Pass rider enrollment is about to get easier



United has integrated the system that maintains employee pass travel eligibility information and the

system through which employees enroll their eligible pass riders and submit supporting documentation for pass travel privileges. The new user-friendly system, which was launched on March 23rd, will help employees and retirees enroll pass riders and manage their information more easily while reducing processing time and improving our ability to assist them.

Effective March 23rd, retirees will use their 6-digit user employee uID, to access the system to enroll a pass rider for pass travel. When you access the following links, you will be prompted to use your 6-digit uID and password:

Hundreds of aspiring aviators join United at Women in Aviation Conference



Flight Ops recruiters held faceto-face conversations with approximately 1,200 applicants during the three-day, 26th Annual International Women in Aviation Conference recently

in Dallas, offering first-hand perspectives of life in the airline industry and answering questions about career opportunities at United. Over the next 20 years, United will need to hire more than 10,000 pilots based on retirements and attrition alone. In that same period, major U.S. airlines will need almost 50,000 new pilots.

"The long days pale compared to the energy brought to us by each and every attendee," DEN Chief Pilot Bebe O'Neil said. "It's humbling to see the sheer numbers of people interested in a career at United and the tremendous qualifications they bring to the table."

United presented two \$5,000 scholarships to aviation students, and the company also sponsored a lunch, which was the highest-attended event at the conference. United values strong relationships with organizations like Women in Aviation, and this was United's 14th year of full sponsorship. Torgy's Travel Tips

This month's column takes you on an out-of- thisworld journey both literally and figuratively: The Kennedy Space Center. If you have not yet visited this place, you really are missing something!

Located just an hour's drive east of Orlando (MCO), the Kennedy Space Center Visitor Complex is a working spaceflight facility operated for NASA by a private



company which does not receive taxpayer or government funding. Hence, there is an admission and parking fee (seniors get a discount), but it is well worth the cost. Short of becoming an astronaut, there's no better way to get a look at the past, present and future of space travel. You will be amazed at the size and scope of the rockets, boosters,

capsules and technology that has put Americans on the moon and is now preparing for the January 2, 2020 launch of the flight to Mars. Did you know that the



Apollo missions were controlled with technology less sophisticated than that in your current smartphone? Your admission ticket in-

cludes the Kennedy Space Center Bus Tour which takes you to a launch pad,

then to the Apollo 8 launch site, the countdown clock and ample time at the Apollo/Saturn V Center. Here you can walk under and around the 363-foot-long Saturn V moon rocket which is suspended horizontally and segmented to show each stage of the rocket. There are fabulous exhibits and a sit-down theater where you can relive the Apollo 13 crisis while viewing the control room and hearing the actual transmissions.



Once you return from the bus tour, don't miss the Atlantis Shuttle Launch Experience where you can see the actual shuttle, crawl through a full-size mockup module, and later strap yourself into a seat

and experience the force of blast-off.

Also, don't miss two excellent IMAX 3-D movies about the Hubble Telescope and the International Space Station. All are included in your admission price.

There are full-scale models in the Rocket Garden and more exhibits about space exploration, nature and technology and several cafes on the grounds. For those wishing a more in-depth experience, there are 3 "Up-Close" tours for an additional cost and last between 2.5 and 3 hours. It would be difficult to squeeze in more than 1 such tour without staying an additional day. In that case, it would be cheaper to buy an annual pass which includes free parking, and then take your time.

Lastly, your ticket also includes free admission to the nearby US Astronaut Hall of Fame facility which houses a rare collection of astronaut artifacts, hands-on exhibits and an interactive experience that gives you a true taste of space. You must use this benefit within 7 days of your Visitor Complex visit.

Ask The Pharmacist



Bisphosphonates: The Good and the Bad ~ Osteoporosis is a progressive degenerative condition caused by an imbalance between cells that break down old bone, osteoclasts, and cells that build new bone, osteoblasts. When osteoclasts are more active, it results

in progressive bone loss. Women are at a significantly higher risk for osteoporosis. The team of specialist pharmacists within the Express Scripts Therapeutic Resource Centers that are educated in women's health issues counsel osteoporosis patients in the most effective management for their disease.

Medication Management ~ One key area the Express Scripts' Pharmacists help patients with is medication management, including safety and adherence. Bisphosphonates are one of the most commonly used therapy classes for osteoporosis. This class of medications have proven effective overall in reducing vertebral and nonvertebral fractures and having a good overall safety profile.

For patients who are on bisphosphonates, here are a few things that are helpful to know:

- ➤ Bisphosphonates work by decreasing the action of osteoclast cells providing osteoblasts cells an opportunity to restore the balance in favor of bone development, thus reducing the progression of osteoporosis and future fracture risk.
- Bisphosphonates come in a wide range of dosages and in different forms including tablets, liquids and injectables.
- ➤ Weekly doses are the most common. The medications remain in the body and bones for extended periods and continue to be effective.
- ➤ Certain bisphosphonates can remain at the bone surface for up to 10 years. This is why monthly and yearly doses are not uncommon.

Understanding the Risks ~ As with all medications, there are risks. Our Pharmacists help patients understand these risks and manage them to ensure the best possible outcomes. Some topics we cover with patients who are on bisphosphonates include:

- ✓ Bisphosphonates generally have low absorption rates. They also carry a risk of esophageal and stomach irritation. Because of this, oral forms of the medication should be taken first thing in the morning with a full glass of water. Avoid taking food, drink or other medications for 30 minutes to 60 minutes depending on product used.
- ✓ The patient must also remain upright during that time
- Although rare, bisphosphonates can cause osteonecrosis of the jaw (ONJ) or degradation of the jaw bone. Patients with compromised immune systems — such as those undergoing chemotherapy or HIV patients — are at the most risk. Poor oral hygiene and patients undergoing invasive dental procedures also can increase the risk for ONJ. Another rare but serious side effect is atypical fractures that occur in the middle of the femur. Such fractures are different from the classic osteoporotic fractures, which typically occur in the hip. Atypical fractures occur spontaneously or from low impact trauma in patients who have been on bisphosphonate therapy long term. Patients that notice any pain or discomfort in the thigh area should notify their physician for an evaluation.
- ✓ Physicians may halt bisphosphonate therapy after 5 to 7 years of continued treatment to minimize the risk for atypical fractures.
- ✓ The physician will monitor the progress of osteoporosis and after one year will assess whether therapy with a bisphosphonate needs to be restarted.
- ✓ Bisphosphonates are an important part of an effective osteoporosis treatment plan, but as with all medications, it is important to be aware of your risks. Understanding the risks and possible side effects enable patients to avoid or manage them, thus resulting in greater adherence to therapy and healthier outcomes.



Our featured member this month is **Boyd Sweet**. (In the spirit of Full Disclosure, I am married to Boyd.) Boyd was born in Hartshorne in southeastern Oklahoma. This area is in the shadows of the Jack Fork Mountains, known for scenic, but rugged hills. With this kind of outdoor backdrop, it is very fitting that favorite family events were camping, hunting and fishing. Boyd had an older brother and four older sisters. His family owned a grocery store and later a meat packing plant. Boyd was driving a delivery truck two years before he got his driver's license at age 16. His hometown's "claim to fame", as written on the side of the city's water tower, is Home of Warren Spahn. Baseball fans will remember the Hall of Fame left-handed pitcher, Warren Spahn, who spent the majority of his career with the Braves in Boston, and then in Milwaukee. The Spahn ranch was just down the road from Boyd's family.

After high school Boyd spent two years at Oklahoma's Central State College, then took a break from college, and moved to the panhandle of Texas to work in

the boom of the oil fields for Phillips Petroleum. One of Boyd's sisters was concerned that he had not returned to college, so she convinced him to move to Chicago where she lived.

In late 1959, Boyd began working for United Air Lines (UAL) at Midway (MDW) as a Ground Equipment Clerk where he soon participated in moving all ground equipment from MDW to O'Hare Field (ORD). Next, Boyd worked two years for HEIL Chicago, a company specializing in aircraft refueling truck maintenance. Entering O'Hare at the Higgen's Road North Guard Gate, he would hang a checked flag out the back window of his red, '57 Chevy, and drive to any location at ORD, such as gates, hangers and, tank farms, to make deliveries. Those days are certainly over!

Even though Boyd moved about 1000 miles from Texas to Chicago, apparently it was not far enough because I still found him, and we got married! We moved to DeKalb, Illinois where Boyd finished college at Northern Illinois University. Upon graduation in 1964, we returned to the Chicago area where Boyd began working for UAL again, at EXORA in Elk Grove Township. Back in the day before computer technology one of Boyd's jobs was reviewing paper copies of credit card Sales Slips which had been manually "swiped" incorrectly, i.e.; upside down, backward, partially, etc., and tried to identify the credit card company and customer so they could be sent for collection. This proved to be a challenge!

After a particularly brutal winter, The Sweet Family succumbed to the allure of the west coast where in winter one could drive TO the snow on WEEKENDS! So Boyd transferred to the expanding San Francisco Maintenance Base. His first job was Buyer "B" in SFOPP, buying interchangeable engine parts and thrust reverser parts. He remained in SFOPP as a Buyer "A" and then Supervisor until the early 1970's when SFOPP split into Purchasing (PP) and Inventory Planning (IP). Boyd chose SFOIP. In his 30 plus years in IP, Boyd had many highlights including supervising initial spares provisioning for the 737, 747, 757, 767, Airbus, and 777 fleets. Also, along with Mike Fitzsimons (IP), he provisioned the 777 spares for American Airlines (AA), Delta Air Lines (DL), and Asiana per United Service Contracts.

Working with Cathay Pacific, Boyd identified fifty million dollars in 747 and L1011 spare parts from the Pan American Airlines (PAA) routes and aircraft purchase. He supervised provisioning and control of spare parts support for two USAF programs - T43A (737) at Sacramento's Mather Air Force Base (MHR), and San Antonio's Randolph Air Force Base (RND) and C32A (757) at Washington Dulles (IAD).

With various assignments, Boyd had a lot of travel throughout the UAL system. Besides many trips to Boeing in Seattle, travel included the east coast, Canada, London, Amsterdam, and Vienna. Boyd also made trips

to Hawaii (of course), Seoul (SEL), Narita (NRT), Hong Kong (HKG), and Singapore(SIN). Since business obligations left little time for "touristy stuff" we returned at later dates for more leisure trips to several of these locations. One "cross-over" trip between work and pleasure was the opportunity Boyd had to fly on the Inaugural Flight of the *first* 777 from Boeing in Seattle to SFO, along with 291 other UAL employees.

After forty years working for UAL, Boyd retired in 2003. He states he particularly enjoyed interviewing, hiring, and training new Buyers and Planners as well as the opportunity to work with professional colleagues in Engineering, Maintenance and Stores.

Boyd and Merle have a daughter who is a teacher in Los Angeles, and a son who lives in San Leandro, and is Director of Procurement (Purchasing) at University of California Hastings Law School in San Francisco. They have four grandsons. They enjoy taking trips around California traveling to Hawaii, playing golf, and Boyd has volunteered at Second Harvest Food Bank for the past 12 years.


Thank you to everyone that sent cards and emails of support after the passing of my husband of 48 years, **Merrill Wetherington**, FLLFO on February 26th.

In 1957, cafeterias catered to the food needs of over 6,000 United employees. There were five "centers" located in cities with the largest number of personnel.

The cafeterias were open from breakfast through the afternoon coffee break with some operating around-the-clock to serve shift-workers. Seventy-two United employees staffed the four United-owned cafeterias.

Chicago had two cafeterias – one at EXO directed by **Helen Mellin** and one on the field side of Cicero, directed by **Frank Nardi**. The EXO staff also served the two Executive Dining Rooms.

The SFO cafeteria, headed by **Bob Marshall**, was the largest of all and served 2,600 people six times a day (3 meals & 3 coffee breaks). This cafeteria also maintained nine vending machines with complete lunches for Line Maintenance workers and three mobile canteens circulating in-and-around SFOMB at noon and during break periods.

The Operating Base (OPB) at Denver, managed by **Art Ballagh**, served daily meals to 650 employees and also prepared & served special meals for various groups

visiting the base.

At New York's Idlewild the cafeteria, located in United's hangar, was operated "under contract" by Brass Rail Restaurants and served about 700 United & American employees per day. R.F. Gardiner managed the operation for United.
