Our domestic schedule expands in June **April 23, 2021**



To meet rising demand for summer travel, we're expanding our domestic schedule by adding 480 daily flights this June. This increase offers an average of UNITED more than 3,100 total daily domestic flights to more than 240 U.S. destina-

tions. New routes include flights to Hawaii, Alaska and WYS (West Yellowstone, Mont.) just two miles from Yellowstone National Park.

We plan to fly 67% of our domestic schedule and 60% of our overall network schedule compared to June 2019. This comes on the heels of our international route announcement from earlier this week, in which we announced new flights to Croatia, Greece and Iceland.

In June, we'll add a new route from DEN to WYS. This new service joins our other flights to popular destinations near U.S. national parks. This summer, we will

fly to more national parks than any other airline. We will add two new nonstop flights to Hawaii: ORD to KOA (Kona) and EWR to OGG (Maui). This will put us at 40 daily flights to fun in the sun on the Hawaiian Islands.

Finally, we're restarting service from ORD to FAI (Fairbanks, Alaska) and from ORD, IAH, EWR and SFO to ANC (Anchorage) with the addition of new service between FAI and ANC.

"June is historically the beginning of the peak summer travel season and ramping up to over 3,500 total daily flights across the system this June underscores the continued demand for leisure travel and our responsiveness to meeting that demand," said Domestic Planning and Scheduling VP Ankit Gupta.

Last month, we announced 26 brand new nonstop flights from Midwest cities to seven coastal cities in the Southeast and New England.

With customers eager to get out there and travel this summer, we are working hard to provide as many options as we can to get them where they want to go!

REAL ID enforcement delayed April 28, 2021



Update: The Department of Homeland Security is extending the REAL ID full enforcement date by 19 months, from Oct. 1, 2021, to May 3, 2023, due to circumstances resulting from the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic.

On May 3, 2023, every air traveler 18 years and older will need a REAL ID-compliant driver's license or identification card, state-issued enhanced driver's license, or another TSA-acceptable form of identification at airport security checkpoints for domestic air travel.

Embraer 175 aircraft returning to 76 seats **April 27, 2021**



Beginning in May, our United Express (UAX) partners will be re-installing six seats on all Embraer 175 (E-175s) aircraft to accommodate their original seat count of 76.

There will be no change to the catering provisions or takeoff and landing procedures, and the layout of passenger accommodations (LOPA) in the system will show only 70 seats until early June when all the fleet is modified.

You may be thinking to yourself: Why get vaccinated if there is still a chance I could catch COVID-19?

The protection you get from vaccination is the main reason – it keeps you and your family safer, it keeps your colleagues safer, and it keeps our customers safer.

It can be hard to wrap your head around probabilities when you're comparing numbers that are so different. Here is a table that helps put it in context:

In the US	Non- vaccinated	Vaccinated
Chances you'll develop COVID-19	1 in 10	1 in 13,000
Chances you'll die of COVID-19	1 in 574	1 in 1,000,000

You may have seen press reports in the past few weeks talking about the 5,814 cases of COVID-19 in people who were considered fully vaccinated. And while more than 5,000 cases sounds like a lot, that's out of more than 75 million people who were fully vaccinated. That's about 1 in 13,000 people. The number of deaths is even smaller, 74 people out of 75 million people: literally a one in a million chance.

Quick recovery for cargo flight diverted to Midway Atoll April 23, 2021

A GUM - LAX cargo flight operated by a Boeing 787-9 had to divert to MDY (Midway Atoll) due to mechanical issues.

We dispatched a rescue team from HNL (Honolulu) that included Aircraft Maintenance Supervisor Diaman Kyte, Maintenance Control Senior Staff Representative Ho Shing Wong, Line Technicians Keyetta Johnson and Sinh Vu, and Avionics Line Technicians David Francis and Phil Roque.

On arrival, the team performed inspections and quickly traced the issue to a faulty shoulder heater and lower recirculating fan. The fan and both heaters were deactivated and the aircraft taken out of service to ferry to HNL in the evening.

Phil said the team took advantage of the brief layover by touring the atoll, enjoying the scenery, wildlife and World War II battle sites. After HNL, the 787 flew to LAX and, by April 20, had returned to service.

"Thanks to the quick response by our HNL team and great work they accomplished at a challenging location," said International Maintenance Director Don Klaus.

So Simple From Sheryl



With beautiful weather in June, I am going to share a great rib recipe that you can enjoy making inside or on the grill. This is a dry rub recipe and for the August recipe I will be giving you a delicious bar-b-que rib recipe. Watch for the August recipe. I think you will enjoy them both. Sometimes when we are hav-

ing company, I make one slab of dry rub and one slab of barbeque ribs. They are very different from each other and company seems to enjoy both equally as well.

Dry Rub Baby-Back Pork Ribs:

3-4 pounds baby-back ribs

Dry rub

2 teaspoons garlic powder, 2 teaspoons salt and 2 teaspoons coarse ground pepper

3 lemons

<u>Directions for grill</u>: Turn grill down to low temperature. Mix together spices and cover both sides of the ribs with the mixture.

Grill ribs, bone side down for about 45 minutes per pound. Squeeze the lemon onto the ribs frequently. It is for taste and to keep them moist.

<u>Directions for oven</u>: Add ½ cup water to a shallow, rimmed pan. (I cover inside of pan with foil for less clean up or better yet, use a disposable pan.)

Season ribs with spice mixture on both sides and place in pan, bone side down. Sprinkle generously with fresh lemon juice.

Cover with foil and cook 45 minutes per pound at 350 degrees replacing foil after each lemon squeeze. (Ribs will look steamed.) During last 45 minutes, remove foil and continue cooking until browned. Generously sprinkle with fresh lemon juice throughout cooking. I do it every 45 minutes.

Hope you enjoy them as much as our family does.





The project will take approximately seven months and should be finished some time in June 2021. Kavaan has never been in a natural environment. Being able to eat live trees and greens will be an entirely new experience for him.

The SS Liberty ship Jeremiah O'Brien returns to Pier 45 in SF: Still more great news! The SS Jeremiah O'Brien is a Liberty ship built during World War II and is named after the American Revolutionary War ship captain Jeremiah O'Brien. Construction started on May 6, 1943 and she was launched on June 19, 1943 in Maine. Of the 2,710 Liberty ships built during the war, sadly, only three remain.

The SS Jeremiah O'Brien is one of two remaining fully functional Liberty ships built and launched during World War II. The O'Brien has the distinction of being the last unaltered Liberty ship and remains historically accurate. She is a living museum on the National Register of Historic Places and a National Historic Landmark.

On May 23, 2020, a four-alarm fire destroyed Pier 45 in San Francisco where the ship was moored. Fire crews worked frantically to save the ship. She suffered some damage and was towed to Pier 35N for repairs. On March 23, 2021, after undergoing ten months of repairs, tug boats towed the historic Liberty ship back to her

home at Pier 45. San Francisco Fire Department boats sent sprays of water into the air to commemorate the return. Due to Covid-19, the ship is currently closed for dockside tours but keep checking the website as things are beginning to open up.

Saving baby turtles on Australia's Cape York Island: There are only seven marine turtle species on the planet, and all are threatened by human activity, environmental changes and predators. Three species nest on the west coast of Cape York – the Hawksbill, the Flatback and the Olive Ridley. The indigenous Southern Wik people are the traditional owners of this part of Cape York. Indigenous rangers and Artificial Intelligence developed by Microsoft are now teaming up to save these three species of turtles from extinction.

Native dogs known as dingoes and lizards called goannas prey on turtle nests, but their impact is regarded as marginal under natural conditions.

The biggest danger for baby turtles today are uncontrolled populations of introduced feral pigs, the wild descendants of farm animals brought to Australia by European colonizers more than two centuries ago. If a hungry pig finds a nest, the survival rate for turtle hatchlings and eggs is likely to be zero. One pig can raid several nests in one night, according to Indigenous rangers and scientists. Prior to targeted predator management, 100% of nests on one monitored beach were being destroyed annually, mainly by pigs. Pig predation levels are now at under 30%.

The turtle life cycle starts when adult females drag themselves out of the warm waters of the Gulf of Carpentaria and onto Cape York's beaches. They dig nesting holes with their flippers: some in the dunes, some on the beach. Each lays as many as 100 eggs, covers them with sand and then crawls back into the sea. Nests are most vulnerable in the first few days after the eggs are laid. This is when the mother turtle's tracks are still visible to predators and when the scent of the eggs is strongest. If left undisturbed, the eggs will incubate. Hatchlings will emerge about seven weeks later and inch their way across the sand and into the ocean. But nature's odds are stacked against them.

Once a baby turtle enters the ocean there are hundreds of ways it can die. The more that hatch and make to the water, the more chance a few will reach adulthood and breeding age, which in some species can be around 30 years. That is why mothers lay so many eggs in each nest and why keeping nests safe is so important. Current protection efforts are focused on Olive Ridley and Flatback turtles. The biggest concerns are for the Olive Ridleys. Their nests are shallow and are generally laid on the beach rather than in the dune vegetation, so, they are very exposed.

Now an alliance of Indigenous landowners and scientists is applying a mix of aerial surveys, AI and cloud technologies and traditional knowledge to locate otherwise hard-to-find turtle nests before the pigs do.

Cameras mounted on drones and helicopters scan beaches for turtle and predator tracks. Thousands of images are then processed and analyzed with machine learning, AI and cloud computing. Microsoft researchers developed a series of AI-infused image detection algorithms, including a terrain classifier and a track and predator object detector. The terrain classifier is exhibiting more than 90% accuracy for distinguishing between beach, bush and ocean terrain. The track and predator object detector is incrementally improving its performance through training using 45,000 images.

With this system, what normally takes one month of monitoring work on the ground takes two hours using a helicopter or drone. It might take weeks for rangers to manually locate a turtle nest, and too often they arrive too late: pigs or other predators have already dug up and eaten the eggs. Armed with precise real-time location and tracking information, Indigenous rangers can move in. They protect nests with cages, netting and fencing strong enough to keep predators out but with gaps big enough for hatchlings to crawl through. Additionally, predator numbers are sometimes controlled through targeted culling.

This work has seen 20,000 hatchlings make it to the ocean every season. "An entire ecosystem is being stabilized", says Justin Perry from Australia's national science agency, <u>CSIRO</u>. "New technology like AI is playing a vital role to bring turtles back from the brink of extinction."

This month I would like to tell you about Mission Trails Regional Park, a short drive to East County from the Dana Inn Hotel. One of the country's largest urban open space parks, Mission Trails Regional Park is just northeast of I-8 where the San Diego River passes through a rugged area known as Mission Gorge. Long before humans inhabited the region, the river was carving a pathway to the sea, originating in the Cuyamaca Mountains. Fed by winter snowmelt and natural springs, the river grew as it made it way down the steep hillsides. When the second ice age retreated, the ocean levels began to rise and the ocean levels rose inland as far east as the Cuyamacas where fossils can still be found.

As the ocean retreated from the sharp peaks in Mission Gorge, Mission Valley was formed from a huge river that spanned the entire width. In 1916, the valley floor was again covered by the San Diego River.

In the coming months I will be talking about the interesting Native plants and Wildlife that grow and make their home in the Park.



It's beginning to feel like beating a dead horse to begin this column with more mention of the coronavirus and COVID-19, especially when this month isn't much different from those preceding. Everything in Washington is still in flux, with rules for opening and closing businesses and meeting in groups changing with each new wave of illness and death.

Most public schools have at least partially reopened – just in time for graduation and summer vacation – and many sporting events now allow a few fans in the stands. The anti-COVID vaccine is readily available to almost everyone. Travel is picking up, as people feel more comfortable in crowds at SeaTac Airport and with staying in public facilities. We look forward to the reopening of the border between the United States and Canada (we are only a couple hours away).

There have been no Emerald City Slickers meetings since March 2020, and, therefore, no regular issues of the chapter newsletter, Contrails, which is published prior to meetings. One last issue was prepared by **John Hafer-becker** and edited by **Vicki Shumaker** last September to announce that the board had suspended the 2020-21 season. That edition also provided our last "Member Profile" until we meet again. You have been treated to some interesting personal and UAL information over several months, and we here present the last of those minibiographies for this series, "**Lloyd Towne**'s 44 Years as an A&P," as told by **Lloyd Towne**, himself, with minor changes:

"After graduating from Seattle's Lincoln High School, class of 1953, I entered into a four-year A&P apprenticeship at Boeing in 1954. That same year I married the sweetest Norwegian gal in Ballard. At Boeing, it was interesting in that you spent one to two months in a shop then moved onto a different shop. For example, sheet metal shop to electrical shop to welding shop, etc. At that time Boeing was building the B-52.

We apprentices spent four hours a week at Edison Technical school, working for our A&P licenses. There I met future UAL mechanics **Ken Storey** and **Joe Mortensen**. After graduation, I ended up on the line as a mechanic at Boeing Field working on B-52s for delivery. I then went to Renton Field and worked on KC-135s for delivery to the Air Force.

Then, back to Boeing Field as a line mechanic, repairing a Pan Am 707 that had taken a mid-air nosedive of several thousand feet. I also worked on three 707s that had been used for pilot training. It was preparation work for actual delivery to the respective airlines. On a Monday, in July of 1959, Boeing offered me a job in the Renton factory at two grades below what I was making on the line. I guess that struck a nerve and my first thought was, 'Is that what they think of me?' I didn't even think. I said, 'No thanks, I'll take the pink slip.' As it happened, later that same day I ran into Ken Storey who told me he had heard that United Airlines was hiring. Thanks, Ken! With a wife and three children at home, as luck would have it, I was working for United that Friday. Of my 38 years at United, I spent 26 on the graveyard shift. I could have made swing shift early on, but graveyard let me have dinner and evenings with the family. Being that I was able to sleep during the daytime, everything worked great. During that time, we worked on Convair 340s, DC-6s and DC-7s. It was a fun time at United. With the starting of the Jet Age came DC-8s and Boeing 720s.

I was laid off in 1964. Now with a wife and five kids to feed, I elected to go to SFOMM along with five other mechanics. I shared a motel room with **Joe Mortenson** and **Jack Goodfriend** while waiting for our families to follow. I was there for two years before being recalled. An interesting experience – a higher cost of living.

One interesting thing happened while I was there. United had a Convair that ran out of fuel and went for a belly landing in a carrot field in Saugus, California. The field had been plowed, so it was fairly soft. It was almost a perfect belly landing except for one thing — a water pump in the middle of the field. It went in the nose just below the radome and out the side of the wheel well and ended in the leading edge where it meets the engine nacelle. It never touched a thing on the nose gear. I got called to go and help do whatever was needed to get it back to SFO. Guess what. I was the last one called, so I got the graveyard shift.

I spent the first night with a Pinkerton agent. My duty that night was to keep the generator fueled for the lights and keeping souvenir hunters away. My second night I had to dig a hole under the wing leading edge to get it open, making sure the wing spar was all right. It was. United really lucked out. They only had to replace both propellers and a lower cylinder on the right engine. I never found out what happened to the cylinder. They lifted the plane with a big crane and the gear dropped out as it was supposed to. After the repairs were done, they flew the plane back to SFO. I had been sent back home, so I never saw the takeoff. I returned to SEAMM in June of 1966 and back to the graveyard shift. In another 10 years I'd make it onto dayshift. It was still a fun place to work with harmless antics that would not be allowed today. I had four weeks of unused vacation the summer of 1998 and elected to use it that August. I returned for one day and retired September 1, 1998.

One thing that I have learned since I retired 22 years ago is the art of procrastination."

Lloyd Towne has been a regular at our Emerald City Slickers luncheons over the years and is always ready with a joke or funny story. Co-president **Ken Storey** calls upon Lloyd for the last word at most meetings.
