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
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GENERAL NEWS

The Writers' Column - A Brief Discussion of Lighthouses By George Midwin

Today we have technology to help us navigate from one part of the world to the other, using just hand held devices. However, that was not the case many years ago. Early mariners used the sun by day and the stars by night to find their way. As they neared the coast they used maps, developed through the years by previous sailors, to find the cities and harbors they sought. These maps proved to be an effective way to locate the general area they wanted, but lacked the specific details needed to avoid hazards, such as reefs and rocks.

Ships safely navigating a long journey across vast oceans would more often than not, end in distress just a very short distance from their destinations. This would result in loss of cargo and human lives. By the late 1700's solutions on how to provide ship captains relevant information as to not only location, but hazards surrounding ports, became a priority. Maps improved through the years, to identify coastal terrain and water hazards, however ships had to be close to shore to make clear identification as to their position. This too, led to disaster, as hazards suddenly appeared.



Thus the lighthouse was considered. This could send a beam of light out to the ocean and help guide the captain of a ship, staying clear of dangerous hazards. In the late 1700's, the United States government created the Lighthouse Service and began construction of lighthouses. Lighthouse keepers began manning the lights and continued until 1939, when this task was given over to the Coast Guard.

Lighthouses vary in types depending on their location. Areas relatively level with the water require a tall lighthouse, those located on cliffs can be lower. Areas of danger due to rocky shorelines require a lighthouse to be

located directly above the hazardous area. Finally, where extreme danger exists and a lighthouse cannot be located, a lightship is anchored. Regardless of where the lighthouse was located, they all required personnel to operate them.

Although lighthouses may be of different types, some elements are the same. One in particular, the lens, the most important part of the lighthouse, is relatively the same. The first lenses were simple large slabs of glass, 5 inches thick. Poor techniques left impurities in the glass and created limited use. It wasn't until a French scientist invented a lens that would dramatically change the future of lenses. That lens became known as the Fresnel lens. This lens was much lighter than the original lenses, produced a much brighter light. It quickly became the lens for lighthouses in the US and around the world. This lens was essentially a series of prisms evenly spaced in a circular, vertical stack, with a bull's eye lens in the center. The prisms would multiply the light and focus it to the bull's-eye, where a beam would be formed. Their sizes were listed as 'orders', ranging from the largest as a 1st order to the smallest as 6th order. These were masterful pieces of engineering, with a 1st order over 8 feet tall and weighing thousands of pounds. This lens could produce a beam of light over 20 miles out to sea.

The light for the lenses was produced by dozens of different types of devices, which operated in a similar manner; basically an oil lamp with a wick. This required the lighthouses to have large oil storage facility in close proximity to the lighthouse. This was especially true for those lighthouses in remote areas. You often see the storage facility when you look at photos of lighthouses. In addition, a large stock of wicks was necessary to ensure the light could be produced throughout the night, every night of every day.

The light that is produced by the lens and lamp, appears to be a flash when viewed at a distance. However, the lamp cannot produce a flash alone, as it burns continuously and the lens does not have a flap that moves, over it. The flash is produced by rotating the entire Fresnel lens about the oil lamp. As the lens rotates, the prisms having captured the light and focused it on the bull's-eye, continually produces a beam and when the bull's-eye reaches the front of the lighthouse, that beam can be seen by passing ships. With no electricity, the rotation of the lens is accomplished in the same manner of a grandfather clock. A series of weights is wound up and as they lower, move gears to rotate the lens, which rests on ball bearings.

If you're a mariner looking for a particular port, you consult a navigation map which provides numerous details as to the coast line. However at night, these would be difficult to ascertain and get an exact position as to where you are. The lighthouse then becomes the important aid the captain of a ship uses. Each lighthouse is unique, in how it can be identified, particularly at night. The number of flashes and color of light, in a given

time frame is provided on navigation maps. As an example, the oldest continuously operating lighthouse in California is at Monterey. The navigation chart identifies this as "Oc. W 4s". This refers to an occulting (flash), White light every 4 seconds. As you can imagine, there are numerous identifiers for the myriad of lighthouses in the US.

Lighthouses were staffed with 'keepers,' 24 hrs a day, every day of the year. They were housed either in the lighthouse, or very close by. Some lived in very remote and inhospitable areas, often not seeing others for months. During the day they prepared for the night, winding the rotating mechanism, cleaning the lens, preparing a supply of wicks, carrying a nights worth of oil to the top of the lighthouse and ensuring the function of the light. Then staying up during the night, trimming the wick, maintaining the light, re-supplying the oil lamp and quickly repairing any issues that may arise. Not a task for ordinary people, but those that held the position understood the importance of their job and were proud to serve.

The large number of shipwrecks during the early years of shipping, led to the development of lighthouses. These structures required dedicated personnel to manage the rudimentary technology. The result was the saving of countless lives. Today many of these lighthouses still exist and provide us an insight into their history. You can visit one to learn more.

Update on our return to JFK February 12, 2021



Back in November, we made an exciting announcement about our return to JFK (New York-Kennedy) this February.

The new service will operate out of Terminal 7 using the reconfigured Boeing 767-300ER aircraft, offering customers an extended premium cabin featuring 16 additional United Business class seats – providing all-aisleaccess seating – bringing the total premium cabin seat count to 46. The aircraft will also feature 22 United Premium Plus seats, 47 Economy Plus seats and 52 Economy seats.

So Simple From Sheryl



By the time you are reading this month's recipe, we hope to be traveling in our RV. This recipe will be one I make on the road as it is easy and dinner will be ready after a day of touring or relaxing. It is one of our favorites and hope that you agree.

Slow Cooker Crock Pot Soup:

1 small onion, diced

3 large carrots, peeled and chopped

2 celery ribs, chopped

8 oz. baby portabella mushrooms, sliced

4-6 cloves garlic, minced

2 tablespoons tomato paste

 $1\ teaspoon\ beef\ bouillon\ or\ 1\ cube\ beef\ bouillon$

1½ pounds beef stew meat

6 cups beef broth

2 cups wide egg noodles,

Place all ingredients in a 6 quart slow cooker except egg noodles.

Cover with lid and cook on Low for 8-9 hours or on High for 5-6 hours.

Stir in egg noodles. Cover and cook on High for 15 minutes or until noodles are tender.

Note: You may peel and cut your vegetables the day before and put into a plastic bag. The next day you only have to put other ingredients together and cook.

There are a lot more A Checks than engine work but engines generate more revenue so it was agreed that Continental would handle United LAX DC-10 A Checks using United Job Cards. However, the Maintenance Job Cards between the two companies were very different so it was a huge task to instill the United terminology into the Continental maintenance minds. At last it was all completed and the two companies, on a Maintenance level, were somewhat merged.

<u>Book Corner</u>. I finished The Book of Lost Friends and I enjoyed it very much. It's based on actual "Lost Friends" advertisements that appeared in Southern newspapers after the Civil War, as newly freed slaves desperately searched for loved ones who had been sold away.

The next book I'll be reading for my DAR book club is America's First Daughter by Stephanie Dray and Laura Kamoie. As Thomas Jefferson's eldest daughter, Patsy Jefferson becomes his helpmate, protector, and constant companion in the wake of her mother's death, traveling with him when he becomes America's minister to France. It is in Paris that fifteen-year-old Patsy learns of her father's troubling liaison with Sally Hemings, a slave girl her own age. In the years to come, as scandal, tragedy and poverty threaten her family, Patsy must decide how much she will sacrifice to protect her father's reputation, in the process defining not just Jefferson's political legacy but that of the nation he founded.

<u>California Reservoir Levels</u>. If you like to dance, this would be a great time to start doing Rain Dances. Many of California's reservoirs are far below historical average. Most people are not aware that the entire state is in a severe drought situation because the news has been so focused on the pandemic.

The American Geosciences Institute tracks reservoir levels and provides daily updates at: https://www.americangeosciences.org/critical-issues/maps/interactive-map-water-levels-major-reservoirs-california. For example, as of March 6, Shasta is at 50% of capacity, which is only 67% of historical average for this date. Folsom is at 36% capacity, which is 62% of historical average. We need to get A LOT more rain to catch up to historical average.

<u>Here is a heads up to all dog and cat owners</u>: Warning about Seresto flea and tick collars. Since Seresto flea and tick collars were introduced in 2012, the EPA has received incident reports of at least 1,698 related pet deaths. Through June 2020, the agency has received more than 75,000 incident reports related to the collars, including nearly 1,000 involving human harm. However, the EPA has done nothing to inform the public of the risks.

The Center for Biological Diversity, a nonprofit organization that watchdogs the EPA as part of its work to protect endangered species, obtained the documents through a public records request and provided them to the Midwest Center for Investigative Reporting.

The EPA is in charge of regulating products that contain pesticides. The agency has known about these incidents for years but has not informed the public of the potential risks associated with this product, said Karen McCormack, a retired EPA employee who worked as both a scientist and communications officer. McCormack said the collars have the most incidents of any pesticide pet product she's ever seen.

And here is this month's heartwarming wildlife rescue story about the Sea Turtle Rescue in Texas: South Padre island in Texas is a resort on the Texas-Mexico border. It is also the home of Sea Turtle, Inc., a nonprofit whose mission is to rescue, rehabilitate and release injured sea turtles; educate the public; and assist with conservation efforts for all marine turtle species.

In mid February, a rare cold front from the Arctic caused temperatures in Texas to plunge into the teens. Cold-blooded animals like sea turtles rely on ambient heat to regulate their body temperatures, and when the water dips below 50 degrees Fahrenheit—rare around South Padre Island—sea turtles' heart rates slow, rendering them paralyzed but conscious. This is known as a cold-stun event. "They know they should be flapping their fins and raising their heads to breathe. All of those instincts are happening, but their body isn't fulfilling its instincts," says Wendy Knight, executive director of Sea Turtle, Inc.

Across the state, more than 7,000 cold-stunned turtles have been recorded. This is the largest cold-stunning event documented in the United States since the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) started keeping records in 1980. Before the mass rescue effort, tanks at Sea Turtle, Inc., held 38 sea turtle patients and five resident turtles, including Allison, a green turtle, and Fred, a loggerhead, each with only one flipper. When the center's power went out on Monday at 2AM, the water temperature in the tanks dropped. Staff had to remove them from the water and place them in bins and on tarps. The organization put out a plea for help and engineers at the nearby SpaceX center in Boca Chita leaped into action. They arrived at the rescue center after midnight on Wednesday "with the single largest generator I've ever seen in my life," Knight says. "And at 1:30AM, I sat in the parking lot and watched them turn the lights on."

What the residents of South Padre Island did to save the turtles is downright amazing. The whole town sprang into action to rescue turtles from the ocean and beaches and then transport them to Sea Turtle Inc. and the town's convention center. And most of the turtles are HUGE. The articles on the rescue show several men carrying one turtle.

The rescue started in the ocean. Over the weekend, boaters in commercial vessels and dinghies patrolled the frigid waters, collecting hundreds of cold-stunned turtles that had floated to the surface. By Tuesday, turtles started washing up on the beach, a clear sign they were in distress. Gina McLellan, a longtime volunteer with Sea Turtle, Inc., went down to the beach and loaded up <u>dozens of turtles</u> in her Subaru station wagon to bring them to help. Dozens of other residents did the same. It took at least 10 men to hoist one turtle, bigger than 400 pounds and at least 150 years old, onto a flatbed truck. On Tuesday afternoon, McLellan says, there was a 400-yard line of cars outside the convention center, each car bearing turtles. That line never stopped until six in the evening. Whether [cars] had one turtle or 200, they just waited," McLellan says.

Knight says she's been in awe at the outpouring of support from South Padre Island residents. "We have people who have not had power or water in their own homes in three to four days working 15 to 18 hours a day to save turtles. The gas stations are now out of gas, and the grocery stores are out of water, and people are still showing up". Rescued sea turtles of all ages and sizes were everywhere. "Ev-er-y-where," Knight says. About 500 of them, still unmoving, were on tarps at the rescue center. They filled every foot of floor space, including in the gift shop. Another 4,400—mostly green, Kemp's Ridley, and loggerhead sea turtles—were at the island's convention center. "We had at least one and a half football fields' worth of turtles in the building."

The following weekend, Sea Turtle Inc. announced on Facebook that they had successfully released over 2,200 turtles into the now-warmed waters of the Gulf of Mexico. The video of the turtles sliding down the boat's ramp into the sea was the perfect end to all of San Padre Island's work.

Spring brings gardening season, weather permitting, to many parts of the country and I am going to write again about plants. With some interesting facts I will share with you, it will give you a head start on your planting season.

Did you know that plants smell? Plants emit odors that humans and animals are attracted to, but they also sense their own odors and those of the neighboring plants around them. They know when their neighbor has been cut by a gardener's shears or when a neighbor is being eaten by a ravenous bug. A plant's range of smell is limited but highly sensitive and communicates information to the living organism.

Plants are removed from our understandings of the olfactory because they do not have a nervous system. Plants have the ability to perceive odor or scent through stimuli. The ancient Egyptians would open a few figs to get an entire bunch to ripen. In ancient China people would burn incense in a storage room of pears to get them to ripen. In the 20th century, Florida farmers were sure that heat induced the ripening. Imagine their disappointment when they plugged in electric heaters and the fruit didn't ripen. Back in 1924, a scientist determined that kerosene smoke contains minute amounts of ethylene, a molecule, and that treating a plant with this does induce ripening. The incense the Chinese burned contained amounts of ethylene in the smoke and makes for a rapid ripening. The Egyptians allowed the ethylene to escape when they opened their figs which emit ethylene.

When you put a ripe banana in a bag with a hard pear, the banana gives off ethylene which is smelled by the pear which quickly ripens. Some of you may have put an orange, pear or some other fruit in a bag for a couple of days to ripen.

I was just reading an article that the Buchenwald, Germany, Concentration Camp was closed in April of 1945 which made me remember a good friend of mine Wanda, who was in that camp many years ago. It's an

interesting story, she was a lovely and funny lady, considering all she went through in her life. I met her through my Aunt Gen, as Wanda was a pedicurist at Saks Fifth Avenue in Chicago. She had been doing that for quite a while, but her background story is so fascinating, yet sad. She was living in Poland, her father was French, and her mother was Polish. She had another sister, both learning the ways of both nationalities. Her dad saw that Wanda had quite a knack for picking up languages. She already knew Polish and French, they were close to Germany, she learned that. Then she met Witold, a Lithuanian, he taught her that, too. They married in the late 30's. Unfortunately, they were caught up in the war. Wanda ended up in Buchenwald, Witold went to another camp. The newlyweds were separated throughout the war. Neither one knew where the other was, much less alive or dead. All those languages saved her life. She even picked up a few while in there. If you know languages, some are very similar, that helped. The Germans used her to interpret their daily orders to all the prisoners. What an awful experience, but it made her needed.

Then in 1945, the Americans and Allies were able to end the war, found these terrible camps, and freed the prisoners. Wanda went back to Paris. Thanks to mutual friends, they were able to find Witold, and reunited the couple. It took five years before they met up again and could live their lives. They had two children, George and Barbara (Basha). They came to America, where they had relatives in Chicago. He went to work in a bank, she went to beauty school and learned to be a manicurist/pedicurist, an excellent one, I might add! She started to work at the small shops, then got a job at Saks Fifth Avenue in Chicago. They lived over on the North West side, on Thomas Street, a street out of the Polish past. George became an insurance salesman, Basha became a flight attendant for American Airlines. When Basha was a young girl, she contracted a lung condition, always had a weakness with breathing and COPD.

I met Wanda in the 80's and she was already in her 60's, being born in 1923. She reminded me a little of Sophia, on The Golden Girls, tiny, walked fast, went up and down steps 3-4 times in an hour. Very active lady, did everything by herself. Witold became ill and died about 10 years ago, she showed me their gravesite. At St. Adelbert's cemetery on Milwaukee Avenue, there's a special section for the survivors of the Holocaust. It's very touching with beautiful words on a huge memorial, for those persecuted souls. About six years ago, her daughter became ill with her lung condition. Wanda had to be with Basha, she packed up her belongings in about a week, sold her home, and was gone in less than a month. Being a devoted mom, she found a retirement home and wanted to help her Basha. As you can guess, the daughter got better, but Wanda became very sick.

As if overnight, her memory started to wane, I couldn't believe it. She was so sharp, it was amazing. I wanted to visit, but it just didn't work out. Basha told me her mother was suffering from dementia and it was extremely sad. I did call her, but she didn't know who I was. She was an integral part of my life every month for years, but I'm so lucky to have known such a strong woman. She was definitely someone to look up to and admire.

Just think, these were only two people that lived through such awful times during the war. The millions that went through worse, or never made it out at all. I thank our service men and women for all they did for us. I hope they too had a happy ending to their lives.

Our fellow workers that passed to the Great Beyond include **Sam Napolitano**, OPBCM, **Jerry Massey**, ORDMM/ORDIQ, **Henry Tedder**, ORDJL/ORDMM; from ORDCG, **John Wilkins**, **Jerry Numrich** and **Danny Lynn**, husband of **Laura**, ORDCS, and brother in law of **Gail Vickrey-Milligan**, ORDCS. Also gone from our world are Chick Corea, Mary Wilson (Supremes), Larry Flynt, Irv Cross, Vernon Jordan, Chicago's own Karen Lewis, CTU President, and Rush Limbaugh.

Personally, I had to put my beautiful little furry girl to sleep last month. She was pure white with the prettiest pale blue eyes. She was almost 16 years old. I found her at a Vet's office, along with her sister, who had green eyes. When they told me she was deaf, I had to take her. I was afraid nobody would want her, but I couldn't take her sister, that would give me five cats in a one bedroom apartment. The next day I realized what a mistake I made, they needed each other. I called the Vet, but somebody just left with her sister. I never forgave myself for that, so little Audrey Hepburn and I were best buds for a long time. She had bladder cancer, there was no hope for a 16 years old kitty. We'll meet at the Rainbow Bridge someday with my others.

The subject for this month's brief biography is well known across the RUAEA spectrum. If you aren't familiar with the name or haven't met **Henry** "**Hank**" Gosselin (SEAMM), you haven't been paying attention.

Currently serving as RUAEA Vice President of Conventions, Hank has been active since retiring from United in 2000, immediately becoming a force in the organization, including his two terms as President of RUAEA from 2012-2016, previously as vice president and chairman of the 2004 national convention here in Seattle.

Hank Gosselin was raised in Madison, Connecticut, situated centrally on that state's portion of the Long Island Sound shoreline. Following graduation from high school, he attended East Coast Aero Tech, a well-known provider of aircraft maintenance technology training, in Bedford, Massachusetts. While he was still in school, he accepted a job offer from United Airlines as a mechanic at Idlewild International Airport (now JFK International) in New York City. He joined United in 1960, having earned his Airframe and Powerplant (A&P) license. In 1962 he transferred to Seattle, where he spent the rest of his more than 40-year career.

In Seattle, Hank worked as a mechanic, a maintenance foreman, and a Station Maintenance Controller (SMC). While in Maintenance Management, he filled several other positions in addition to mechanic, working all shifts at various times, Employee Assistance Representative, Manpower Planner, Vacation Planner, Scheduler, Tire Shop Supervisor and in the back shop (where cargo containers are repaired). He also was part of the Scene-Based System Accident Team, which was responsible for traveling to aircraft accident scenes and providing assistance. Hank says that performing maintenance work during a time frame that began with propeller-driven aircraft and moved into the jet propulsion age was an extraordinary experience.

Upon retiring from United, Hank immediately became involved in various leadership positions within RUAEA. He mentioned that he would be remiss if he did not mention that our own **Jim Fauber**, then RUAEA President, "twisted his arm" to take on chairmanship of the 2004 national convention in Seattle. That 2004 convention was the last of the well-attended meets with over 900 registrants.

With thanks to Jim, Hank has been involved with national conventions ever since. Though not all were as successful, all have been rewarding. Hank fondly remembers the former nightly hotel-room "Bible Studies" with plenty of food, drink and bantering conversation.

Hank has always been highly visible at conventions, whether handing out prizes, organizing activities on the PA system, or whirling around the dance floor. He possesses an authoritarian voice that carries well, commanding everyone's attention.

Planning to maintain his involvement in RUAEA, Hank claims that "By getting to know so many great people that I call my friends who worked for United and helped make it the airline it has been and is today, I feel very fortunate."

And we feel extremely fortunate to be able to enjoy the company of **Hank Gosselin** as part of our Seattle Emerald City Slickers.

Spring has sprung and Easter Sunday is on the horizon. We hope all RUAEA members, family and friends enjoy the change of seasons – with or without DST.

I received my January issue of the RUAEA Newsletter yesterday, February 20th. I am familiar with the photo on the inside front cover about the 747 with an extra engine.

While flying out of EWRSW as an Inflight Services Supervisor, (ISS) from 1975-1977, I worked flights 35 EWRSFO returning on 34 SFOEWR. From my knowledge, I saw this several times during my tenure as an ISS. It was the cheapest method of moving a jet engine from the Maintenance Base to the East Coast (EWR).

It did come with a slight cost as the flight would be restricted to a lower altitude and slower air speed due to the extra weight, about 10,000 pounds.

Passengers would comment about it as they entered the aircraft from door 2L

While en-route, there was no difference in flight characteristics that were noticeable, except perhaps to the pilots working the flight.

I am sure the fan blades were secured to prevent damage during transport.

The photo brought back some fond memories of those glorious days. At that time, the ISS was a no-go item, necessary because of the wide body jets (including the DC10). There were up to 14 flight attendants on a fully loaded 747 and 10 on a DC10, to be observed.

It was probably the best position I held during my 38+ years with UAL prior to transferring to OPBSK in 1984.

I am coming up on 20 years retired on 2/28/21. Where does the time go?

etermined to avoid the regrets expressed in the classic Joni Mitchell song lyric, "you don't know what you've got till it's gone, I made a point to capture the essence of Stapleton Airport the day before all operations switched over to Denver International Airport, February 27/28, 1995. It was important to me to capture the airport full of activity, because it was such a major player in my and my family's quality and pace of life. It represented my career supporting crew training and operations at United Airlines, as well as our family's favorite activity, flying to our hearts' desires on our treasured airline passes. We spent so much time at dear old Stapleton that Concourse A ended up being where our youngest son took his first steps in '91!





Another reason for feeling such affection for Stapleton was the nearly seamless access to our flights of fancy. Living 20 minutes to United's Flight Training Center where I worked, from our Aurora Village East neighborhood, we could actually be on a flight an hour after deciding and packing for it. It only took minutes to catch an employee bus from the DENTK parking lot, a few minutes ride to the terminal, and a few more through simpler security back in the day. Not that we cut it that close very often — we pulled it off enough times it became legend in our own minds!

So it was, on Stapleton's last day, having had a few occasions to drive way out to DIA for an air show and a United Way charity flight auction, that I was already missing the convenience. But it was the history and intimacy of good old Stapleton that I hoped to preserve as I snapped photos of its going away party that day.
