





So Simple From Sheryl



½ cup nonfat dry milk 2/3 cup honey 2/3 cup vegetable oil 2 tbsp water 1½ tsp vanilla 1 cup raisins 1 cup dried cranberries

I am submitting a different type of recipe this month, but I think you will enjoy the change. It does have more ingredients then usual, but once you have bought them you will have them for next time and it is so easy to make and store. We enjoy granola in the morning or as a midday snack.

Granola:

6 cups slow cooking oatmeal ½ cup firmly packed brown sugar ¾ cup wheat germ ½ cup flaked coconut ¼ cup sesame seeds

1 cup chopped nuts of your choice, I use mostly almonds.

In a large bowl combine, oats, brown sugar, wheat germ, coconut, sesame seeds, nuts, and nonfat dry milk. Combine honey, vegetable oil, water and vanilla. Add to oat mixture. Stir to coat ingredients well.

Pour mixture into two large shallow baking pans. Heat in 300 oven for 25-35 minutes or until lightly toasted. Keep an eye on it towards the end as it burns easily. Stir twice during heating. Stir occasionally while cooling. Crumble into pieces. Add raisins and/or dried cranberries. Store in tightly sealed container. Granola may be frozen.

Makes 14 cups.

United to Triple SAF Use in 2023, Adds SAF on Flights at San Francisco Airport May 4, 2023



United today announced that it will begin using a blend of Sustainable Aviation Fuel (SAF) on departing flights from San Francisco International Airport and is planning to use a SAF blend later this year at London Heathrow Airport, which could put the airline on track to use approximately 10 million gallons in 2023, nearly three times more than 2022 and close to 10 times more than 2019.

"It's remarkable to see that in just a few years United has exponentially increased its SAF use," said United Chief Sustainability Officer Lauren Riley. "While 10 million gallons of SAF in 2023 represents a fraction of what we need, we have also made big

investments in producers that are using everything from ethanol to algae, to CO2, to help increase our available future supply. We believe these investments, along with our continued collaboration with policymakers, cross-industry businesses, and other airlines will help us scale this brand-new industry to achieve comparable success to solar and wind."

To date, United has invested in the future production of over five billion gallons of SAF - more than any airline – and as a result of today's announcement, the carrier will fly more miles in 2023 than any airline. United has used SAF blends at Los Angeles International Airport since 2016 and Schiphol Airport in Amsterdam since 2022 and continues to use SAF at those airports in 2023.

The SAF deliveries commenced at San Francisco Airport in April, with United receiving 1.5 million gallons of SAF for departing flights, the remainder of United's SAF supply will be used at Los Angeles International Airport and Amsterdam's Schiphol Airport. London Heathrow Airport is expected to begin receiving deliveries of SAF later in 2023. Once the SAF is delivered to London Heathrow, it will mark the first time United would participate in London Heathrow's SAF incentive program.

Eco-Skies Alliance Round $3 \sim \text{The SAF}$ used on United's flights will be paid for in part through the company's Eco-Skies AllianceSM, an innovative program designed for participating companies to work together to share the "green premium" or the cost associated with purchasing lower emission fuels. Participating in United's Eco-Skies Alliance provides its corporate customers with the opportunity to build transparency and enable true, certified SAF emissions reductions associated with travel of people or goods on United flights.

United's Eco-Skies Alliance program was launched in April 2021 and has collectively contributed toward the purchase of nearly 15 million gallons of SAF. With its up to 80% greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions reductions on a lifecycle basis compared to conventional jet fuel, this is enough SAF to reduce approximately 150,000 metric tons of GHG emissions, or enough to fly passengers close to 1 billion miles. Including today's newly announced participants, the program has 24 participants including: Audi, Bank of America, Cisco, Corporate Travel Management, DB Schenker, First Eagle Investments, Macquarie Group and Thermo Fisher Scientific.

The SAF that United is using today in San Francisco and Amsterdam is provided by Neste. Neste MY SAF is produced from sustainably sourced, 100% renewable waste and residue raw materials, including used cooking oil and animal fat waste. Using Neste MY Sustainable Aviation Fuel reduces greenhouse gas emissions by up to 80% over the fuel's life cycle, compared to using conventional jet fuel.

In the future, SAF could be made from other feedstocks, including household trash, forest waste, algae or compressed CO2. To date, United has invested in the future production of over 5 billion gallons of SAF – more than any airline.

The Federal Government Recognizes the Value of SAF ~ The 2022 Inflation Reduction Act includes the largest governmental climate change investments in U.S. history - a new blender's tax credit specifically for SAF along with other critical incentives for clean energy and carbon capture – that will help spur an increase in SAF infrastructure and supply while lowering costs for SAF consumers.

The U.S. military currently uses nearly five billion gallons of jet fuel annually and the Department of Defense will use a jet fuel blend containing at least 10% SAF by 2028 because of the 2023 National Defense Authorization Act.

And according to the U.S. Department of Energy, the country's vast feedstock resources are enough to meet the projected SAF demand of the entire U.S. aviation industry.

United's Commitment to Net Zero Emissions by 2050 ~ United was the first airline to commit to net zero carbon emissions by 2050, without relying on traditional carbon offsets. In addition to the Eco-Skies Alliance Program, United also established a venture fund — United Airlines Ventures — to identify and invest in

companies and technologies that can decarbonize air travel and from this, recently created the UAV Sustainable Flight FundSM. These strategic investments include carbon capture, hydrogen-electric engines, electric engines, electric regional aircraft and air taxis. This year, United became the first U.S. airline to show customers an estimate of each flight's carbon footprint in their search.

<u>United Airlines Announces First-Quarter Financial Results:</u> <u>Continues to See Strong Demand for Air Travel</u> <u>April 18, 2023</u>



United Airlines (UAL) today reported first-quarter 2023 financial results. The company reported a \$256 million pre-tax loss, consistent with expectations provided in March. The company grew total operating revenue by 51.1% compared to first quarter 2022 and total revenue per available seat mile (TRASM) by 22.5%. Cost per available seat mile (CASM) increased 4.0%, while CASM-ex came in at

down 0.1%, better than guidance due to strong operational reliability that produced available seat miles (ASMs) 23.4% higher than the first quarter of 2022. The company remains confident in the 2023. United Next adjusted diluted earnings per share target of \$10 to \$12.

"I am extremely proud of the United team's performance during the first quarter of 2023. Our industry-leading operational performance contributed to an all-time high operating cash flow in the first quarter and keeps us on track to achieve our cost targets for the full year," said United Airlines CEO Scott Kirby. "We are watching the macroeconomic risks carefully, but demand remains strong, especially internationally, where we are growing at twice the domestic rate. We expect all of these factors will keep us on track to achieve our full-year adjusted diluted EPS target."

First-Quarter Financial Results:

- ▲ Net loss of \$194 million, adjusted net loss of \$207 million.
- ▲ Capacity up 23.4% compared to first-quarter 2022.
- ▲ Total operating revenue of \$11.4 billion, up 51.1% compared to first-quarter 2022.
- ▲ TRASM up 22.5% compared to first-quarter 2022.
- ▲ CASM up 4.0%, and CASM-ex down 0.1%, compared to first-quarter 2022.
- ▲ Diluted loss per share of \$0.59, adjusted diluted loss per share of \$0.63.
- ▲ Average fuel price per gallon of \$3.33.
- ▲ Reduced adjusted total debt by \$4.6 billion in the last 12 months.

Key Highlights:

- ▲ United reached a tentative agreement with the International Association of Machinists & Aerospace Workers (IAM) for a new, industry-leading contract for our nearly 30,000 IAM-represented employees. Voting is expected to complete in early May.
- ▲ Today announced the largest South Pacific network expansion ever to and from the continental U.S., including the first non-stop flight between San Francisco and Christchurch (subject to government approval). With 66 flights between the United States and Australia/New Zealand every week, United will operate nearly 40% more flights from the United States to Australia and New Zealand next northern winter versus last year.
- ▲ Launched the United Airlines Ventures Sustainable Flight FundSM, a first-of-its-kind investment vehicle designed to support start-ups focused on decarbonizing air travel by accelerating the research, production and technologies associated with sustainable aviation fuel.
- △ Opened expanded and newly renovated global Inflight Training Center in Houston, Texas the \$32 million expansion project more than doubles the available training space and supports the airline's plan to hire and train a total of 15,000 people in 2023, including 4,000 flight attendants.
- ▲ United announced a new industry-leading family seating policy enabled by dynamic seat map technology that makes it easier for children under 12 to sit next to an adult since launch United enabled almost 50,000 more families to sit with their children.
- ▲ United collaborated with Sesame Workshop to announce Oscar the Grouch as its first Chief Trash Officer as he and the airline celebrate his love of rubbish. United's campaign is designed to promote the expected benefit of using sustainable aviation fuel more broadly.

Operational Performance:

Achieved the lowest first quarter seat cancel rate (1.09%) since the first quarter of 2012, leading the U.S. industry despite the greater impact of weather on United than any other airline.

- ▲ United flew the most mainline seats 413,000 in company history and most mainline flights 2,300 daily for the quarter.
- ▲ United finished first in on-time departures at O'Hare International Airport, Denver International Airport, Los Angeles International Airport, and George Bush Intercontinental Airport and second in on-time departures out of San Francisco International Airport and Dulles International Airport as well as at our international stations.
- ▲ Net Promoter Score (NPS) performance for clubs and inflight service satisfaction was at an all-time high for the quarter since the launch of the NPS survey in 2020.

Network:

- Through an enhanced cross-border joint business agreement with Air Canada announced industry-leading capacity and new routes between Canada and the U.S. for summer 2023.
- ▲ Launched four new international routes between Dubai, United Arab Emirates, and Newark/New York and between Tokyo-Haneda, Japan, and Newark/New York, Los Angeles, and Washington D.C. Reintroduced four international routes not flown since the beginning of the pandemic service between Tokyo-Narita, Japan and Denver, Osaka, Japan and San Francisco, Hong Kong, and San Francisco, and Managua, Nicaragua, and Houston.
- Resumed non-stop service between Shanghai and San Francisco, becoming the first U.S. airline to not require a technical stop between the U.S. and Shanghai since November 2020.
- ▲ Increased domestic premium seat capacity 25% versus first guarter 2019.

Customer Enhancements:

- ▲ The new United ClubSM at O'Hare International Airport had a strong debut in January 2023 with stellar customer satisfaction scores.
- ▲ During the first quarter, over 1 million customers used United's "bag drop shortcut" which streamlines the bag-check process and is active at 38 airports.
- ▲ With the opening of the new Terminal A at Newark Liberty International Airport, added 12 gates for its operations and expects to have 17 total gates by the end of 2023.

Communities:

- A President Joe Biden announced his intent to appoint United President Brett Hart to the President's Export Council the principal national advisory committee on international trade.
- ▲ Celebrated the graduation of United Aviate Academy's inaugural class of pilots, an important step towards training the next generation of talented, qualified, and motivated aviators.
- Announced a \$5 million investment in algae-based fuel producer Viridos to turn microalgae into sustainable aviation fuel through the first new investment of its recently announced United Airlines Ventures Sustainable Flight Fund since its launch.
- Announced a \$15 million investment by United Airlines Ventures Sustainable Flight Fund (UAV) in carbon capture technology company Svante, that provides materials and technology as part of the value chain that has the potential to convert CO2 removed from the atmosphere and from industrial emission sources into sustainable aviation fuel.
- ▲ United Airlines, Tallgrass, and Green Plains Inc. announced a new joint venture Blue Blade Energy to develop and then commercialize a novel sustainable aviation fuel technology that uses ethanol as its feedstock.
- ▲ Nearly 4,000 hours were volunteered by more than 470 employees. More than 8.4 million miles donated by MileagePlus® members to more than 60 non-profit organizations.
- ▲ Launched our Miles on a MissionSM campaign to support Turkey and Syria earthquake relief, raising nearly 400,000 miles and \$25,000 for Airlink, American Red Cross, and World Central Kitchen.
- ▲ Nearly 300 employees participated in Martin Luther King Jr. Day parades and volunteer activities across the company's network.
- ▲ Supported Sesame Workshop's Welcome Sesame initiative, delivering critically needed early childhood development opportunities to families affected by conflict and crisis.
- ▲ Led a Black History Month fundraising campaign alongside Chase and Visa for our card members, supporting The Thurgood Marshall College Fund, The Leadership Conference Education Fund, The Legal Defense Fund, and The United Negro College Fund.

United Announces Largest South Pacific Expansion in Aviation History, Including New Direct Flight to Christchurch, New Zealand April 18, 2023



United Airlines today announces the largest South Pacific network expansion ever to and from the continental U.S., including the first non-stop flight between San Francisco and Christchurch set to commence on December 1. United will be the only carrier to directly connect the U.S. and the South Island of New Zealand. With 66 flights between the US and Australia/New Zealand every week, United will operate nearly 40% more flights from the U.S. to Australia and New Zealand next northern winter versus last year.

The carrier is adding new direct flights from Los Angeles to Brisbane and Auckland and increasing service to the region from its San Francisco hub with daily flights to Brisbane, twice daily flights to Sydney and flying larger aircraft to Melbourne. And thanks to United's relationships with Air New Zealand and Virgin Australia, travelers can enjoy easy one-stop connections from these cities to more

than 50 destinations in the region.

United already flies to more destinations in Australia and New Zealand than all other U.S. carriers combined, and now will have more flights and serve more destinations in the region from the U.S. than any other carrier in the world. Tickets are now on sale on the airline's mobile app and on <u>United.com</u> – just in time for customers to plan their trips for the region's peak winter season.

"This past winter, United enhanced our network and became the largest carrier to the South Pacific region. Now, this upcoming winter, we will expand even further," said Patrick Quayle, Senior Vice President of Global Network Planning and Alliances. "Our strong partnerships with Air New Zealand and Virgin Australia provide unparalleled connectivity, and with our historic expansion across five destinations in New Zealand and Australia, United is the clear choice for customers' travel to the region."

<u>San Francisco – Christchurch, NZ</u>* ~ Starting December 1, United will be the only airline to offer direct flights between the U.S. and New Zealand's South Island, with the first direct San Francisco-Christchurch service. United will fly this route three times weekly on a Boeing 787-8 Dreamliner. United's new flight to Christchurch is part of the airline's broader expansion efforts in New Zealand and next winter, the airline will be nearly 70% larger in New Zealand than in 2019.

<u>Los Angeles – Auckland</u>* ~ Next winter, United will build on its position as the largest U.S. airline to Auckland, adding four weekly flights from Los Angeles. United is the only U.S. carrier to serve Auckland year-round with its existing service from San Francisco. United will fly its Los Angeles-Auckland route on a Boeing 787-9 Dreamliner, starting October 28.

<u>Los Angeles – Brisbane</u>* ~ In winter 2022, United became the only airline to offer direct flights between Brisbane and San Francisco. On November 29, United will add to this service by adding three weekly Los Angles-Brisbane flights on a Boeing 787-9 Dreamliner – becoming the largest carrier between the U.S. and Brisbane.

More Flights to Sydney and Brisbane ~ In addition to adding new flights to its schedule, United will also increase its flying from San Francisco to Brisbane and Sydney. Starting October 28, United will offer daily flights between San Francisco and Brisbane on a Boeing 787-9 Dreamliner and will be able to fly nearly triple the number of customers to Brisbane from the US next winter than it did in 2022. The airline will also fly twice daily between San Francisco and Sydney on Boeing 777-300ERs starting October 28, offering more flights to Sydney from the U.S. than any other carrier.

More Seats to Melbourne ~ This past winter, United became the largest airline from the U.S. to Melbourne, increasing from ten to fourteen weekly roundtrip flights, with one daily flight from both San Francisco and Los Angeles. Starting October 28, United will deploy its largest airplane on flights between San Francisco-Melbourne. The 777-300ER will add nearly 100 daily seats to each departure. Compared to winter 2019, United will offer 65% more seats to Melbourne.

As he was tossing food to the Seagulls he would say "Thank You" in appreciation for saving him and a crew that landed in the

Pacific Ocean during WW2. It was a Seagull that they were able to catch and eat and use intestines for fish bait. It was great reading about him again and recalling those memories.

Keeping up with the problems the airlines are having with unruly passengers is getting to be an everyday occurrence. Not only U.S. flights, but foreign carriers also. I keep saying this, but I'm glad I worked for the airlines when I did. The changes made by the airlines don't make it enjoyable anymore, but that is my opinion.

Library tips and recommended reading ~ First of all, for those of you living in California, did you know that you can get a library card for any library in the state? Also, there is a free service called Link+ which allows library cardholders to borrow materials available from more than 55 academic and public libraries across California. You sign in to Link+ from your regular library account, and you can then request materials from all over the state. They are sent to your local library for pickup.

I have two suggestions for you from my book club's reading list. We are currently reading *Horse* by Geraldine Brooks. Her 2005 book *March* won the Pulitzer Prize for Fiction. *Horse*, published in 2022, is her latest novel. To give you an idea of how popular this book is right now, there are 193 people waiting on 28 copies in my county library system. I went into Link+ and I was able to order the book from another library. It arrived in little over a week. *Horse* is based on the remarkable true story of the record-breaking thoroughbred Lexington, the greatest racehorse in American history. A discarded painting in a junk pile, a skeleton in an attic, and another painting handed down several generations to a housekeeper in Harlem, set the scene for this story: Kentucky, 1850. An enslaved groom named Jarret and a bay foal forge a bond of understanding that will carry the horse to record-setting victories across the South. New York City, 1954. Martha Jackson, a gallery owner celebrated for taking risks on edgy contemporary painters, becomes obsessed with a nineteenth-century equestrian oil painting of mysterious provenance. Washington, DC, 2019. Jess, a Smithsonian scientist from Australia, and Theo, a Nigerian-American art historian, find themselves unexpectedly connected through their shared interest in the horse—one studying the stallion's bones for clues to his power and endurance, the other uncovering the lost history of the unsung Black horsemen who were critical to his racing success. Source: Barnes and Noble.

The next book my book club is going to read is *The Immortal Life of Henrietta Lacks* by Rebecca Skloot; now a major motion picture starring Oprah Winfrey and Rose Byrne. CNN named it one of the most influential books of the decade. During hand therapy one day, the man sitting next to me raved about this book, which he was reading for his book club. What a lucky break to learn about this book which I can't wait to read: Her name was Henrietta Lacks, but scientists know her as HeLa. She was a poor Southern tobacco farmer who worked the same land as her slave ancestors, yet her cells—taken without her knowledge—became one of the most important tools in medicine: The first "immortal" human cells grown in culture, which are still alive today, though she has been dead for more than sixty years. HeLa cells were vital for developing the polio vaccine; uncovered secrets of cancer, viruses, and the atom bomb's effects; helped lead to important advances like in vitro fertilization, cloning, and gene mapping; and have been bought and sold by the billions. Yet Henrietta Lacks remains virtually unknown, buried in an unmarked grave. Henrietta's family did not learn of her "immortality" until more than twenty years after her death, when scientists investigating HeLa began using her husband and children in research without informed consent. And though the cells had launched a multimillion-dollar industry that sells human biological materials, her family never saw any of the profits. The story of the Lacks family is inextricably connected to the dark history of medical experimentation, the birth of bioethics, and the legal battles over whether we control the stuff we are made of.

Barbara Cunningham is collecting both new and used Christmas cards. She donates them to a local special education teacher who uses them in his classroom. He has told Barbara he can use "all the cards he can get." The students make gift cards which they sell at the school fundraiser. This teacher needs just the cards, no envelopes. The money they raise is for special outings like field trips and other enrichment activities for the special needs students. Thanks again to everyone who is helping Barbara with this project. Barb reports that, once again, she has a "trunk-ful" of cards to deliver to the school, thanks to everyone all over the country who is mailing cards to her.

Jan Soderstrom is collecting coupons for the charity Support our Troops. This is a service project of her Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) chapter. According to Feeding America, an estimated 160,000 military families experienced difficulty putting food on the table in 2020. Troops in junior enlisted ranks are especially vulnerable to food insecurity — almost 30% need help.

I would like to ask all of you to cut out coupons and mail them to me at 30 San Piedras Place, San Ramon, CA 94583-3018. This is such an easy thing to do to support our troops. For the price of a first class stamp, you can get about 90 coupons in an envelope. The coupons have to say "Manufacturer's Coupon". If they come in a strip, could you please cut them into separate coupons. The collected coupons are then distributed to overseas military personnel for use in their commissaries. The commissaries honor them for six months after the published expiration date so expired coupons can be sent too. In my area, the coupons come in Tuesday's mail along with the supermarket ads, and then in the Sunday paper. Unfortunately, manufacturers are cutting back on the coupons they are issuing, especially on food items, just when people need help the most. So anything we can send to the troops is greatly appreciated. I get so excited when I get a coupon for eggs! I am so grateful for the kindness of all the RUAEA members who are helping me with this project. On May 6th, I turned in 2033 coupons to my coupon chairperson. Thank you so much to the members in my local RUAEA chapter and to members from all over the country who are sending coupons!

Later the same year, Pacific Air Transport (PAT) began flying mail between Seattle and Los Angeles. The next cog in the wheel of United Airlines began turning in the summer of 1927 when Boeing Air Transport (BAT) offered passenger flights between Chicago and San Francisco. BAT expanded its passenger service further in September 1927 by offering flights from New York to Chicago. The new service became the first transcontinental route enabling passengers to fly from New York on

the East Coast to San Francisco on the West Coast with a change of plane in Chicago. Wow! Look at their schedule now!

Also a bit of trivia: During the spring break travel period, March 10 – April 23, UAL operates an average of more than 4,000 daily flights and flies nearly 21 million customers! - more than a 15% increase from 2019. The Acom Days - Amazing History of US Aviation - Part 3

At Cleveland, a young fellow called **Dutch Kindelberger** joined the Martin Company as an engineer. Also a veteran Army pilot from WWI named **Carl Squier** became Sales Manager. His name was to become one of the most venerable names in Lockheed history. Back in 1920, **Donald Douglas** had saved \$60,000 and struck out on his own. He returned to Los Angeles, found a backer, **David Davis**, rented the rear of a barbershop and some space in the loft of a carpenter's shop where they built a passenger airplane called **The Cloudster**. **Claude Ryan** bought this a couple years later, and made daily flights between San Diego and Los Angeles with it. This gives Ryan the distinction of being the owner and operator of the first **Douglas Commercial Transport**, and certainly a claim to be among the original airline passenger operators.

In 1922, **Donald Douglas** was awarded a contract to build three torpedo planes for the U.S. Navy, Douglas lived in Santa Monica, but worked in Los Angeles. Way out in the wilderness at what is now 25th Street and Wilshire Boulevard in Santa Monica, there was an abandoned barn-like movie studio. One day Douglas stopped his roadster and prowled around to investigate. The movie studio became the first real home of the **Douglas Aircraft Company**.

With the \$120,000 Navy contract, **Donald Douglas** needed and could afford one or two engineers. He hired my brother **Gordon Scott**, newly over from serving an apprenticeship to the **Martinside** and the **Fairey Aviation Companies** in England. Gordon was well schooled in the little known science of Aviation by 1923.

My first association with some of the early pioneers occurred when I visited my brother Gordon at the barn at 25th Street. I found him outside on a ladder washing windows. They were dirty and he was the youngest engineer. There were no janitorial services at the Douglas Company in those days.

Gordon introduced me to **Art Mankey**, his boss and Chief Draftsman, and four of his fellow engineers. There was a tow-head guy called **Jack Northrop**, a chap named **Jerry Vultee**, and a fellow named **Dick Von Hake** who was a reserve Army flyer. Jack Northrop came from Santa Barbara where he had worked during WWI for the Lockheed Aircraft Manufacturing Company. The fourth member of the Engineering Group was **Ed Heinemann***. They were all working on the design of the Douglas World Cruisers. Shortly afterwards, Jack Northrop left the Douglas Company in 1926. Working at home, he designed a wonderfully advanced streamlined airplane. He tied back with **Allan Loughead** who found a rich man, **F.E. Keeler**, willing to finance a new **Lockheed Aircraft Company**.

*Personal Note: My Dad was an early Navy Aero Engineer with an Aero degree from MIT in 1929. He was on the SB2C Helldiver BuAir Design Team pre WWII. In those days the Navy designed the planes and the contractors made them. He spent years working with Mrssrs. Grumann, McDonnell and Ed Heinemann, among others. I had the distinct pleasure of spending a day with Mr. Heinemann six years after my Dad died. It was 1972. I was CO, VF-102 and had two crews attending Top Gun so I went to their graduation at Miramar and Mr. Heinemann was the speaker. He had designed the AD, A3D and A4D. He told me how my Dad would fly out to Palmdale from DC, they would fly a few hops, come up with some fixes to known problems, have them done in the machine shop, fly again to see if they worked, and after getting the desired results, Mr. Heinemann would put the changes into effect in the factory and my Dad would fly back to DC to approve them. No dollars changed hands! Mr Heinemann was lamenting how things had certainly changed by 1972 - and I am sure it's worse today. Ed C. (To be continued next month)
