

#### Happy 95<sup>th</sup> Birthday, United! April 5, 2021



April 6 marked our 95<sup>th</sup> anniversary, and we have a lot to celebrate despite the turbulence we've experienced during this pandemic. As always, we have seen

the power of our people uniting together to face the trials and come out stronger.

We are proud of the history that has laid a solid foundation for us as leaders in the aviation industry – and beyond. Our successes have been a direct result of the hard work you dedicate yourselves to every day and our collective commitment to excellence.

As we reflect on 95 years, we are hopeful for the next 95 years and what we will accomplish together. We see brighter skies ahead and charting new paths: Setting the standard for sustainability in flight and continuing our important work on expanding diversity, equity and inclusion in aviation.

In an effort to protect the precious artifacts that can help make our legacy come alive for the next generation of airline workers, we are working on establishing the United Airlines Legacy Foundation (UALF) - a 501 (c) (3) that will serve as a historical archive of all things United. ### Cleared for takeoff at JFK March 29, 2021



For the first time in more than five years, a United plane took off – once again – from JFK (New York-Kennedy), marking a muchanticipated return to the busiest airport in the tri-state

area.

"I'm thrilled to be here with you all and welcome you to our return to JFK – a statement we at United have been waiting to say for years!" said Global Line Stations VP David Kinzelman as he welcomed customers, employees and members of the media at the gate ahead of Flight 523 taking off from JFK to SFO. "Tonight, United is officially putting all three New Yorkarea airports back on the map for our customers."

We celebrated the special occasion with gate events on both coasts. Earlier in the day at SFO and LAX, employees and customers also partook in gate celebrations ahead of Flight 514, LAX-JFK; and Flight 520, SFO-JFK.

Our return to JFK reflects not only our strong commitment to the New York City-area, but a continuation of aggressively and strategically managing the impact of COVID-19 by increasing service to and from the places where customers want to fly.

The news is just as exciting for New York City-area employees, particularly those returning to the station since our departure.

"It's very emotional for me because it is where my career started with United in July 1994. I was heart-broken with us leaving in 2015," said JFK Lead Customer Service Representative Barbara Deow-Duviella. "Returning means reuniting with some of my JFK colleagues, not just United employees but also some of the vendors that are still in Terminal 7."

Like Barbara, JFK Customer Service Representative Floretta Kapoor is thrilled to be back to where her career began and to be reunited with colleagues. "Being back and working with my co-workers again ... it's like we were never apart!" she said.

"It will be great to get back to where it all started for me with PanAm," added JFK Lead Customer Service Representative Patrick Murray. "And the short commute will also be great!"

The new service between JFK and our LAX and SFO hubs will operate out of Terminal 7 using the reconfigured Boeing 767-300ER aircraft, offering customers an extended premium cabin featuring 16 additional United Business class seats – providing all-aisle-access seating – bringing the total premium cabin seat count to 46. The aircraft will also feature 22 United Premium Plus seats, 47 Economy Plus seats and 52 Economy seats.

"We strongly believe and have great hope that United will become the number one coast-to-coast premium service once again," said JFK Lead Customer Service Representative Rocio Mac Pherson, who worked at the station for 20 years prior to United's departure.

We are currently flying one round-trip flight, five days a week to LAX and SFO, with plans to double the number of flights as demand grows. Tickets are now available for purchase on United.com.

#### Better Boarding resumes April 15 April 1, 2021



As travel demand continues to recover, we're adapting our policies to meet customer expectations

while continuing to make safety the top priority. The next step in that process is a return to Better Boarding –

our five-group, two-lane boarding process – starting April 15 in most stations.

Last year, we temporarily switched to boarding from the back of the aircraft to the front to improve social distancing during boarding. Now that more customers are returning, this can result in customers gathering in the gate area to wait near the boarding door for their row to be called, ultimately defeating the social distancing purpose of back-to-front boarding. We've also found that back-to-front boarding can take longer and that the process can feel disorderly for customers. We know from recent surveys that an orderly boarding experience is one of the things our customers value the most. We also know that our Premier customers value early boarding.

We have proven the safety of our travel experience – even when the plane is full – through cleaning, on-board HEPA air filtration, and mask requirements. Nothing about United's CleanPlusSM commitment or mask requirement is changing.

Over the next two weeks, our teams will prepare for Better Boarding by getting signage and stanchions in place. We'll also update digital signs at gates and other places that mention boarding, as well as customer communications such as pre-departure emails.

With the busy summer travel season coming up fast, now is the time to make the boarding experience as pleasant as possible for our all of our customers.

# Behind the scenes of IAH's new Baggage Handling System March 30, 2021

The IAH Terminal E Baggage Handling System (BHS) project recently transitioned from Phase I to Phase II of its construction plan, bringing the project one step closer to completion. This new baggage system is the first of its kind in the U.S. and a major step in our efforts of focusing on our customers by offering more efficient and dependable systems that make up the travel experience.

The new "E side" bag room includes state-of-the-art technology, including nine carousels with corresponding high-tech displays, a four-loop sorting system using conveyors versus tilt trays and baggage ergonomic makeup carousels to keep the bags moving prior to being placed in carts. The new technology will allow 10,000 bags an hour to be processed.

It also includes an employee break room with updated amenities, including a view of the E terminal and customer access road.

Phase II, scheduled to be finished by mid-2022, will see the completion of the legacy bag system and the installation of the modern system, including 10 additional carousels. As this is ongoing, the construction of the

Early Bag Storage (EBS) system will continue outside of the bag room. The EBS building will be over the roadway, exiting the airport and will store up to 3,300 bags utilizing the new technology – allowing for the flight schedule to increase without increasing the overall size of the bag room to accommodate the additional volume.

Once fully complete by 2023, the new automated, quadruple-loop, belt conveyor sortation system will include a conveyor more than 25,000 feet long and will boast the most advanced technology of any baggage system in the U.S.

### Change fee waiver extended March 31, 2021



To continue to provide our customers more flexibility in managing their travel plans, we are extending our Basic Economy (BE) change fee waiver through April 30. The waiver was set to expire March 31.

We are also extending our waiver for most tickets purchased for travel from international destinations to May 31 to help customers manage international requirements and restrictions.

While the waiver for Basic Economy tickets is in place, customers will be able to change their flight to a new Basic Economy ticket. Customers who want to buy out of Basic Economy to a standard Economy ticket will continue to pay the buyout fee of \$45/\$100 per flight.

Our New Normal: As more and more businesses begin re-opening, travel increases and people plan long awaited vacations, and the world tries to return to some sense of "normal", you may find yourself feeling anxious, unsure, or confused. Or maybe you are feeling a sense of relief, excitement, and happiness! Whatever feelings you are experiencing, none of which are wrong by the way, one thing we can all collectively agree on is the world prior to March 2020 no longer exists. Our lives have been transformed in ways that we could not possibly have imagined. We are now forced to find that "new" normal. Maybe you are concerned about yours

Many people think that the word that refers to a state of being normal is "normalcy". But "normalcy" did not assume its current meaning until Warren Harding used it (incorrectly) in a speech during his 1920 presidential election campaign. His slogan was "Return to Normalcy", a plea to return to the way things were before World War I.

From 1914 until 1919, the world suffered through a Great War and a horrific multiyear pandemic. People yearned for a "normal" world, i.e., one that resembled that before the war, and that is what Harding promised. Harding won the 1920 election with >60% of the popular vote and with 404 electoral votes. At the time, it was the most lopsided victory since the advent of the two-party system. People simply yearned for "normalcy", again, and we were willing to listen to anyone who promised that.

As restrictions are lifted and our freedom returns, some of us are surprised to find we are not quite as excited for things to go back to 'normal' as we thought we would be. In fact, we are feeling kind of anxious about life post-lockdown (and not just because we will need to wear shoes and sit in traffic again). Here are some tips to help you through this time of transition:

Start Small and Take it Slow: Some people cannot wait to pour into bars and restaurants and kick-start their social calendars, but if that is not you, that is okay! Give yourself time to get back to a life where you left the house and saw other humans. Socialize slowly with just a few friends at a time. Visit quieter cafés and restaurants before hitting up the hot spots.

Consider Your New Priorities: For some people, self-isolation was the catalyst for self-discovery. It forced us to pause and look at how we spent our time, energy, and money when things were "normal". Maybe you do not miss the things you thought you would? Maybe you would rather socialize in the outdoors than on a night out? Maybe you have realized how much you value alone time? #### <u>Torgy's Travel Tips – May 2021</u> When and Where Can You Travel 2021



OK, by now most of us, in our age bracket, have had the opportunity to receive the Corona virus vaccine. Opportunities for people younger than us are opening up and hopefully the vast majority of US residents will be vaccinated in the coming weeks and months. The percentage of those vaccinated in the US far exceeds those

in many, many other countries around the world: Germany, France, Italy and Australia are just a few who lag far behind, at this point in time. Some others, such as the UK and Israel, are ahead of the US. So, what does that mean for the travel industry and specifically, what does that mean for those of us who are itching to travel? Read on for an overview of where things stand at the moment. (As always, keep in mind that this article was written in early April and changes are inevitable.)

Air Travel: The CDC announced on April 2, 2021 that domestic US travel is safe for those who are *fully vaccinated* (meaning 14 days beyond after the final injection). Domestic travel is defined as all US states and territories. Be aware, however, that state and local restrictions still must be followed, such as the necessity to test and/or quarantine in several locations. It is pretty much imperative that you carry a smart phone with you in order to maneuver check-in, bag tagging, TSA screening and boarding processes. In order to eliminate contact, airport touch screens at most airlines have been modified to read your phone's apps and screenshots – no more typing on the check-in screen. The TSA now requires you to insert your driver's license into a card

reader which reads it and spits it back out to you. When boarding the flight you scan or show your electronic boarding pass to the gate agent. Blocked middle seats are now a thing of the past. Even Southwest Airlines has reverted back to boarding 30 vs. 10 passengers at a time. Close quarters in those lines, for sure! At United, be sure you have the latest version of the United App on your phone to avoid problems. At the time of this writing Apple phones need v 4.1.12 and Android phones need v 4.1.13. Note: If you use an older phone that cannot process these new versions, the only way to access your reservation/listing is to type: eres.ual.com and sign in as usual. Of course, masks are required in airports and onboard flights. Food purchased onboard UA flights is now only available if you have pre-stored your credit card within your Mileage Plus profile.

So where can you fly? Within the US, there are still restrictions to at least 13 states. The most complicated destination is Hawaii, although the island of Kauai has just reduced their restrictions as of April 5th. Broadly stated, all Hawaii destination airports require inbound passengers to enroll in the "Hawaii Safe Travels" program. First, book your flight then schedule a Covid-19 test within 72 hrs. of your departure. Next, register this activity into the Safe Travels website. United and Alaska Airlines now issue wristbands before the Hawaii flight departs, which pre-clears the arriving passenger from arrival gate procedures if their Safe Travels profile is complete. If your Safe Travels profile is incomplete, you will not receive a wristband and will undergo screening at the arrival gate in Hawaii for proof of Covid test results. Those contemplating a trip to LAX from outside the state of California, please be aware of the need to self-quarantine for 10 days after arrival. Even though California has just announced that some sports and concert venues will be opening, only vaccinated California residents will be allowed to enter. Additionally, "no hotel or lodging entity in California shall accept or honor out-of-state reservations for nonessential (i.e. tourism or recreation) unless the reservation is for at least the minimum time period required for quarantine and that the persons identified in the reservation will quarantine in the hotel until after that time period as expired", per the California Department of Public Health. New York and New Jersey have similar requirements, as do Vermont, Maine and Rhode Island.

International destinations are literally "all over the map" and the vast majority of those are still closed to non-essential travel. Popular countries for US travels such as France, Italy and Germany are nowhere close to relaxing entry requirements. The United Kingdom however does allow inbound travel from the US but there are severe quarantine restrictions and expensive penalties. Because Mexico does not require Covid testing to

enter, *leaving* that country requires a negative Covid test to return to the US and to most any other country. A recent ABC news report documented a US couple honeymooning in Cancun for seven nights. 72 hours before their flight back to the US they got tested, as required, in preparation for their return flight. The groom tested positive. They were forced to stay, at their own expense, an additional 10 days.

Cruises: It almost goes without saying, but based on the information above, if you can't get to the port, how can you go on a cruise? The CDC recently updated its Framework for a Conditional Sailing Order and declared no departures from any US port will be allowed until Nov 1, 2021. Royal Caribbean has announced their first departure of any of their ships will be from Israel with Cyprus and Greece on the itinerary. Again, that's great news, but how do you get there? P&O Line has also announced resumption of service, but only for UK residents. All of the following cruise lines have announced that proof of vaccination will be required when departures are eventually allowed: American Queen Steamboat, Celebrity, Crystal Cruises, NCL, Norwegian/Hurtigruten, P&O, Regent 7 Seas, Royal Caribbean, SAGA and Virgin. Holland America and Carnival are still reviewing the issue.

Tours: Ground tour operators are hoping to cash in on the pent-up travel market and you may have seen or received email ads with tag lines like "Travel with Confidence", indicating that changes and cancellations are allowed without penalty if you get your deposit in now. Buyer Beware: Be sure to read the tiny, fine print. Most of these require a deposit at the time of booking and full payment a minimum of 6 months before departure (for tours departing in 2022). Upon closer inspection, you may find that a change or cancellation within those 6 months, is generally non-refundable or, at best, a travel credit for future use is the only compensation. What is just as worrisome is the potential for some of these operators to declare bankruptcy if their 2022 season is still fraught with Covid problems.

In summary, it appears that proof of vaccination is the key to opening up the travel industry. A Vaccination Credential Initiative for US residents is currently being explored by a coalition of The Mayo Clinic, Microsoft and 225 other organizations in the private sector. Other countries, including the European Union, are pledging to release digital certificates that would allow for summer travel. Eventually, we'll find a way to make travel safe again. It can't come soon enough!

Hello again to everyone in RUAEA Land from the San Francisco East Bay. I hope you all are doing well and enjoying this lovely time of the year.

The Covid vaccine is becoming more available in CA and people 16 years of age and older can now sign up to be vaccinated. As I write this on April 7, my county, Contra Costa, has just moved to the Yellow Tier, the third of four tiers. The county next door, Alameda, moved to the Yellow Tier a week ago. More businesses are open with fewer restrictions, but masks are still required everywhere.

<u>Libraries</u> ~ Please help spread the word that libraries are open for borrowing materials, and have been for months all over the country. I recently talked to someone who did not know this! My county library calls it Front Door Service; others call it Curbside Service etc. Patrons reserve the books online, and then pick them up outside when the books come in. Another person I spoke with voiced concern about touching the books. When books are returned, they are quarantined before library staff handles them and puts them back in circulation. Some libraries have 24/7 book returns, others have specified hours. Check website for details.

And now, with things opening up even more, my county library has started "Grab and Go Service." Hooray! Patrons will be allowed in the library for an hour to return and check out items, and to browse materials. Check your library's website for hours and amount of time allowed inside the library. And check again before you go, because things are changing frequently.

Did you know that California residents can get library cards for any library in the state? I learned this in my last book club meeting. I have cards for four area libraries but thought it was just a local reciprocity agreement. The lady who shared this info is an avid reader and genealogist and has cards for 19 libraries! The rules are different in every state, so check with your local library to see what other libraries you can use. Ebooks are wonderful in that you can download the book to your device and it saves you a trip to the library.

There is something there for everyone. I have reserved two of them! Code Name Helene is based on the real-life story of socialite-spy Nancy Wake, who killed a Nazi with her bare hands and went on to become one of the most decorated women in WWII.

<u>Warning About Salmonella Outbreak Among</u>
<u>California Songbirds</u> ~ In February, The California
Department of Fish and Wildlife reported an outbreak of
salmonella, primarily on California's Central Coast, the
San Francisco Bay Area and Sierra Nevada communities.
Pine siskins, a species of finch that winters in California,
is the primary species affected by the outbreak. The disease has also been reported in smaller numbers of lesser
goldfinches and American goldfinches.

Salmonella has a high mortality rate and most birds die within 24 hours of infection. Sick birds often appear weak, have labored breathing, and may sit for prolonged periods with fluffed or ruffled feathers. Birds become infected with Salmonella when they ingest food, water or come into contact with objects (e.g., bird feeders, perches, soil) contaminated with feces from an infected bird.

Salmonellosis is almost exclusively reported from locations with bird feeders where birds congregate and are in close contact with each other. Residents can help reduce disease transmission by removing bird feeders and bird baths. Disposable gloves should be worn and hands should be thoroughly washed after disposing of dead birds, and handling of bird feeders and bird baths. Salmonella can spread to humans and pets. If you come across a dead bird, dispose of it immediately to avoid contact with other birds or household pets. State and federal wildlife agencies recommend regular cleaning of bird feeders to prevent outbreaks. They also encourage using feeders made from non-porous materials like ceramic, metal and plastic rather than wood, which can harbor bacteria and other diseases. Bird watchers can keep nectar feeders for hummingbirds out, but they also need to be cleaned regularly.

Salmonella outbreaks among pine siskins occur to a certain degree every year, but apparently this year's outbreak is particularly severe. A friend first told me of this in late February. I have left all my bird feeders empty since then, and have not put out my finch feeders at all this year. To date I have found one dead pine siskin in my front yard, which I disposed of properly.

On April 1, the CDC announced that it is investigating the salmonella outbreak, which has sickened 19 people in eight states - California, Kentucky, Mississippi, New Hampshire, Oklahoma, Oregon, Tennessee and Washington State. Those infected ranged from 2 months to 89 years of age and eight people have been hospitalized. Public health officials interviewed 13 of the people sickened with salmonella—nine owned a bird feeder, two had had contact with a "sick or dead bird", and 10 have pets that could have had contact with wild birds. Source: Axios.

The Ongoing Giraffe Rescue In Kenya ~ Slowly but surely, the eight Rothschild giraffes stranded on

Longicharo Island are being ferried across Lake Baringo to the Ruko Community Wildlife Conservancy. Conservationists the world over are heralding this rescue for many reasons. The giraffes were starving because rising waters had reduced their foraging area from 100 to 8 acres. Rothschild's (Nubian) giraffe numbers have plummeted by 80%, leaving only 3,000 in the wild today.

Relocating the giraffes has many logistical challenges. David O'Connor, president of Save Giraffes Now, calls the custom built barge an engineering marvel. The rectangular steel structure was designed and built specifically to carry tall, heavy giraffes. The barge floats atop a series of empty drums for buoyancy. Reinforced sides keep the animals from jumping out while the barge is gently maneuvered by boats. Although giraffes could swim the mile across lake Baringo, it's not an option because the lake is infested with crocodiles.

In December 2020, the first rescue was Asiwa, a female giraffe, who was stranded alone in a marshy part of the island with no food sources. Convincing the gentle giant to get on the barge was not easy. After several attempts to lure Asiwa aboard the ferry with mangoes and other treats failed, the scientists had no choice but to lightly sedate her. However, it is not the preferred method for giraffes since the change in blood pressure could damage their brains, or they could choke on their own saliva. "It's not like an elephant or a rhino where you just dart it, it flops over, and it's fine," O'Connor said. After Asiwa was sedated, the rescuers quickly guided her onto the barge. To ensure Asiwa would not panic, they covered her head with a burlap hood and put socks in her ears to block out sound. "The wonderful part was watching her gently amble off the boat once the blindfold was released as if nothing had happened," said photographer Ami Vitale who documented the rescue. "It really was a scene that could have been biblical."

The following day, a young giraffe named Pasaka was ferried away in a similar fashion. A third giraffe, a male named Lbarnoti, was rescued on January 27, 2021. However, unlike Asiwa and Pasaka, he was eager to get on the barge and munch on delicious acacia pods during the entire journey! On March 3, a fourth giraffe was successfully rescued, a female named Awala,

While the conservation team is thrilled with the fourth successful move, five more giraffes remain on the island and must be rescued soon. The ground crew has been slowly training the remaining giraffes to be comfortable on the barge, luring them on to the boat with mangoes and acacia seed pods.

This group includes Nkarikoni's calf Noelle, who was born at Christmastime and would be the youngest ever moved in this rescue operation. Young giraffes are particularly susceptible to predators, a lack of food and other dangers. About half of all giraffe calves don't live to their first birthday, and two calves on the island already have been lost. "We're thrilled Noelle is healthy

and developing nicely – she is now 7 feet tall! – but we must continue to keep her safe until she is big enough to move, which is thankfully fast approaching," said Susan Myers, the founder and CEO of Save Giraffes Now. "Once we rescue them, that's not the end of it," says O'Conner. That's actually just the beginning of trying to repopulate the entire Western Rift Valley with this type of giraffe, where they became locally extinct 70 years ago.

Tomb Of The Unknown Soldier ~ We have a very important commemorative event coming up on November 11, 2021 at 11:00 AM in Washington, D.C. - the National Commemoration of the Centennial of the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. The Commemoration will take place not only at Arlington National Cemetery but also at parks, cemeteries, military installations and at America's Rose Garden in Shreveport, Louisiana.

Several years ago, my local DAR chapter was fortunate to have a former tomb guard, known as a Sentinel, speak at our meeting. Sentinels are hand-picked. Their training is rigorous and serving as a Sentinel is a high honor. The Society of the Honor Guard is coordinating the Centennial Celebration.

On March 20, I attended a webinar presented by Robert Martin, Jr., the President of the American Rose Society (ARS), entitled "The Rose of the Unknown Soldier." Bob has written many books and hundreds of articles on roses; and has given hundreds of presentations to local societies and district meetings. He is known for his extensive rose knowledge, impeccable research, and wonderful deadpan humor. During the opening remarks, it was noted that members of The Society of the Honor Guard, ARS and DAR were in attendance. Bob was introduced by Marilyn Wellan, ARS Representative to the Centennial. The webinar was a fabulous blend of history, patriotism and rose information. It was recorded and is now available on Youtube under "American Rose Society" (not ARS) at https://www.youtube.com/watch? v=J2nuKCR4cf8.

After the webinar, I contacted Ms. Wellan for more info. Early in the planning for the Centennial, the Society of the Honor Guard contacted DAR and ARS and asked them to partner with the Guard to commemorate the Centennial. The main initiative for DAR and ARS is to encourage the creation of 'Never Forget' Gardens across the country. As DAR members and chapters become interested in creating 'Never Forget' Gardens in their home gardens or in public places such as historic cemeteries, memorial sites, military installations such as VA facilities, ARS is providing information on how to create those gardens.

Between the three organizations, there is a plethora of information, which is being updated often. You may want to bookmark their websites and check back often.

The Society of the Honor Guard website is www.tombguard.org. In the upper right, clicking on

Menu will take you to Centennial information. As you scroll down the home page, you will see "Latest News" on the left which is being updated frequently. For example, on March 18, the Oregon State Society of DAR announced that they are planning a 'Never Forget' Garden at the Southern Oregon Rehabilitation Center and Clinic in White City, OR. This will be the first such garden located at a VA facility in the US. Planting will begin in April and the site will be dedicated on Saturday, July 17<sup>th</sup>, 2021.

The ARS website is www.rose.org. Under America's Rose Garden, choose 'Never Forget Gardens.' The "Choosing Plants" document lists plants and what they symbolize. The "Recommended Roses" doc lists roses whose name relates to the mission of the Society of the Honor Guard, as well as roses recommended by ARS for their strong growth habit. The "Rose of the Unknown Soldier" PowerPoint doc is an abbreviated version of the webinar presentation of the same name. Individual gardeners are also encouraged to plant a "Never Forget' Garden or even a single rose from the suggested list. Under "Find A" is a list of local rose societies and Consulting Rosarians who can give you advice on which roses grow best in your area. Consulting Rosarians are ARS members who have passed a test and provide information free of charge as a public service.

I have no news to report so I am continuing writing about plants. As I am writing, I am looking out at my beautiful Geraniums with their faces to the sun and I believe they are smiling!

Finding food ... There is a plant called Cuscuta Pentagonia, a spindly orange plant that can grow up to three feet high. What is so unique about this plant is that it has no leaves. It lacks chlorophyll so it cannot turn



light into sugars and the oxygen so it can't carry out photosynthesis as most plants do. It gets its food from its neighbors. It is a parasitic plant. In order to live, it attaches itself to a host plant and sucks the nutrients by burrowing an appendage into the plants vascular system. The Dept. of Agriculture considers this a noxious weed, a nuisance to farmers.



The "dodder plant" as it is commonly called has very specific and refined culinary taste. As the seed grows, it moves up the stem of its host and rotates in small circles, probing the surroundings. If it happens to be near a tomato plant it will bend and grow in

that direction until it finds the tomato leaf. It will wrap itself around the stem of the tomato and into the tomato plant stem and begins siphoning off the sugars and other nutrients it needs to keep growing. As the Dodder plant thrives the tomato slowly starts to wither. It is believed they are able to determine hundreds of chemical smells given off by other plants and they grow toward it. It will also grow away from something it doesn't like. Wheat is repulsive to the plant and it will grow away from it.

As you observe the plants and all that is growing in your yard and garden, take a minute to observe them and admire them for not only being attractive and providing food but for the complexities of their survival.



Easter had such beautiful weather this year, I heard about many getting together with their children, grand-children, and great grandchildren. A few ladies had tears in their eyes because they got to see the kiddies they haven't seen in almost a year. They had many holidays to celebrate on that one day. A couple of months ago, I mentioned how our grammar and vocabulary is getting lost on the young. I had to talk to a health professional last week for some services. My Catholic nuns would be cracking knuckles every day with their notorious rulers. Forget politics, we'll be ruined by bad grammar and spelling!

My cousin, Michelle, is a professor of Leadership at Northwestern University. She also writes a column for an OpEd Project with the school. She can write about any subject she wishes.

Her topic last month was, looking at the pandemic from the point of view of the old and very young. Her mom, my aunt Gen is in a retirement home in Chicago. She suffers from dementia and failing health. Michelle gets to visit her once a week, bring flowers, and lattes, they sit and pass the time talking, or just sitting. Anyone who has been through this will understand.

I'm going to print it as she wrote it. "The most poignant moments of this past year for me have been not being able to hug those loved ones who don't understand why we can't hug: my now 88 year old mother with advanced dementia, and my now 18 month old stepgranddaughter. My loved ones at the bookends of life, they don't understand the pandemic or have the language to discuss it. But they do still want to hug. Before the lockdown began, my husband and I were six months into loving, holding and hugging our little Emiliana. Once the lockdown began, we had masked visits with social distancing, no touching, no hugs. Since then, we've had our shots, we've had visits, with hugs, with masks, and look forward to a time when she can see us, and our smiles, without them.

Then there's my mother, with whom I have an extraordinary bond. Over the past 19 years of her signifi-

cant medical issues, I vowed I would always be there for her. And then the pandemic came. She lives in skilled nursing, so I was not able to see her for a long time. Because of her dementia, she hasn't used a phone for about four years. We tried video visits, but it was hard for her to grasp. Being in her room for over a year, with no social activities or communal dining, has kept her physically safe, but doesn't help cognitive decline. Last summer, I had the joy of outdoor visits. Masked, at least six feet apart, for 30 minutes. I could be there to see her eyes light up when she saw me, but I couldn't touch her. The hardest moments were when she stretched out her arms to me and said, 'Why won't you come to me?' Trying to explain pandemic, safe distance, etc. felt hollow, knowing it didn't make sense to her. I could see the confusion and pain on her face, that I wouldn't come closer to her. I didn't want her to see me cry, so I held back my tears 'till I left then wept in my car. Just recently, I was able to see Mom in her room, and touch her, for the first time in almost a year. I brought flowers and lattes, she smiled. I took her hand in mine, and she put her other hand on top. My mother, who as a journalist, was a woman of words, doesn't talk much these days, but our hands together spoke volumes. Sometimes you don't need words, if you can be present, and if you can touch."

I wanted you to read Michelle's story, it's something that so many of us have been going through this year, in various degrees. This has been an awful experience for all of us, I always felt so sad for the couples that couldn't see each other before one of them passed away. That was just cruel on the part of the hospitals or homes. What difference would 10 minutes make to say goodbye to a loved one, who didn't have Covid. Not for me to say, but sorry if you had to endure that.

Also gone from our world are Roger Mudd, NBC, Marvelous Marvin Hagler, boxer, Elgin Baylor, basketball player, G. Gordon Liddy, authors, Beverly Cleary and Larry McMurtry, actors Jessica Walthers, Yaphet Kotto, Paul Ritter, gorgeous George Segal, James Levine from the Met, designer Elsa Peretti, Chicago's own Bill Campbell, Channel 7 reporter, and Mike Hamernik, Channel 9 weatherman.



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# The Writers' Column ~ UAL Operation Into The Vietnam War By Dick Wicklund ~ SFOMM Retired

don't recall the UA Historical Foundation issuing past articles regarding UAL flying support into the Vietnam War. Attached are photos of the first arrival flown into Saigon and I thought it well to pass on the remembrance.

At an early date after the war started, I took a trip to Vietnam. The destination was by flying the first of a DC-8F cargo to supply at Saigon. Going en route, we first stopped at Clark Air Force Base (CAB) in the Philippines. Then shortly later MAC extended a firmed up contract with UAL. This then started regular flights to CAB, Vietnam or other local regions. To ensure flight reliability in these foreign areas, the company placed maintenance reps to all of these locations. Then the first person to stay at CAB was from SFOMM, Chuck Woodfall. After he stayed awhile, he returned home and I then went back to CAB and stayed there for a period of time. Soon afterwards a number of maintenance staff from SFO made it to CAB and then each one would fly a trip into Vietnam or some other region. Some of those that I remembered were Charlie Edwards, Bill Hale, Jim Siciliano, Clarence Siem, and Mike Takamatsu. Also, I remember for managing the station at CAB was Claude Yeo from LAX Air Freight. After the early 1960's a major Army buildup occurred adding DC-8 passenger type aircraft for







sending combat troops. Our missions then made it into some dangerous air force bases. One particular hotspot flown in was Bien Hoa AFB, with Viet Cong in the area. Their attacks from close by distance was common at times, we heard gunfire on occasion. I think it was very commendable to all this crew in their devotion during our time of danger. Commendations should also be awarded to the UAL men and women who flew into this wartime environment. These flight crews provided excellent UAL service flying into Vietnam with many Army troops going both in and out. My apology is for many of the flight crew people that I know I have failed to name in this article. Also, I should have mentioned the service of the now long past Flight Engineers & Navigators. They were there for every flight in these past overseas operations.

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
