The Writer's Column "An Airline Story" by Jack Ferrell

It was 1982, and I was flying with United Airlines as a Junior Boeing 737 Captain out of Cleveland Hopkins International Airport. It was the month of April and spring was in the air. I had been awarded a Reserve Line for April, and had flown one trip on April 4th. It was a "Deadhead" to Orlando, and I flew the trip back to Cleveland that night, arriving at the gate at Cleveland Hopkins Airport, 10 minutes before midnight.

The next morning I was on call for any Reserve flights, but no flights were open. My RDO (Reserve Days Off) started on April 7th; I had a condominium on Lake Erie in Lakewood, Ohio, and stood by my pager for any open flights that might come up before my days off began. I could only legally fly a two-day trip, so that excluded any three-day trips that were available.

Early in the morning on April 7th, I obtained a jump seat to go to Athens, Tennessee (my home) to enjoy my two days off. I was supposed to be available on the morning of April 9th for any flights that might need a Captain.

My two days off were wonderful. On April 8th, I called the Cleveland Crew Desk and asked them what would be available the next morning. The Crewman told me that there was nothing open, and I was number 5 on the Reserve List. After receiving this information, I told my wife Sue that I was way down the list and probably wouldn't be called for a couple of days. I decided to just go back the next morning and for the evening, I planned to enjoy a steak dinner with my wife, and listen to my daughter Mary who was a disc jockey on the local radio station, WJSQ.

It was a wonderful and very enjoyable evening until the telephone rang at 9:30 pm. It was the Cleveland Crew Desk telling me that I was assigned a trip that left the next morning out of Cleveland at 9:00am. I asked the crew desk about being number 5 on the list. He said that he called the other four, and they weren't available. I said OK and hung up.

Now, how was I going to get to Cleveland at one hour before flight time? At 8 pm, I got on the phone to Delta. Nothing was available there. I only had <u>one</u> option and that is to drive to Cleveland. I hurried, got into my airline uniform; there was no time to pack a bag. I started out in my old 1974 Chrysler and headed North to Cleveland, Ohio.

I knew that every minute was critical. Even stopping for gas was cutting into my final destination time. Luckily, the old Chrysler had a full tank of gas, and even though it was a thirsty big car, I would only have to stop once for gas. The weather was misty and the temperature was 43 degrees. As I headed forward Knoxville, all was well. I kept on 1-75 to Cincinnati, and noticed that the mist was turning into light rain, and one of the bank buildings had 34 degrees on the lighted sign. Still, everything was going very well until I entered the outskirts of Columbus, Ohio. I noticed that the temperature was 32 degrees and I could see there were some snow flakes mixed with the light rain.

It was now 5am in the morning. My timing was still good. I transitioned to 1-71 after Columbus, and the highway was starting to get a coat of snow on it. I could feel a little slipping every once in a while. Traffic was starting to increase, and everything was slowing down. I still had a good two hours to go to make my check in time of 8am.

As I kept driving, the slight hint of daylight was gradually giving me a little better view of the road, and it wasn't pretty; it was getting pretty well covered with snow. I saw a pay phone so I exited the highway and called the Crew Desk to tell them that I would probably be a little late. I asked them to have the Co-Pilot, Jim **Tight** check the weather and sign the flight release papers for me. I jumped back into the old Chrysler and kept it going as fast as traffic allowed. I finally reached the outskirts of Cleveland, and headed for Cleveland Hopkins Airport. I pulled into the employee parking lot at 8:35am. I saw the crew bus just coming back from the Terminal building, and jumped out of the car to stop the bus. Luckily, Dolly was driving the crew bus, and I asked Dolly to wait for me while I parked and ran inside Dispatch to get my flight bag. She did and I hurried, got my flight bag, jumped on the bus and Dolly floorboarded the crew bus to get to the Terminal. We arrived at the Terminal at 8:52am. I rushed to see what gate that Flight 391 to Chicago, and it was on Gate 44. I ran to the gate, squeezed between a couple of passengers, ran into the cockpit, threw my flight bag into the left side of the Captain's seat, said "Hello" to Jim and Second Officer Fred Marks. I put on my headset, and just then, the mechanic from below called, "Brakes Off! Are we clear for push back?" Jim called Ground Control for push back clearance, and I relayed to the mechanic "Brakes Off! Clear for Push Back!" The brakes were released at exactly 9:00am for an On Time Departure signal to Dispatch.

We read the check list on the push back. I told Jim, "your leg!" Jim was all set and did a beautiful job of flying us to Chicago O'Hare. The next leg was to Denver, which I flew, and then to Lincoln, Nebraska for a layover. I had no suitcase, but did have a razor in my flight bag. I slept in my underwear, and wore the same shirt and underwear for the two-day trip.

We arrived back in Cleveland on April 10th and I was ready to go to my condo, and have a good shower and a change of clothes.

A very memorable airline trip that I shall never forget!

<u>Turning Carbon Dioxide into Sustainable Fuel</u> <u>March 28, 2022</u>



United Airlines Ventures (UAV) and Oxy Low Carbon Ventures (OLCV) today announced a collaboration with Houston-based biotech firm Cemvita Factory to commercial-

ize the production of sustainable aviation fuel (SAF) intended to be developed through a revolutionary new process using carbon dioxide (CO2) and synthetic microbes. UAV also announced an equity investment in Cemvita Factory. OLCV, a subsidiary of Occidental (Oxy), is a founding investor in Cemvita Factory.

SAF is an alternative to jet fuel that uses nonpetroleum feedstock and offers lower lifecycle greenhouse gas emissions. United has invested in more SAF production than any other airline.

"At United, we have been consistent in leading the airline industry with bold action when it comes to fighting climate change – that starts with building an ecosystem around companies like Cemvita Factory to create and commercialize new SAF technologies," said Michael Leskinen, President of United Airlines Ventures. "This is truly a global imperative, and this cooperation with Oxy Low Carbon Ventures reflects our dedication to building relationships across sectors and working with companies aligned with our sustainability goals."

United and OLCV have previously worked together on new approaches to combat climate change. Together, UAV and OLCV will fund development work at Cemvita to convert carbon dioxide into hydrocarbons for SAF. If performance targets are achieved, UAV and OLCV plan to form a joint venture to commercialize the technology. This includes funding projects such as pilot and demo plants, engineering studies, financing construction and operating SAF plants.

"The use of SAF is a promising approach that we believe can significantly reduce global emissions from aviation and further decarbonization initiatives to combat climate change," said Richard Jackson, President, Operations, U.S. Onshore Resources and Carbon Management, Oxy. "We are eager to collaborate with United and Cemvita to accelerate SAF innovation to reach commercial scale."

Today's announcement makes Cemvita the third SAF-related technology to receive an investment from UAV. Launched in 2021, UAV targets startups, upcoming technologies, and sustainability concepts that will complement United's goal of net zero emissions by 2050 – without relying on traditional carbon offsets. United has aggressively pursued strategic investments in SAF producers and revolutionary technologies including carbon capture, hydrogen-electric engines, electric regional aircraft, and urban air mobility. SAF has the potential to deliver the performance of petroleum-based jet fuel but with a fraction of its carbon footprint on a lifecycle basis. Cemvita Factory uses synthetic biology to turn carbon dioxide into chemicals and alternative fuels, including sustainable aviation fuel. Cemvita is among the first to employ this technology to support heavy industry decarbonization and, find ways to use microbiology to turn carbon dioxide into fuel.

"Cemvita Factory is delighted to team up with United and Oxy for this exciting development," says Moji Karimi, co-founder and CEO of Cemvita. "We commend United Airlines for being a leader in the airline industry's decarbonization efforts and are proud to work once again with OLCV to provide these solutions on a broader scale."

United's 100% green commitment



Here are some of the ways United plans to make sustainability the new standard in flight:

In December, United purchased an equity stake in hydrogen-electric engine developer ZeroAvia, becoming the largest airline to invest in zero-

emission engines for regional aircraft.

- ▲ In December, United became the first in aviation history to fly an aircraft full of passengers using 100% sustainable aviation fuel.
- ▲ In September 2021, United agreed to purchase 5 billion gallons of SAF paired with an investment in Alder Fuels enough to fly more than 57 million passengers.

- ▲ United is also an investor in Fulcrum Bio-Energy, where United has an option to purchase up to 900 million gallons of SAF.
- ▲ In July 2021, United announced that along with Breakthrough Energy Ventures and Mesa Airlines, it invested in electric aircraft startup Heart Aerospace. Heart Aerospace is developing the ES-19, a 19-seat electric aircraft that has the potential to fly customers with zero emissions when powered by renewable electricity.
- ▲ In July 2021, Air Transport World magazine named United its Eco-Airline of the Year for the third time
- ▲ In February 2021, United announced an agreement to work with Archer Aviation to accelerate the development and production of their electric aircraft an urban mobility solution that has the potential to serve as an 'air taxi', giving United customers another opportunity to reduce their carbon footprint before they even board a United flight.
- ▲ In 2020, United became the first airline to announce a commitment to invest in 1PointFive's direct air capture, a carbon capture and sequestration technology. United remains committed to investing in carbon capture and sequestration as a key pathway to achieving its climate goals.
- ▲ In 2019, United operated the Flight for the Planet, which represented the most-eco-friendly commercial flight of its kind in the history of commercial aviation.
- ▲ In 2018, United became the first U.S. airline to commit to reducing its GHG emissions, by 50% by 2050. This goal has since been superseded by the airline's 100% green net zero commitment.
- ▲ In 2016, United became the first airline globally to use SAF in regular operations on a continuous basis with SAF from World Energy.

<u>Torgy's Travel Tips – May 2022</u> <u>Passwords, Masks and Onboard Purchases</u>



In keeping with other major companies regarding computer security, United has recently changed the structure and frequency of password changes necessary to access FlyingTogether. And this time, it's pretty good news! For at least the last decade, we've had to change our password every 90 days and we could not re-use old pass-

words until 5 cycles of changes had occurred. Now, we have the opportunity to keep a password for 365 days a whole year—as long as we create a hard-to-hack phrase or sentence. For example, "He ate 7 bananas" or "My 1st trip was to Maui" or "Just me and my 2 dogs". The only parameters are a minimum of 8 characters, upper and lower case letters, numbers or symbols, and no more than 142 characters including the spaces. Research has shown that password phrases and sentences are much more difficult and time-consuming for hackers to bother with. So, think about a phrase you and partner frequently use or your quote from a favorite movie. Make it something easy and natural for you to remember. Then, either wait till your current password expires and you are forced to create a new one, or, do it now by signing on with u+file number, but don't type your password. Instead, click the "Forgot My Password" link on the line below. That will take you to a new screen explaining this new password process. And you won't have to do it again for a whole year. Yeah!

Another move to simplify UA onboard food and beverage purchases has been recently enhanced. The elimination of onboard cash transactions vanished quite some time ago but now even last-second onboard credit card purchases must be "contact-less". So what is taking the place of cash and plastic? Travelers must store a valid credit or debit card in their United Wallet, accessible inside united.com. For customers who do not do this there will be a reminder screen during check-in where a credit/debit card can be "attached" to that days' flight record. The card number entered at check-in will disappear after 24 hours unlike the forms of payment which reside in the United Wallet. A further enhancement involves the vendor PayPal. United now offers the opportunity for PayPal users to create a unique QR code within their PayPal account. This enables the user to simply show the OR code to the flight attendant who will scan the code. I am still awaiting confirmation from UA headquarters whether the 20% discount on food and beverage purchases we previously enjoyed as employees and retirees will continue within this new framework. Stay tuned ... "The Times They Are A-Changin'!

As Covid-19 facemask policies change in most states, it is important for travelers to keep abreast of regulations in air travel. As of this writing, the current policy requiring the use of facemasks onboard all aircraft operating inside the US is still in effect until April 18, 2022. It may or may not be extended. However, international travel is quite a different matter. Not only are facemasks definitely required, but those masks must be a N95, KN95 or the European equivalent FFP2 for travel to/from/within Europe. Cloth masks are not allowed, nor are masks that contain vent holes. But some foreign flag carriers have begun flaunting their own

country's mandates. As recently as March 24, 2022, Jet2 (a British low-cost carrier), rescinded their enforcement of the mandate and Virgin Atlantic and British Airways have indicated their desire to follow suit. KLM's website indicates that masks are required but have quietly stopped enforcing it onboard, according to the Washington Post. I recently purchased a ticket on both KLM and Condor Airlines and both included a "mask required" statement in my confirmation email. So, do check before you head to the airport to see if you are properly prepared to meet the stated rules.

And hot off the press as this article was written is the announcement of a new United warm weather international destination: Palma de Mallorca, Spain! Seasonal service is expected between EWR-PMI on June 3, 2022 through October 2022, and perhaps beyond that date. The island of Mallorca, part of the Balearic Islands belonging to Spain, is located in the Mediterranean Sea, southeast of Barcelona. It is a destination for many vacation travelers from the UK, Germany, France and Italy. What fun to add a new destination to our bucket list. Travel on!



Charity Navigator gives them a perfect score of 100 for Finance and Accountability. Per their website, "the Troopons program is a highly innovative program that enhances the well-being of overseas military families by

providing food and non-food manufacturer coupons to stretch their hard-earned pay." According to Feeding America, an estimated 160,000 military families experienced difficulty putting food on the table in 2020. Troops in junior enlisted ranks are especially vulnerable to food insecurity — almost 30% need help.

I would like to ask all of you to cut out coupons and mail them to me. This is such an easy thing to do to support our troops. If you are scissors impaired, ask your grandkids to help! For the price of a first class stamp, you can get about 90 coupons in an envelope. The coupons have to say Manufacturer's Coupon. The collected coupons are then distributed to overseas military personnel for use in their commissaries. The commissaries honor them for six months after the published expiration date. In my area, the coupons come in Tuesday's mail along with the supermarket ads, and then in the Sunday paper. I can't wait to see how many coupons you all send me (to address above). People on Facebook are posting their scores and the comments are often as much fun to read as playing the game itself. Recently, the word of the day was trope. For the first time, the solution was a word I had never heard of, and neither had most people. Some of the printable comments were "not fair" and "what the heck is trope?" The unprintable comments were hilarious but cannot be included here.

Brendon Grimshaw: One man's environmental miracle ~ The Seychelles is an archipelago in the Indian Ocean off East Africa. Seychelles was uninhabited prior to being discovered by Europeans in the 16th century. It faced competing French and British interests until coming under full British control in the late 18th century. Since proclaiming independence from the United Kingdom in 1976, it has developed from a largely agricultural society to a market-based diversified economy.

The Constitution of Seychelles lists 155 named islands, and a further 7 reclaimed islands have been created subsequent to the publication of the Constitution. The majority of the islands are uninhabited. The islands are either granitic or coralline and are home to numerous beaches, coral reefs and nature reserves, as well as rare animals such as giant Aldabra tortoises.

Seychelles is among the world's leading countries to protect lands for threatened species, allocating 42% of its territory for conservation. Like many fragile island ecosystems, Seychelles saw the loss of biodiversity when humans first settled in the area, including the disappearance of most of the giant tortoises from the granitic islands, the felling of coastal and mid-level forests, and the extinction of various species. In the 1960's, the use of spear guns and dynamite for fishing was banned through the efforts of local conservationists. As a result, the wildlife is unafraid of snorkelers and divers. Coral bleaching in 1998 damaged most reefs, but some reefs, such as Silhouette Island, now show healthy recovery.

Moyenne Island is a small island of only 24 acres just off the coast of the larger island of Mahe. From 1915 until 1962, the island was abandoned. At the time, Brendon Grimshaw was a newspaper editor working in Nairobi, Kenya. While on vacation in1962, he visited Moyenne Island and fell in love with it on the spot. Grimshaw purchased the island for £8,000 (about 10,000 dollars). After retiring from the newspaper business in 1972, he moved to Moyenne Island and was the sole inhabitant of the island until his death in July 2012, just three weeks short of his 87th birthday. The island was bare when Brendon first arrived – a waterless land overgrown with scrub. He hired Rene Lafortune to help him with his first goal, to make the island habitable. His house was built in seven days, but for 18 months, he and Rene would have to row every day to Mahe to collect a barrel of water for sustenance. Grimshaw and Rene planted sixteen thousand trees - palms, bread, and coconut – until the island was transformed into a tropical paradise. They built 3 miles of nature paths, and brought and bred Aldabra giant tortoises, intending to create an island of incredible beauty. When he arrived there were no birds on the island, so he brought ten from a neighboring island - which promptly flew straight back. He brought a few more, which also disappeared. But then a couple returned. Brendon started feeding them, and more birds settled on the island.

Slowly the trees grew and fruited, and eventually water, electricity and a phone cable were piped across from Mahe.

At this point Brendon was not doing this to make the island into a national park; it was simply to make the island habitable for himself. This might have been accidental conservation, but while the rest of us have been busy concreting over our front gardens, Brendon was creating a second Eden. Moyenne now holds more than two-thirds of all endemic plants in the Seychelles.

In 1996, Grimshaw wrote a book about himself and the island, entitled A Grain of Sand: the Story of One Man and an Island.

Rene died from cerebral malaria while on a visit to Singapore in 2007. The tortoises and several pet dogs became Brendon's sole companions. A reporter asked him if he's ever been lonely. Brendon is not a recluse. He relishes visitors and company, and regrets not marrying.

He replied, "Yes, only once in my life – when I was living in a bedsit in London. I was miserable then, but never here. But how could I ask anyone to live out here? We didn't have running water for years!"

In 2010, an American hotel group offered Grimshaw \$50M in order to build a hotel on Moyenne and turn the place into a rich man's playground. He rejected the offer. Shortly before his death from natural causes, he donated his island paradise to the government of The Seychelles for use as a sanctuary/ heritage site. Grimshaw died in Victoria, on the island of Mahe, in July 2012.

In 2013, after 20 years of persistence, Grimshaw and Rene Lafortune posthumously achieved their goal of making Moyenne Island a National Park. It's the smallest National Park in the world. A warden was posted on the island to collect the entrance fee from tourists. Today, the island's main industry is tourism and it is known for its beaches. The restaurant on the beach is a haven for tourists. Behind the restaurant is the local warden's house.

Those of you who knew him remember the classic Model-T Ford he and his wife, **Marie**, owned. They toodled around town – he, dressed in his tux, ascot tie, and top hat – and she in her period dress with large bonnet and a lovely bow tied beneath her chin. Marie passed away on January 16, 2022, she was 107 plus years old (young!) Both she and Milt were local Californians; she was born on a dairy ranch in Pomponia which is in the Half Moon Bay/



Pescadero area on Highway 1. In order for the local school to stay open, she had to start school and the age of 4 and she walked through fields of fava beans trying to avoid the snakes along the way. While at Pescadero High School she met a young man who was rude and considered him a bully. Time went by and at a Valentines' Day party they met again and Marie was very much impressed with the fact that he won the relay race pushing a peanut across the floor with his nose. Thus an 83 year romance started – they were married for 76 years. They loved to travel; she made her hats and all her costumes for their square dancing events and played tennis up to her 93rd birthday. She was the first to go to college, getting her teaching credentials from San Jose University. She taught for 36 years, first in the one-room schoolhouse she attended as a child, she was teacher, principal and janitor plus having to purify the water they drank. In 1951 she taught at Beresford Park School in San Mateo enriching her students with field trips, publishing student stories and poetry and planning large-scale art projects. Two permanent clay art pieces made by her students are installed at that school. Milt & Marie had a daughter, Kristeen who was born in 1944. They spent their summers in La Honda swimming and putting on plays for the locals. She retired in 1975 from teaching. Along came her granddaughter, Shaleece in 1975 and grandson, Brent in 1979 – she loved being grandmother (don't we all?) They lived an exciting retirement life especially their car club trips and being around their friends. When Milt passed away, Marie went into a loving care home until she passed away in January 2022. her daughter, Karen, who we now consider a full time member of our chapter.





We'll see. My plan is to do the labor myself. It's going to be my hobby project to use my United Airlines Aircraft Mechanic and Aircraft Inspection skills. 



Our own Lilly Kodama (SEAMD) was featured in an excellent tribute by the Seattle Times newspaper on Sunday, March 27th. The paper dedicated the front page and several additional pages to the 80th anniversary of infamous Executive Order 9066 of 1942 that removed "all people on the West Coast deemed to be a threat to national security". Implied in that order, but not specifically spelled out, were the words: Japanese Americans. Lilly was 7 yrs old when her family was forced to leave their home and thriving business in Bainbridge Island, Washington with only 6 days advance notice. She and 227 others were forcibly escorted by US Army soldiers to walk onto a ferry to Seattle, with only the possessions they could carry. From there, they again walked to the train station under guard and boarded a train with all windows obscured for the long journey to California for incarceration at Manzanar War Relocation Center. There will be much more on Lilly and her memories in the next Contrails that **John Haferbecker** is putting together. It is a sobering story and we are so grateful that Lilly grew into the nurse and wonderful woman that she is. Many of us had personal contact with Lilly whenever we needed to go to Medical at UAL. Always kind, gentle, efficient and smiling – that's our 87 yr. old **Lilly Kitamoto Kodama**!


"Preserving the Past, Inspiring the Future"

From the book "Flying MacArthur to Victory" By Weldon E. (Dusty) Rhoades



"Dusty" Rhoades was General Douglas MacArthur's personal pilot from late 1944 through 1945. Following the War, he was instrumental in setting-up the system of Air Traffic Control used today.

He retired in 1971 with the title of Vice-President Engineering following a long career with United Airlines.



The book is the diary of Rhoades. Realizing his part in the War effort as a civilian pilot for the Air Transport Command (ATC) would keep him away from home he began his diary, never meant for publication, but intended as a memento for his infant children who spent their infant years separated from their father.

Rhoads' days as a Transport Pilot ended when he had the unusual assignment of personally delivering documents marked

"For MacArthur's Eyes Only".

As the documents changed hands on October 9, 1943 in Brisbane, Australia, the General began a conversation that ended with the astonished airman being invited to become an Army Officer and the Personal Pilot of the Pacific Theater's Commander in Chief.

From that day until his discharge from active duty in January, 1946, Rhoades not only had a front-row seat for dramatic confrontations and discussions between MacArthur and his Chief of Staff, General Richard K. Sutherland, but also witnessed their behavior in the private shadow of their awesome responsibilities.
