#### Message from Oscar: Q1 performance

Dear Team,

On April 20, United <u>reported</u> the company's first-quarter 2016 performance. We delivered very strong financial and operating results and I wanted to take this opportunity to congratulate all of you and share some highlights.

For the first quarter, we recorded a pre-tax profit of \$688 million excluding special items, our eighth con-



secutive quarter of profitability and our highest firstquarter pre-tax profit ever. At the same time, we achieved diluted earnings per share of \$1.23, excluding special items, an approximately 30 percent increase versus last year when adjust-

ing for taxes - an achievement that exceeded Wall Street's expectations.

However, sometimes numbers - even great ones - can be a bit impersonal. But two numbers from our performance in the first quarter are extremely personal because they reflect the strides we are making together.

First, our customer satisfaction score over the first three months of 2016 was the highest in our combined company history. That's a number we can all be incredibly proud of. Equally impressive was United's mainline on-time performance of 71.9 percent for the quarter - a new record for the combined company.

Together, these accomplishments demonstrate the unmatched professionalism and passion all of you are bringing to the airline each and every day, and I thank you.

As I travel around the system, I see - and more importantly feel - this renewed energy and excitement. And clearly our customers are starting to experience it, too. Let me share a few other recent numbers and highlights that we can celebrate:

- Our best quarterly mishandled bag rate since the merger.
- ❖ Employees earned approximately \$30 million for achieving our operational goals.
- Ratified agreements with more than half of represented employees pilots, dispatchers and IAM-represented employees.
- ❖ Further modernization to our fleet with the order of 65 737-700s.
- ❖ And the announcement of two new international routes: service between San Francisco and Hangzhou, China, as well as San Francisco and Singapore the longest flight by distance operated by any U.S. carrier.

What do all of these numbers add up to? A very solid quarter and positive momentum that is firmly positioning us for even greater success in the future. This kind of success can only be achieved when we are all working together as a team, and I am certain that our shared purpose focused on running a great airline and taking care of each other and our customers will continue to accelerate United's path forward.

There is a good possibility that the retiree enrollment period will occur earlier in the year, although a date has not been decided yet. Ken also believes that the headquarters benefits presenters appearing at the September convention in Seattle will be attuned to the concerns of retirees and will focus their presentations accordingly.

#### In-seat power now on all domestic 777s



UAL has installed in-seat power outlets in all rows of its domestic Boeing 777s, so customers on long flights such as those to and from Hawaii can use their personal devices to enjoy

the Wi-Fi, streaming entertainment and other media without worrying about depleted batteries.

United now offers in-seat power in most of its mainline aircraft, with installations continuing on Airbus A319s and A320s. The domestic 777s are undergoing complete interior renovations starting this year but United didn't want to wait for those renovations to offer power on those aircraft, which has been requested by many customers. Senior Project Engineer Keith Shackelford said United found a cost-effective and efficient way to add the power lines and outlets under the existing seating, making it possible for United to proceed without waiting for the new seating sets and their incorporated power systems.

#### So Simple By Sheryl



Spring is upon us and it's time to think of refreshing desserts. I have friends that have made Key Lime Pie for years, but have switched to my recipe after eating this. It is simple and delicious. If you want to make the recipe even simpler you can purchase a premade graham cracker crust. Enjoy!

#### EASY KEY LIME PIE

- 1 14-ounce can sweetened condensed milk
- 1 6-ounce can frozen limeade concentrate (not thawed)
  - 1 cup heavy cream
  - 1 graham cracker piecrust
  - Zest of 1 lime

Place the condensed milk, limeade concentrate, and cream in a bowl and beat with electric mixer until fluffy and soft peaks form.

Pour the filling into the piecrust and smooth the top. Refrigerate until chilled and loosely set, at least 4 hours and up to overnight.

Sprinkle the pie with the zest before serving.





Two years later, he was promoted to Operations Agent. United Air Lines acquired Capital in 1961. Mike worked as a Weather Clerk for about a year. United then established a Crew Scheduling Function (in EWR). Mike applied, got the job, and was in that position until April of 1967. In that year, he applied for and got the position of Systems Operations Crew Scheduler in EXO. In September of 1972, Mike was asked to take a Crew Scheduling Supervisor's position at ORD. He accepted, but was in that position for only a few months. Back to EXO in January of 1973 in the same job he had before (System Crew Scheduler). A Supervisory Position opened in LAX in early 1974. Once again, Mike applied for and was successful. He moved to Los Angeles in April, and until September of 1980, was Supervisor of Pilot Crew Scheduling & Dispatch.

In 1980, United centralized the Crew Scheduling function, and moved it back to EXO. United made a lucrative offer to return. Mike enjoyed working in the field, so much that he decided to stay put. He accepted a position as Flight Attendant Crew Scheduler in LAX where he remained until his retirement on April 1<sup>st</sup>, 1996 - 38 years, 8 months!

Mike has a private Pilot's License and has several hundred hours of flight time. In 1966, he had applied to UAL for a Flight Officer position, but had just turned 28, and didn't have a college degree. As he says, "My results were not favorable". He also applied to Mohawk, Trans Texas, Southern, and Piedmont, all without success. They were interested, but the Viet Nam War was getting pretty intense, and the thought of low level flying dropping pamphlets and supplies over Cambodia and Laos quickly lost its luster. Mike says, "Even at 78, I have the urge to fly. If I ever hit the Lotto, I'll definitely buy an airplane. I guess I better buy a ticket."

A luncheon was held at Cinzetti's restaurant on April 13<sup>th</sup> and was attended by 40 people. It also happened to be **Yumi Trujillo**'s birthday. **Joanne** (DENMM & DENCS) & **Bob Ewing** from Montrose, Colorado attended. They brought **Wayne Miller** (DENMM) with them. She worked in Customer Service and Aircraft Maintenance and knew quite a few of the people.

President **Don Burbank** opened the meeting after lunch and announced that he had parking passes for members that attend the monthly breakfast at TK. Regarding the Mechanics contract, he noted that the union has asked the members to fill out a survey to determine exactly what they want so the union will have a good idea of what is important to them. The National Mediation Board has asked the union to get together a good solid package of what they want, cost it out and present it to the company on the 15th of May. If the mechanics are on board, the NMB will schedule talks forward from that point. He said that despite the delay in the contract that the Denver mechanics are doing a superb job and there is no unrest due to the negotiations. There are about 40 aircraft that are now using the electronic log book.

President Burbank thanked Mario for joining us and for the information he provided. Don also thanked **Tom** & Nancy Goodyear again for their service as officers of the chapter for 17 years. Laura Coats was not there but her service of 10 years is also appreciated. have an idea of what went on back then. A lot of people didn't make it fighting for our freedom so we can do what we do right now. It is Very important for the kids to see. There was some discussion about the Train to DIA. The fare is \$4.50 if you are over 65. That fare is good for a round trip on the same day. Returning on another day is another \$4.50. That fare is from anywhere in Denver wherever you pick up the train. **Sharon Burbank** (IADCS) noted that Marv Berryman (DENTK) made the trip on inaugural day and took a lot of pictures that are available on Flickr or Facebook. Sharon also posted a link on the Denver Mile Highers Facebook page. The escalators at the airport are very steep so be careful. It drops you off at the TSA level so you have to carry your luggage up another floor if you are going to check baggage. There is no baggage drop at the lower level after exiting the train.

Virgil Gooselaw related that he is going to Ft. Bragg, NC for a biannual reunion with the troopers he was involved with back in the 50's. "There are only about nine of us left now." A really good luncheon and met a lot of nice people. 10-15 members of RUPA are going out to see the B17 today. One of the pilots was actually a pilot of a B17 during the war.



large space to the story. Front-page stories were carried in most of the cities on the Main Line. Editorial comment was extremely favorable.

Despite the high price tag of \$175 million for the 30 jets ordered by United, the planes will be more economical than the current piston-engine planes.

United's President W. A. Patterson said: "In sched-



The above full-scale DC-8 mock-up is complete with chairs, floor covering and interior finish. The company is proceeding to install a complete cargo and baggage compartment and the simulated jet will be used during the next several years to test various phases of inflight and ground service preparatory to scheduled operations in 1959. United officials believe this is the first time in history that an airline has constructed a mock-up of an airplane several years in advance of its intended delivery.

United's work is centered in San Francisco where the company has its engineering headquarters and where it has built a complete jet fuselage which figured in the evaluation of present and available jetliners which led to the DC-8 order. It will continue to be used in developing all aspects of cabin interior arrangement.

United continued its aggressive program with the Douglas Aircraft Company to make the DC-8 the finest aircraft yet conceived. Douglas, of course, is bringing into play all its long experience in the design and production of commercial airliners which have become famous all over the world.

United's leadership in being the first domestic airline to announce a contract for jetliners (October 25, 1955) met with a strong response from patrons and the general public throughout the country.

Sales managers and station managers all along the Main Line said that customers were expressing an enthusiastic and gratifying interest in the company's plans to establish jetliner service by 1959. As a matter of fact, one request for a reservation on the first DC-8 schedule already has been received.

The nation's press reflected the general public's interest in United's order. Both *Time* and *Newsweek* gave

uled operation a fleet of 42 DC-7s produce 853,000 passenger seat miles per hour. By contrast 25 jet planes will produce 1,840,000 seat miles per hour. The jet's cost of operation will be about 13 to 14 percent less than the DC-7". "We will be getting much greater efficiency, dependability and much more traffic because of the jet's speed."

#### Boeing Museum of Flight - \$38.00 P/P

Tour # 1 operates on Wednesday, September 21, 2016 – 1:00 p.m. – 5:00 p.m.

The year 2016 marks the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Boeing Company and its historic contributions to this century of aviation history. The Museum of Flight is a showcase for this history that includes United because the company was part of Boeing for a short period almost 90 years ago. The museum collection includes a number of historic United airplanes including a Varney 1928 Swallow, a replica of a Boeing/United Transport Model 40A, a restored United Boeing Transport Model 80, and a United Boeing 247. Another historic airplane in the collection is the first B727, United's N7001U, which made its final flight to the museum in March of this year. A highlight of the tour will be the new, immense 3-acre Aviation Pavilion that is to open June 25, that houses 19 of the museum's most significant aircraft. The museum offers something for every airplane or space enthusiast, from the Caproni 20, the world's first fighter plane, to the record setting Concorde, the original Air Force One, and the Space Shuttle Trainer. Transportation will be on school buses as the museum is a short distance from the hotel. Tour includes transportation and admission to the museum.

#### Mount Rainier - \$99.00 P/P

In the Flight Restoration Center aircraft are brought in for a thorough evaluation to determine the work needed. Some of the recent restorations are a de Havilland DH.106 4C Comet and the Boeing 727 prototype. The Flying Heritage Collection is Paul G. Allen's collection of rare military aircraft which comprises artifacts from Germany, Japan, Russia, the United Kingdom and the United States. The museum is located at Paine Field in Everett, Washington. Paul Allen, a co-founder of Microsoft, began acquiring and preserving vintage aircraft in 1998. Allen's passion for aviation and history, and his awareness of the increasing rarity of original WWII aircraft, motivated him to restore these artifacts to the highest standard of authenticity and share them with the public. Many of the historic aircraft have been restored to flying condition. **Tour includes round trip transportation, all admissions, a box lunch and driver gratuity.** 

#### Seattle Waterfront and Heart of Downtown on Your Own - \$36.00 P/P

#### Celebrating Boeing's Centennial and United 90th Anniversary at the Museum of Flight- \$59.00 P/P

Tour #5 operates on Friday, September 23, 2016 - 9:30 a.m. - 4:00 p.m.

The Museum of Flight is pulling out all the stops to celebrate the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Boeing Company and its historic contributions to this century of aviation history. We are planning this day to give attendees a rare opportunity to relive part of the history we have been apart of at United. Because United was part of the Boeing Company for a short period almost 90 years ago, this day will be a chance to re-live and better appreciate the great history of the 2 companies. The museum collection includes a number of historic United airplanes from the early years of the company including a Varney 1928 Swallow, a replica of a Boeing/United Transport Model 40A, a restored United Boeing Transport Model 80, and a United Boeing 247 that made its final flight to the museum on April 26. Another historic airplane in the collection is the first B727, United's N7001U, which made its final flight to the museum in March of this year, and which will undoubtedly bring back fond memories for many of our members. We will plan guided docent tours during the day that highlight these airplanes for tour attendees and a luncheon presentation and discussion on early history of airmail and the company. A highlight of the day will be viewing the new, immense 3-acre Aviation Pavilion that is to open June 25, and house 19 of the museum's most significant aircraft. The museum offers something for every airplane or space enthusiast, from the Caproni 20, the world's first fighter plane, to the record setting Concorde, the original Air Force One, and the Space Shuttle Trainer. We are planning to offer multiple bus trips to and from the hotel and museum so attendees will have flexibility in their day. We have reserved a large meeting room for the entire day which will serve as the site for a delicious buffet luncheon and also be available during the morning and afternoon for just relaxing and visiting with friends should you want to get off your feet. The room offers a great view of airplanes arriving and departing from Boeing Field for all you airplane spotters. This tour includes transportation, admission and lunch at the museum and driver gratuity. Transportation will be on school buses as the museum is a short distance from the hotel.

#### Bus to the Seattle Center \$36.00 P/P

Tour #6 operates on Friday, September 23, 2016 – 9:00 a.m. – 4:00 p.m.

Your bus will take you to the Seattle Center, where you will be on your own for the day. Attractions in the area are the EMP Museum, the Space Needle and the Monorail. The EMP Museum is a nonprofit museum, dedicated to contemporary popular culture. The EMP Museum was founded by Microsoft co-founder Paul Allen in 2000. Since that time EMP has organized dozens of exhibits, 17 of which have toured across the US and internationally. Also in the area is the Chihuly Garden and Glass Museum. Another option is the Pacific Science Center featuring science exhibits, laser shows, a tropical butterfly house and an IMAX movie theater. The Monorail station is close by and the fare for seniors is \$1.00 cash. There will be time to explore these museums. The Space Needle has become a Seattle landmark. It was built in conjunction with the 1962 World's Fair and has been a major attraction ever since. A little history about the Space Needle is that Eddie Carlson, then with Westin International Hotels, drew a sketch on a cocktail napkin illustrating a similar tower he had seen in Germany. He thought it might make a good attraction for the World's Fair. It turns out he was right. If you would be interested in having lunch at the top of the Space Needle, check with the hotel concierge to make reservations. **Your tour includes round trip transportation and driver gratuity.**


