a genius way of advertising their shaving cream. They were initiated in 1926 and remained scattered around the country until about the early 1960's. That advertising scheme was very effective and entertaining to the motorist.

There would be a few words on a sign attached to a fence post and then a little distance down the road, there would be another sign with a few more words to the story and so on. The final sign would say "Burma Shave". This advertising plan provided entertainment to the occupants of the car and had minimal impact on safety since you were usually on a two lane road and in a rural area.

Some examples of Burma Shave signs: "The One Who Drives When He's Been Drinking Depends On You To Do His Thinking - Burma Shave"

"Thirty Days Hath September, April, June, And The Speed Offender - Burma Shave"

"Don't Pass Cars On Curve Or Hill. If The Cops Don't Get You, Morticians Will - Burma Shave"

As time passed, Burma Shave signs were no longer practical with the wider highways and wide shoulders alongside the road. Bumper stickers started to emerge. Some were clever, some were funny, some were rather nasty and a lot of them were political.

Along came some bumper stickers that had two lines of dialog and as a result were harder to read. This tempted motorists to ease up closer to read the message. The disadvantage to this was the fact it decreased the number of nanoseconds it took to rear end the car ahead of you if they touched the brake pedal.

If you think that is a distraction, the advent of vanity license plates is worse. Some of them are obvious, others not so much. Torgy's Travel Tips – November 2022 <u>Road Scholar</u>



Well, I checked one off my bucket list this past August. Pre-Covid I had made plans to join a Road Scholar group to hike the Swiss, Italian and French Alps. This was to celebrate a milestone birthday (70) in January 2021. Those plans fell through due to the pandemic, needless to say. But I'm proud to say I accomplished my goal this year with

a wonderful group of "elder" hikers from all over the US; with great local guides and accommodations all arranged by Road Scholar. This was my 4th trip with RS and I'd like to pass along some travel tips that might interest you. Read on.

Road Scholar was formerly known as Elderhostel, which was founded in 1975 as a not-for-profit organization geared for travelers aged 55+ desiring to stay active and to learn while traveling. They used empty college dorm rooms in summer to house participants who would attend lectures by professors on a plethora of subjects, and then have fun excursions in and around the college location. It was popular, but participants commented on 2 things that often limited their friends from joining: The name seemed to signify "old" and they longed for destinations and adventures not limited to college campuses during summer.

So, in 2010 the organization changed their name to Road Scholar (a tip of the hat to the esteemed Rhodes Scholars, signifying great knowledge, and being "on the road" to exciting destinations). It is still a not-for-profit organization offering more than 5,500 learning adventures, serving more than 100,000 participants annually. Programs are offered in all 50 US states, 150 other countries and aboard ships on rivers and oceans worldwide. Accommodations now are very comfortable, often 4-to-5-star hotels in many locations. No more "youth hostel" style bunking!

Eleven years ago, my husband and I enjoyed the best trip of our lives on an 18-day Road Scholar adventure to the Galapagos Islands and Machu Pichu. Unlike many travel operators in that area who use large vessels like the National Geographic Explorer, RS uses small 16 passenger (+crew) boats that can navigate into the myriad of small bays in the Galapagos. A Galapagos National Park Service Guide was onboard our boat for the entire 8 days and we had a lecture each evening about what we would experience the next day. We snorkeled and swam among the penguins and sharks and learned so much about the fragile nature of these enchanted islands. Then it was time to fly to Cusco and learn about the archeology in the Sacred Valley and Machu Pichu. We learned in the evenings and practiced what we learned during the days. And then it was off to Lima for more adventures. Food, lodging, transportation and guides were top notch.



On my recent trip to the Alps, it was again, top notch. The age and experience of the hiking group was respected throughout the trip: 2 days aggressive day hiking followed by 1 day of more relaxed adventures. The 14-day trip took us to Les Diablerets in Switzerland, the Great St. Bernard Pass into Italy, 4 wonderful days in and around Gran Paradiso National Park in the Aosta valley of Italy and then the highlight was 3 days hiking around Chamonix, France. The sound of

cow bells tinkling in the distance as we traversed pastoral valleys was magical. The weather was perfect.



We ascended to the Aiguille du Midi of Mt. Blanc at elevation of 12,604 ft. via 2 cable cars. The view was almost more than I can describe. Imagine snow and

mountain peaks so white (no air pollution at this level) that it almost hurts the eyes.

Then we descended to the ice caves of the Mer de Glace glacier, which has receded so far now that it requires taking a gondola <u>down</u> the mountainside and then climb down a further 540 steps to the cave entrance. And you have



climb back <u>up</u> those same 540 steps when you're finished! But the experience and the cog train ride back down to Chamonix was worth it.



Now, you may not be interested in such an aggressive vacation, but Road Scholar has many, many other destinations and themes that just might engage you, including inter-generational programs where you can bring along grandkids. What a great and unique bonding opportunity. I would recommend requesting their free, wonderful catalog as well as looking online at www.roadscholar.org.■





Fall is the time of the annual Monarch Migration. Monarch Watch is a nonprofit educational outreach program based at the University of Kansas that focuses on the monarch butterfly, its habitat, and its spectacular fall migration. The website is <u>monarchwatch.org</u>. There are 73 species of native milkweeds in the United States. Many of these species are rare, threatened, and endangered. Monarchs utilize about 30 of these species as host plants with some regularity. Monarch Watch collects seed donations to continue restoring native milkweed to all the regions of the U.S. These seeds will be grown and plants will be sold or donated back to their eco-regions.

This website is a wealth of information about milk-weed with many useful links. The Milkweed Profiles link gives descriptions, distributions, growing conditions and images of each milkweed species targeted for restoration. The Growing Milkweeds link gives directions for milkweed propagation and instructions on how to create monarch habitats. The Milkweed Market link provides sources of milkweed seeds and plants. No matter where you live in the U.S., the monarchwatch.org website can tell you what species of milkweed to plant and how to grow it successfully.

My interest was further piqued when I recently read an article about Marin County (north of San Francisco) banning tropical milkweed, a nonnative species of milkweed, because it actually harmed the monarchs. On August 24, the Marin County Agricultural Commission sent a memo to nurseries in the county directing all plant retailers to remove and destroy all tropical milkweed they currently have in stock. Tropical milkweed can harm Monarch butterflies, which are endangered, by confusing them during migration season. Rather than dying back in the winter like native milkweed, tropical milkweed remains bright, which can confuse Monarchs. The tropical variety also produces a parasitic spore that can be harmful to Monarch caterpillars. County residents who have planted tropical milkweed in their gardens and yards do not need to remove it, according to the new guidance, but are advised to prune the flowers back in the fall to a height of six inches.

For example, California is the center of the distributions for six milkweed species used by monarchs; Mexican whorled/narrowleaf milkweed, desert milkweed, California milkweed, heartleaf milkweed, woolypod milkweed and woolly milkweed. Of these, Mexican whorled/narrowleaf milkweed is the most widespread and widely used by monarchs. Each species has a unique distribution within California and restoration efforts should target counties in which these species are known to occur. Note that tropical milkweed, banned by Marin County, is not on the list of milkweed native to California.

And now for your humorous animal story of the month \sim Japan's Hakone-en Aquarium, an hour's drive southwest of Tokyo, is home to 32,000 animals including sharks and seals. During the last year, <u>inflation</u> and rising prices have forced the aquarium to cut costs wher-

ever possible. For the penguins and otters this has meant a change in diet - and the animals are not happy about it. Before, the aquarium offered penguins and otters aji, or Japanese horse mackerel, which the animals readily ate. But the price of aji has increased by 20% to 30% since last year, so to cut costs, in May the aquarium switched to a cheaper alternative - saba, or mackerel. It has not been well received. Within the link below, there is a hilarious video of an aquarium employee waving a mackerel near a penguin. There is no reaction. When she moves the fish closer to its beak, the penguin turns away haughtily. An otter sniffs the fish, then runs away. The aquarium has had to get creative to encourage the animals to eat. They are willing to eat the mackerel only when mixed with their favorite aji. https:// www.cnn.com/travel/article/japan-hakone-aquariumpenguins-fish-intl-hnk/index.html

Last month I told you about therapy dogs at SJC and SFO airports. In mid-July my therapy dog friend and I started the process to get TSA clearance to bring our dogs to SJC. What should have taken about three weeks took over two months, thanks to me having very faint fingerprints that TSA rejected as illegible three times. This came as no surprise. I had the same problem 42 years ago when I applied for a CA teaching credential. I had to be fingerprinted then too, and those were the days of black ink prints. A retired FBI agent did the fingerprinting. He took about 5 sets of prints and none were very good. He actually had to sign something stating this was the best he could do. I had to go from that office to my afternoon shift at SFORR with the dirtiest hands you'd ever seen. So embarrassing! It took several days for all the ink to come off. Fast forward to 2022 with digital fingerprints. Usually TSA does a background check via Name Search after two sets of prints are rejected. But for whatever reason I had to make a third trek to SJC just to plop my hand on the digital reader for about ten seconds per hand. Finally, after the third set was rejected, they did the name search and I was cleared. My friend Barbara and her English Cream Golden Retriever Bailey, and I and my Miniature Poodle Bijou, had our first visit to SJC on September 26. We spent three hours with the airport therapy dog coordinator. She showed us the ropes—getting through TSA with or without sniffer dogs present, checking the arrivals and departures boards, and how best to engage passengers in boarding areas and the hallways. walked the entire length of both terminals and according to my friend's smart phone, we walked three miles! We are going back on October 14 and can't wait. Our plan is to check the departures board, go to the terminal with the most departures, and visit with people in the boarding areas. We will also encourage people in the hallways to pet the dogs. On our first visit, a lot of people smiled at us as we were walking the dogs, but weren't

sure about approaching us. We will ask people if they want to pet the dogs. Once passengers see someone petting them, then others will also stop to say hello and pet our dogs.

Today, SJC has about 32 active therapy dogs and two therapy cats. Some of the dogs are certified with Alliance of Therapy Dogs. Other dogs and the cats are certified with Love on a Leash. The collected coupons are then distributed to overseas military personnel for use in their commissaries. The commissaries honor them for six months after the published expiration date so expired coupons can be sent too. In my area, the coupons come in Tuesday's mail along with the supermarket ads, and then in the Sunday paper. I can't wait to see how many coupons you all send me (to address above). I would like to thank the East Bay Diablos members who bring coupons to our meeting; and other RUAEA members who have mailed me coupons from NJ, CO, IL and CA. Thanks to all these kind people, I was able to turn in a whopping 1,331 coupons to my coupon chairman on October 1st!






